Engineering Examiners
Appointed by Governor

The state board of engineering ex-
aminers, created by an act of the
legislature was appointed yester-
day by Governor Olcott. The ap-
pointees, with the date of expiration
of the term of each, are as follows:
Civil engineers: R. R. Bartlett,
Astoria, July 1, 1921; O. Laurgaard,
Portland, July 1, 1922.
Mechanical engineers: G. A. Co-
rell, Corvallis, July 1, 1925; J. C.
Strong, Portland, July 1, 1921.
Mining engineers: W. B. Dennis,
Calton, July 1, 1925; Frank S.
Bailey, Baker, July 1, 1923.
Hydraulic engineers: E. G. Hop-
son, Portland, July 1, 1925; John H.
Lewis, Vale, July 1, 1925.
Electrical engineer: Fred D. Web-
er, Portland, July 1, 1921.
The members serve without pay.
The enactment provides that the
term of each begins July 1, 1919,
and three are to hold until July 1,
1921, three until July 1, 1923 and
three until July 1, 1925. It is fur-
ther provided in the law that two of
the members shall be civil engineers,
two mechanical, two mining, two hy-
draulic and one electrical engineer.

OLCOTT URGES ARMY SERVICE

**Proclamation Encourages
Young Men to Help Fill
up Ranks in Force**

By issuing a proclamation encour-
aging the young men of Oregon to
enlist in the army, Governor Olcott
has given his cooperation to the ef-
fort now being made by the war de-
partment to fill existing units of the
military force of the nation. The
proclamation, which is issued at the
request of Major General William H.
Johnston of the 91st division, now at
Camp Lewis, follows:

"Whereas, many of the citizens of
this state rendered patriotic and val-
uable service to the country during
the great war for civilization, such
men whether commissioned or enlist-
ed, have returned to their home bet-
ter qualified for the duties of citi-
zens as a result of the training and
experience in the army; and

"Whereas, the war department be-
cause of the discharge of a large
number of men called to the service
for the emergency, is desirous of se-
curing recruits to fill the ranks of
existing units of the army; and
"Whereas, Camp Lewis, American
Lake, Washington, at which many
citizens of this state were trained,
still possesses the facilities for mili-
tary training, and in addition there-
to it is the policy of the war depart-
ment to enable men serving in the
army to undertake studies, or the
practice of various trades, which will
improve their academic standing at
college, or increase their earning ca-
pacity after their discharge. Not only
are the men who served in the army
assured of the benefits to be ob-
tained through further service, but
many young men not yet married nor
established in life can well improve
their citizenship by voluntarily enlist-
ing for service in the army, either at
Camp Lewis or elsewhere.

"Now, therefore, for the benefit
of the citizens of this state I call
attention to the educational opportu-
nities afforded through service in the
army, and believe that young men
not yet committed to any profession
or trade can well spend a year un-
dergoing military training."

**Protest is Take Up With
Freight Traffic Committee**

The Oregon public service com-
mission, through a letter by Com-
missioner Fred A. Williams to F.
W. Robinson, chairman of the Port-
land district freight traffic commit-
tee, requests an opportunity to in-
vestigate before the railroad admin-
istration eliminates routing via the
Willamette navigation company and
Western Transportation & Towing
company in connection with rates on
paper and paper products from Ore-
gon City and Camas, Wash. The ad-
ministration proposes to substitute
a railroad routing from these two
points.

"It would seem," says Commis-
sioner Williams, "that there is an ef-
fort to cancel all joint rates with
carriers not under federal control.
In this one instance, movements of
shipments by rail and water have
been so long in force and effect
that it hardly seems justified to dis-
turb such conditions without a full
hearing. Shippers are not favorable
to such action on the part of the
railroad administration, and the pub-
lic service commission has addressed
a letter to the Portland district
freight traffic committee asking for
a hearing before this arrangement
is made finally effective. The Wash-
ington public service commission
will in all probability take similar
steps."

A number of protests have been
received at the office of the commis-
sion.
