ber of complimentary remarks about Dempsey's ability.

Willard Praised Victor

"There is little to add what is already known," the defeated champion said. "After the first hard swing to the jaw in the first round Dempsey came in so fast that I never had a chance to clear my head and square away for a better offense or defense. I was fighting in a daze. This is no attempt to alibi my defeat or take credit from Dempsey, who is a fast, clever, hard hitting opponent, ranking with the best of heavyweights. Now I am through with boxing and expect to be just plain Jess Willard. I hope, however, that the public will remember me as a boxer who always tried to give his best in the ring and did his share to keep the boxing game above suspicion."

Efforts were being made today to obtain permission from proper authorities for the exhibition of the moving pictures of the fight in the soldier camps and hospitals where wounded overseas fighters are recuperating. It is hoped that eventually the pictures may be shown in public generally without violating the law. Rickard and Willard still retain their two-thirds interest in the films, but Dempsey sold his third before the fight.

Movies to Settle Arguments

Because of the controversy over the number of knockdowns Dempsey scored in the first round, the first exhibition of the pictures scheduled here tomorrow is being awaited to settle the dispute. Referee Pecora said there were six knockdowns. Dempsey believes he felled the champion seven times. Boxing experts at the ring side vary from five to seven knockdowns.

DEMPSEY OFFERED \$30,000
TO MEET MEEHAN LABOR DAY

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., July 5.—Fight promoters connected with a local sporting club today wired Jack Dempsey, the new heavyweight champion, guaranteeing him \$30,000 for an eight round bout with Willie Meehan here Labor Day. Meehan has consented to meet Dempsey.

PICTURES SHOW FIVE CLEAN
KNOCKDOWNS IN FIRST ROUND

CLEVELAND, July 5.—The uncertainty as to the number of times Jess Willard was knocked down by Jack Dempsey in the first round of the championship contest at Toledo

on July 4 was settled tonight when the first screening of the fight picture registered five clean knockdowns by Dempsey.

Administration May Take
Over Loading of Ships

PORTLAND, Or., June 5.—The federal grain administration may be forced to take over the loading of grain ships here, because of the pending grain handlers' strike, according to a statement issued today by Max H. Houser, vice president of the federal grain corporation.

"I expect nothing to develop until next Monday," said Mr. Houser today, "on account of the pending holidays, but something will have to be done early in the coming week. Vessels costing hundreds and perhaps thousands of dollars a day for maintenance are being forced into idleness by the local strike. I shall probably decide Monday what course must be pursued if the local grain handlers' union has effected no settlement."

CROSBY HOPEFUL
FOR EUROPEANS

Conditions Not as Bad as Those of South After Civil War

NEW YORK, July 5.—Conditions in Europe are not as bad as those faced by the south after the civil war, Oscar J. Crosby, former assistant treasurer of the United States and for two years chairman of the international council on war purchases and finance, declared here tonight upon his arrival from Europe on the transport Mount Vernon. None of the European nations is bankrupt, he said.

America should aid, he asserted, in adjustment of the financial problems, but he urged the European countries be allowed to solve their own internal difficulties.

Mr. Crosby endorsed the policy of the federal reserve board, as announced yesterday. He added he believed it better than loans for commercial and industrial purposes made by private bankers than by the government. Government loans he said, always carried with them political danger.

Germany, said Mr. Crosby, eventually would reach a stable form of government if the people were given opportunity to solve their political problems.

Mr. Crosby said he opposed intervention in Russia.

CRIPPLING OF
ARMY FORSEEN

Baker's Order Reducing Size to 233,000 Expected to Force Issue

WASHINGTON, July 5.—The question of a permanent military policy probably will be forced before the present session of congress by Secretary Baker's order reducing the army to 233,000 officers and men by September 30. Military experts here believe only speedy passage of the army reorganization bill will prevent demoralization of the military establishment.

