company had declined to accept them. The first conference between officials of the telephone company and representatives of the strikers was held today, the make-up of the strike committee denoting that the local unions and the International Brotherhood of Electrical workers headquarters had settled their differences regarding the calling of the strike. L. C. Grasser, vice president of the brotherhood, had held the strike unauthorized, but he was included in the committee which waited on the telephone officials.

Authorization to act as her representative here until another could arrive from the east was received by Miss Lillian Blewer, business agent of the Oakland operator's union from Miss Julia S. O'Connor, president of the national operator's organization.

Operators Report Gains

The operators reported gains in all the strike districts with the companies involved generally remaining silent on the issue. In Los Angeles a proposed parade of striking operators and linemen was cancelled by the city, it being feared that the marchers would be subject to remarks from the spectators which might cause trouble. Woodland and

Lodi electrical workers were said to have joined the strike.

The Oakland operators union began paying strike benefits today, \$50 being given needy girls.

No change was reported in the strike of commercial telegraphers here.

HOUSE CLEANING IS COMING SOON

Employees at Feeble Minded Institution Have Too Much to Say

Dr. J. N. Smith, superintendent of the state institution for the feeble-minded will make a house-cleaning among employees of the institution as soon as he is advised by Attorney General Brown how he can get rid of J. A. Anderson, the gardner, who refuses to quit although he has been informed by Superintendent Smith that he is "fired" and that his pay has stopped. Two women attendants are slated to go with Anderson.

Dr. Smith has determined upon this action on the grounds that three employees have been too active in their interference with the administration relative to the case of a inmate of the institution who was sent to the Louise home at Portland in a delicate condition because of intimacy with some male about the institution. The girl herself has told conflicting stories, sometimes naming one of the male inmates and at other times naming an employee who is engaged in different occupations in the school. The fact that the feeble-minded inmate first accused by the girl admitted to an employee that he had relations with her; and that he since has eloped from the institution is considered to indicate his guilt. An investigation by District Attorney Gehlhar and Sheriff Needham failed to show any evidence against the employee named by the girl.

The condition of the girl was discovered about three months ago by Dr. Smith and two weeks ago she was sent to the Louise home. About the time she was sent to Portland, she is said to have changed her story, accusing the employee, Dr. Smith says he asked the women attendants to investigate and he also quizzed the girl. She again changed her story, says the superintendent, and again accused the escaped inmate. Recently Anderson, the gardner, went to Dr. Smith and blamed him for too lax an investigation concerning the employee, but was unable to offer any evidence, says Dr. Smith. Anderson is said to have brought up the subject a second time and declared his intention to employ an attorney and investigate the affair himself. Dr. Smith asserted that if evidence pointed to guilt on the part of the employee he would have him prosecuted. The superintendent attempted to discharge Anderson, and to make sure of his ground called the sheriff and district attorney to probe the case. The two women attendants were clamoring for an investigation of the employee and Dr. Smith believes they hope in this way to shield themselves because of laxity in watching the girl for which he thinks they are culpable.

The girl is 22 years old and is a member of a feeble minded family. She has a sister and a brother in the institution. Her mother is in the state hospital for the insane and her father is in the penitentiary upon conviction of a charge of being the father of a child to which the girl gave birth before her commitment to the institution. The authorities have been unable to find the escaped inmate whom the girl first accused.

to an extremely high price, there has been an effort on the part of many growers to find some excuse to void their contracts.

Many were watching the outcome of this case in the hope that something might develop which would furnish them some leeway to escape their obligations.

Judge Kelly, in ruling on the

validity of the contract, sustained it squarely, and instructed the jury in this case that the plaintiff was entitled to damages at the rate of one and a half cent a pound for all good berries grown by the defendant during the season of 1918 which he failed to deliver to plaintiff, and that the plaintiff was entitled to recover attorney's fees in addition.

The only question left to the jury was to determine the number of pounds of berries produced by the defendant on which the plaintiff was entitled to recover at one and a half cents a pound.
