"which form of government despotism that would shackle, not liberate."

President Gompers' salary was raised from \$7,500 to \$10,000 a year over his protest.

Secretary Morrison's salary was increased to \$7,500 a year from \$5,000.

Adjournment Impossible

The convention was to have closed today, but because of the large number of resolutions still unacted upon was extended into next week.

The convention today showed its desire to discipline unions and central organizations "which display extremely radical tendencies" one resolution providing for the cancellation of the charter of any union which "inculcates, advances or encourages" and plan to bring about a change in the organization of the American Federation of Labor or the international bodies.

The resolution was referred back to the committee for minor changes.

Public Employment Favored

The convention today went on record as advocating public employment agencies under federal, state and municipal management and transfer to the department of labor from the treasury department of duties in connection with child labor legislation. The executive council was instructed immediately to bend all efforts toward securing new child labor legislation.

Armored Cars Used

As soon as the military took charge, order began to come out of chaos. Armored cars and troops with fixed bayonets appeared. The crowd began to disperse.

It was announced that 300 alleged rioters are in the police cells.

The troop of the Northwest Mounted police engaged numbered only 53 men and few of these escaped without wounds or contusions. The

horses suffered in like degree, one being blinded by a lump of concrete.

The street car service, in part resumed during the past three days, automatically stopped.

SPAULDING MEN GIVEN INCREASE IN DAILY WAGE

Head of Logging Company Establishes Higher Minimum Per Diem

LEGION ACCEPTS PLAN

New Salaries To Be on Sliding Scale With \$3.40 as Lowest

Employees numbering about 100 in the mill and yard of the Spaulding Logging company will receive increases in wages varying in per cent with their present salaries as result of action taken by Charles K. Spaulding, head of the company. The lower salaried men will receive the greatest increase and a minimum of \$3.40 a day has been established instead of the former \$3 minimum.

Early last week, the employers, who are members of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen, went to Mr. Spaulding and asked that a flat 10 per cent rise be granted, that he become a member of the legion and that a certain employe of several years service be discharged, that the man was disloyal.

Mr. Spaulding took the matter under consideration until Tuesday of next week, but in the meantime called the workers and stated his plan for increased wages. The plan was accepted by the legion and its details are now being worked out. Mr. Spaulding has recognized the organization, but has not yet become a member of it, having the matter still under consideration.

The question of the discharge of the employe who is objectionable to the workers has been discussed but so far no action has been announced.

ASTORIA WILL UNITE IN FIGHT

City, Port, and Chamber of Commerce Organize on Differential Rate

ASTORIA, Or., June 21.—The city of Astoria, the port of Astoria and the chamber of commerce has combined to fight the Portland differential rate case which will come before the interstate commerce commission July 21. In Portland's effort to win a differential freight rate against Puget Sound cities of Seattle and Tacoma, local interests claim Astoria will be discriminated against, for this city is on a parity with Puget Sound shipping centers as a result of the zone established by the interstate commerce commission. Attorneys to fight the case for Astoria have been retained and they cooperate with the attorneys of Tacoma and Seattle.

KEY OF CITY IS GIVEN VETERANS

Portland Fetes Soldiers of Many Regiments Home at Last

PORTLAND, Or., June 21.—The keys of the city will be turned over Monday to 520 returned veterans. In the morning 205 of the 21st and 23rd engineers will put in their appearance and will remain until midnight. Later a group of 25 Oregon and Washington men will pass through the city from Kelley Field, Texas. They will remain until 10 a. m.

A special train will bring 126 members of the 318th engineers in the afternoon. With them will come 41 veterans from Camp Merritt. Elaborate arrangements for a reception are being completed by Captain E. J. Eivers of the American Legion and T. Strain of war camp community service.

An advance welcoming committee will travel to Troutdale to greet the trains.