The recent army bill makes mandatory the continuance of the four new staff corps: chemical warfare, motor transport, tank, and air service—none of which was provided for in the national defense act. Officers and men must be drawn from the line and from the regular staff personnel to provide the necessary overhead for these branches.

Repetition of 1908 Feared.

"A return to the status of 1908," was the prediction of one officer concerning the effects. In that year companies could muster only 25 men and regiments frequently were under the command of one major and one captain.

The general staff already is at work on some program which will come within authorized expenditures and yet permit the retention of a skeleton establishment which may be expanded for war.

Plans for the organization of the air service and tank corps looking to further progress will have to go by the board, it was conceded. Service will be kept active through a headquarters organization with repairmen and guards at the various depots.

Mooney Strike Spreads but
Many Unions Stay on Jobs

ASTORIA, Or., July 5.—The Mooney protest strike which started here Thursday night, when deckhands and firemen of the tug Walula refused duty, spread today although the members of the several unions have refused to participate. All the longshoremen, coal handlers and men connected with the building trades including carpenters, brick masons, painters, plasterers, plumbers and electrical workers are out. The mills are running as usual.

O'Leary Heads Association
for Deaf for Next Year

SEATTLE, Wash., July 5.—Election of officers wound up the five day biennial convention here of the Washington association for the deaf. Elections today were: James H. MAIL SERVICE
SCALE STUDIED

Interstate Commerce Commission Holds Hearing in Portland

PORTLAND, Or., July 5.—Adjustment of scales of compensation to electric railways for transporting mails is receiving the attention of a commission from Washington which is conducting a series of hearings in the principal cities. Today in Portland a hearing was held concerning the Puget Sound traction systems and the Portland Railway, Light and Power company with Geo. N. Brown, attorney-examiner of the interstate commerce commission, presiding. Accompanying him were E. S. Ashbaugh, representing the electric railway companies generally, and Joseph Stewart, special assistant to the attorney general, representing postoffice department. From here the commission will return to Washington via the southern route.

COL. HASKELL
SENT TO EAST

Officer Appointed High Commissioner in Turkey for Great Powers

PARIS, July 5.—Colonel William Haskell today was appointed high commissioner for the four great powers, the United States, Great Britain, France and Italy, in Armenia. He will have entire charge of all economic questions in the country, with most extended powers, reporting to the council at Paris. All relief organizations in Constantinople, Galicia and the provinces throughout Turkey will report to him.

Colonel Haskell recently returned from Rumania where he went in connection with the distribution of relief to the population.

STRIKE CALL HAS
LITTLE EFFECT

Larger Mines in Butte Area Have Virtually Full Shifts on Duty

BUTTE, Mont., July 5.—All of the larger mines of Butte had virtually full shifts today despite the effort to call miners away from work by those prompting the Mooney protest strike, according to a statement from the Anaconda Copper Mining company today. In other lines of industry and business the effect of the five day strike was not discernible.

John H. McIntosh, secretary of the Associated Industries of Montana, stated that less than 100 employees of all kinds had responded to the call to cease work. Those who had struck he said, would be denied employment for an additional five days when they reported for work.

Greek Decorates 17 Americans with Order of Redeemer for Prowess

PERSHING STADIUM, France, July 5.—America found up the track and field program today by winning all three places in the hop, step and jump, bringing her total score to 2. France was second with 12.

In the hop, step and jump, H. Prentiss won with a distance of 14.68 meters (approximately 48 feet); Charles Eder was second and J. E. Maddon third. All the Americans broke the French record.

The American tug of war team beat the Belgians, winning the championship.

America won the catch as catch can team championship. The Graeco Roman team championship went to the Belgians, the Americans beating the Serbians for fourth place.

France won the 100 meters relay race (a run of occupation event). Italy was second and America third.

Maddon, America, won the running broad jump, also an army 400 occupation event, with 6.615 meters, a little over 21 feet.

In the horse jumping obstacle event there were several bad falls due to the lengthening of the jump to four meters. Colonel McComb was among those whose horse fell.
