

AUTO MECHANIC BOARD FORMED

Complete Organization Perfected at Meeting Here Yesterday at Capitol

Complete organization of the newly created board of auto mechanics examiners was perfected at the initial meeting of the board here today, and announcement was made that the first of a long series of practical examinations of automobile mechanics will be started early in July and continue until every auto mechanic in Oregon has been thoroughly examined.

E. E. Bogges of Portland was elected president of the board. H. R. Fancher of The Dalles was chosen vice-president and Prof. M. L. Graning of Corvallis was selected secretary.

The board estimates there are about 5000 automobile mechanics in Oregon who come under the provisions of the new law and all of these must submit to the practical manual examinations which are now being prepared. The work will be graded so that first, second and third grade certificates will be given.

Every person who works for hire on automobiles must take the examination and procure a license before continuing at his trade. The board

Local jobbers and manufacturers numbering 117 have joined in the invitation, and promise the retailers the biggest display of goods ever made in Portland. Indications are said to be that the attendance will be larger than during any buyers' week ever staged in the northwest. During buyers' week there will be two big conventions in Portland among retailers. One will be the annual gathering of the Oregon Retail Merchants' association and the other will be the annual convention of the Pacific Northwest Pharmaceutical Association. There are expected to be hundreds of delegates to each convention.

BANK MANDAMUS ACTION HEARD

Proceeding Against State Banking Board Taken Under Advisement

The mandamus proceeding against State Superintendent of Banks Will H. Bennett and the state banking board to compel the issuance of a charter to the Bank of Commerce of St. Johns came up for hearing in department No. 2 of circuit court yesterday. A demurrer was entered by the defendants on the grounds that the court had no jurisdiction in the case and the matter was taken under advisement by Judge Bingham.

The defendants claim that the statutes provides that the state superintendent of banks, upon application for a charter for a bank, shall make investigation and shall issue charter or not as he deems expedient or proper and that for the court to rule on the matter would be an assumption to invalidate the statute.

Plaintiffs claim that for the superintendent to be sole authority in the granting of a charter is arbitrary.

House Committee Pares Sundry Civil Fund Bill

WASHINGTON, June 18.—Reductions of \$367,272,401 in the sundry civil appropriation bill, as compared with the measure as passed in the last house, were made today by the house appropriations committee in framing the new bill, calling for total appropriations of \$483,899,457. The bill is the last of the seven money measures that failed in the senate filibuster of the last congress to be reported to the house.

Consideration of the bill which will begin tomorrow, is expected to provoke considerable discussion of the expenditure of the \$100,000,000 war fund given to President Wilson for discretionary use.

A \$5,000,000 allotment of this fund would be returned to the treasury under a provision written into the bill by the Republican committee, over the protest of Democratic members. The allotment was made by the president to the disbanded United States Russian bureau of the war trade board.
