SARGENT WITH FEDERAL BANK

Former State Superintendent Named as Reserve Agent at San Francisco

PORTLAND, June 30.—News has been received at the Portland branch of the federal reserve bank of the appointment of S. G. Sargent, formerly state bank examiner and later superintendent of banks in Oregon, as assistant federal reserve agent of the federal reserve bank at San Francisco, effective July 1. E. H. Tucker of California also has been appointed as assistant federal reserve agent, by John Perring, chairman of the board. Sargent began his banking career at Spokane in 1893 as a messenger. He was associated with various banks in northern Idaho and finally with the United States National bank at Salem.

He resigned the office of state superintendent of banks in February, 1918, when he was selected to manage the department of examination of the federal reserve bank at San Francisco with the title of chief examiner.

SALEM WORKERS WILL PARADE

Patriotic Labor Unionists Preparing Floats for Celebration Pageant

The industrial workers of Salem are planning to show by their participation in the parade on the Fourth of July that their patriotism did not end with the signing of the armistice but that they are as ready to take their part in the patriotic demonstration today as they were to support the government during the war by contributing to all war activities like the Red Cross, the Y. M. C. A., the Y. W. C. A., the Salvation Army and the Knights of Columbus.

In the Fourth of July parade the workers will march after the military and it is expected that the marchers in the industrial parade will number about 40. Pasco Trullio, chairman of this part of the parade, has been promised at least five floats and he hopes to have several more. The machinists are planning a novel demonstration, and the other organizations are intimating that they will not be outdone, but are not announcing what their floats will be.

Labor did its full share in winning the war and now that a victorious peace has come every working man is expected to be out and march in the parade to show that he is still 100 per cent patriotic, and to give the boys a rousing welcome home.

other action unless he deems it advisable to obtain a ruling by the supreme court. This is the holding of Attorney General Brown in reply to an inquiry by the secretary of state concerning a demand by John W. Kaste, Portland lawyer, that Tazwell's salary be held up.

Kaste stated that he made the demand as a citizen and taxpayer. He also has made the statement that he believed his letter would have the effect of getting the question before the court.

Attorney General Brown holds that it is the duty of the court and not of administrative officials to pass on the validity of laws, and that the secretary cannot be held liable for auditing Judge Tazwell's salary.

Service Flag Honors Men Paroled from State Prison

Mrs. Joseph Keller, wife of Captain Keller, retiring state parole officer, has designed and made a service flag in honor of the paroled men of the state prison. It contains 5 stars, of which two are gold. Inscribed on the flag are the words: "Paroled men who did their bit in the World War and received full pardon from Governor Withycombe."

LYTLE'S SALARY IS MADE BIGGER

State Veterinarian to Receive \$3000 Yearly; Deputies Are Raised

The state livestock sanitary board, at its annual meeting here Saturday increased the salary of State Veterinarian W. H. Lytle from \$2400 to \$3000 a year and the salaries of Deputy State Veterinarians V. M. Gardiner of Portland and Julius Sorenson of Hillsboro from \$1600 to \$1800 each.

The board approved the appointment by Dr. Lytle of Dr. V. L. Glazier of Moscow, Idaho, as dairy herd and meat inspector for Coos county and authorized the publication of a dairy herd directory.

Dr. Lytle reported two remaining bands of scabby sheep in Lake county which are now being dipped. The board has caused to be dipped nearly all the sheep in that county or about 200,000 head in all.

Methodist Preacher Buys Bloodhound to Hunt Men

Rev. Frederick Snyder, a Methodist minister of Molalla, is purchaser of one of Captain Joe Keller's bloodhounds, and it is said Rev. Mr. Snyder will become a manhunter on a commercial basis. He has had considerable experience in this work and has assisted in the search for several convicts who have escaped from the Oregon penitentiary. Mr. Snyder expects to hire out his dog for the use of sheriffs and other officers in the search for criminals or persons who have disappeared. Captain Keller, who has resigned as state parole officer, has two other bloodhounds which he may sell to the state.

Lytle Is Re-elected to State Veterinarian's Job

The state livestock sanitary board at its annual meeting here yesterday re-elected the incumbent officers. They are: President, Walter Taylor, Corvallis; vice president, W. D. Barrett, Heppner; state veterinarian, and secretary, Dr. W. H. Lytle, Salem. Other business done was of a routine nature. Other members of the board are Frank Brown, Carlton; N. Burgess, Pendleton; Frank Rogers, Marshfield; Harry West, Seaside, and Dr. Roebert, Portland.

JAPAN DENIES SECRET TREATY

Statement Declares Story of German Origin to Discredit Japs

PAIS, June 30.—The Japanese peace delegation today issued a denial of newspaper statement printed in English in Paris to the effect that Japan and Germany had arranged secret alliance, aimed even-

tually to include Russia, and that only the overthrow of the Hohenzollerns and the arrival of the armistice prevented its signature.

The delegation said the story was of German origin, revamped for the moment of the signing of peace to discredit Japan.
