PHEZ HI-BALL MOST POPULAR WITH SHRINERS

Loganberry Juice Drink from Willamette Valley Makes Convention Hit

SALEM WELL ADVERTISED

Harvey Wells Tells How Oregon Was Put on Map at Indianapolis Meeting

Insurance Commissioner Harvey Wells, has returned from Indianapolis, where he was sent in advance representing the Shriners of Oregon. All during his stay there the thermometer registered around 85 and 90, and he now admits that Salem and the Willamette valley looks mighty good to him.

The members of the Oregon Shrine had one of the dining rooms in the Claypool hotel for their headquarters, which was artistically decorated with palms, ferns, and eighty-two baskets of roses. M. Wells stated that it took 1100 roses to fill these baskets and vases.

Transparencies owned by the Portland Commercial club showing views of the highway and Crater lake were exhibited and ten large paintings of views of Oregon were placed upon easels at prominent places in the headquarters.

A Hawaiian orchestra was secured and dancing was permitted, whereby the Oregon headquarters soon proved to be a popular place. It is estimated that 20,000 people visited there daily. Mr. Wells stated that they would start dancing as early as nine o'clock in the morning and would close about twelve midnight, when the crowd would go out on the street and lobby of the hotel and continue for some time.

One of the greatest attractions at the Oregon headquarters was the famous Loganberry juice, known as Phez. Keeping account of the number of gallons used and size of the glasses, and knowing the amount each glass would contain, it was figured that over 211,000 drinks were served. At the booth where Phez was served were pictures of the Loganberry yards and a view of State street showing the capitol, and other views in and around Salem. The Loganberry produce and Salem were certainly put on the map.

One way of getting before the delegates was the page ads which were placed in the morning paper. Mr. Wells employed several boys to fold the page ad out, giving the appearance of being the first page, and left the representatives at the door of the paper the first thing you would see was "Portland wants you in 1920."

Another way of getting before the delegates: A letter was written to each representative and placed in the mail the day before the convention opened. This letter was an invitation to attend the Oregon headquarters and have one of the celebrated Phez highballs and secure a booklet of the Columbia highway and Oregon scenic views. All of these letters were signed, giving the appearance that the Potentate W. J. Hofmann had written a personal invitation, and the next day many brought their letters to headquarters stating that they had received an invitation from the potentate to call. Over 15,000 booklets were given out showing views of Oregon and explaining what the visitors would see when they came to Oregon.

"Since I have returned, many have asked what won the convention," said Mr. Wells. "The only answer that can be given is that it was co-operation and organization. Those from Los Angeles, Seattle, worked as hard as we did to land the convention for Portland. For instance, when I received the word over the phone that we had won, one of the Seattle boys grabbed me around the neck and gave a yell that could be heard from Indianapolis to Seattle. Out in the lobby were several Los Angeles boys and they were just as pleased that Portland got it as though their own city had won."

"The Eastern people could not understand such friendly feeling that existed between Los Angeles, Seattle and Portland and probably never be-
