

DALZIEL PROBING UNFAIR DEALERS
Weights and Measures Department Seeking Out Short Weight Dealers

The Department of Weights and Measures has accomplished splendid results during the past five months and is being placed upon a better working basis which will undoubtedly make it one of the most useful offices in the state.
Wm. A. Dalziel, deputy state sealer, states that a campaign is being waged against dishonest methods of weight and measure, and that several cases have been successfully prosecuted and fines imposed upon dishonest dealers, and everything possible is being done to get rid of the short weight artist and the fellow who gives short measure of wood.
The office receives a great many inquiries regarding laws on the subject of weights and measures which is very gratifying to the officials, as it demonstrates that more interest is being taken in the department than ever before, and coupled with the complaints that come in from time to time indicates that the people are alive to their own interests and realize that the state is trying to help them through the weights and measures office.
Continual attention is being given to commodities that are shipped from other states into Oregon and where short weight or measure is found it is immediately taken up with the officials of the state from which it is shipped.
Consumers are advised that there are considerable quantities of canned goods on the market that are not up to the net weight marked on the can or package and when this is discovered they should communicate with the department of weights and measures at Salem, Oregon.
Mr. Dalziel wishes the public to understand that this office is at their service and will appreciate any information that will assist him in the discovery of merchants who deliver short weight, or of wood dealers or persons delivering wood that does not come up to the proper measurements, and if the consumers will notify the office and keep such short weight commodities, or short measured wood, intact until the same is investigated by the sealer of weights and measures, he will see that the case is taken to the courts and if possible have the guilty parties prosecuted.


