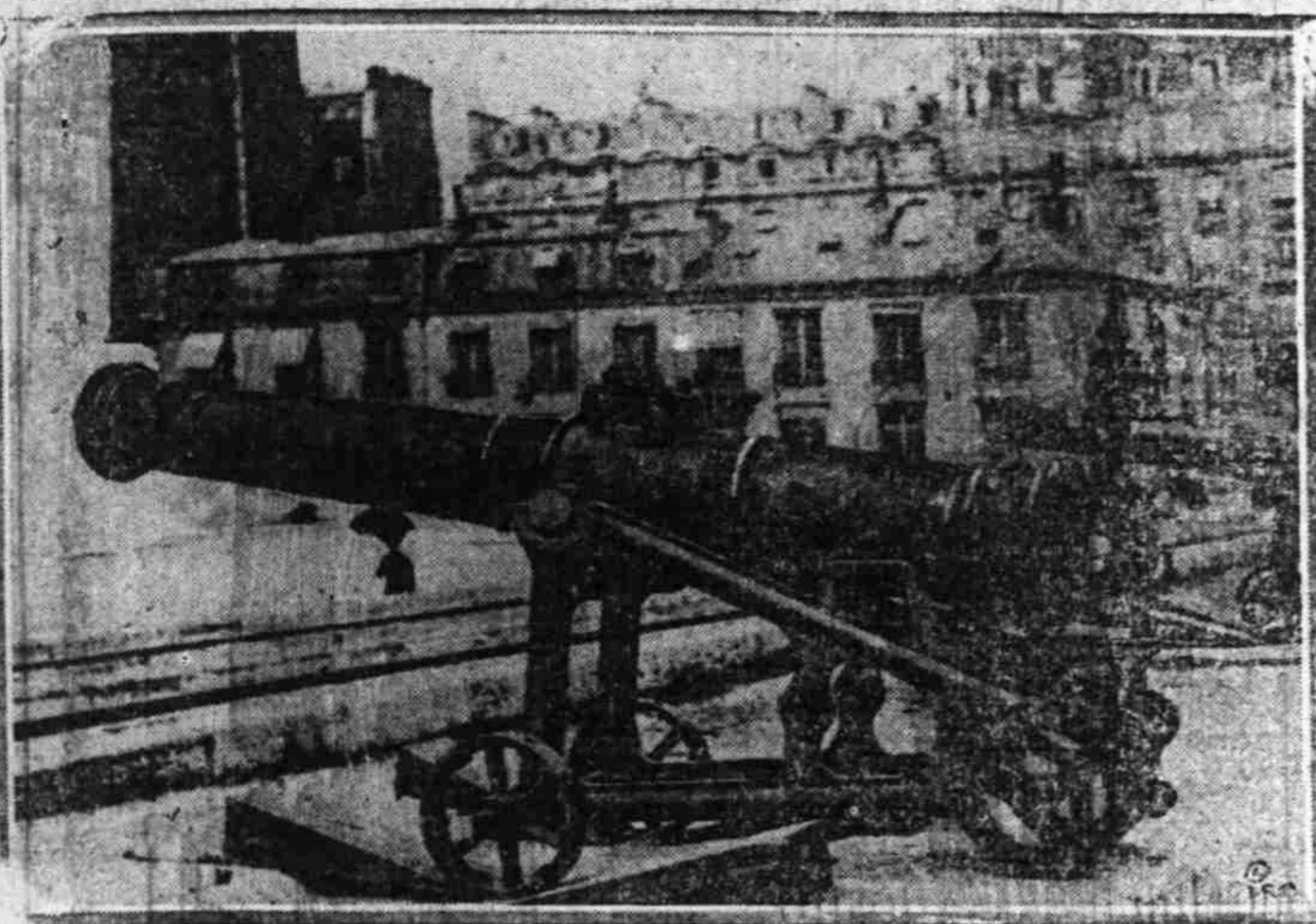


**Old Cannon, Captured by Napoleon From the Prussians,

**COREY URGES
AID TO WEST**

**Service Commissioner Wants
Oregon Towns to Boost
for Legislation**

Commercial clubs and other industrial organizations of eastern Oregon are urged, in a letter of the Oregon Public Service commission, to use their influence to have the Oregon delegation in congress support long-and-short-haul legislation now pending at Washington. The effect of this legislation, would be elimination of discrimination against intermediate points in the matter of rates as compared with the long haul from the east to the Pacific coast. The letter is addressed to the Oregon organizations by Commissioner H. H. Corey.

The letter asserts that eastern Oregon will remain sparsely settled as long as railroads are permitted to charge less for the longer haul than to intermediate points, and that the manufacturing industry can not be developed under present conditions. Senator Poindexter of Washington, Henderson of Nevada and Shafroth of Colorado, and Congressman Hayden of Arizona introduced long-and-short-haul bills before the last session of congress, and as a result of efforts by the intermediate association a favorable report was

received from the senate committee on interstate commerce on senate bill 313, but congestion in the closing hours of the session kept the measure from passing. As senate bill 389 it has been re-introduced.
