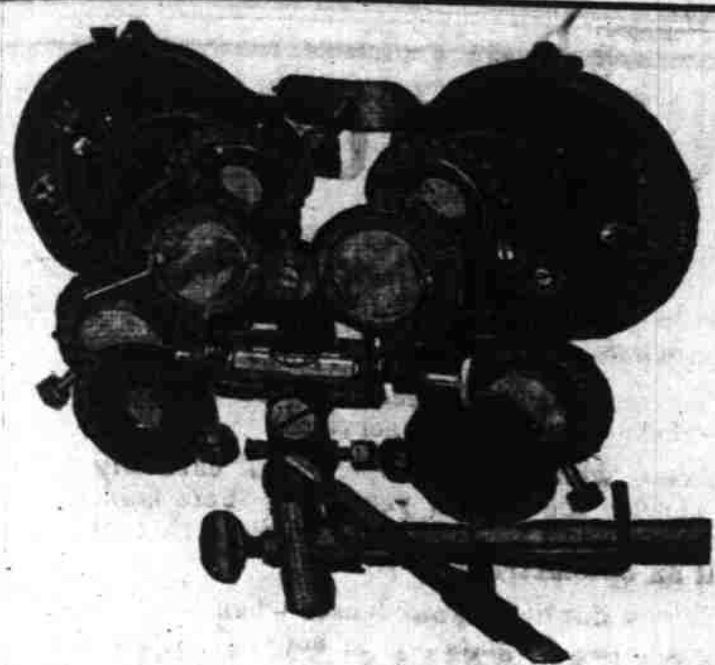

BOY SCOUTS RETURN HOME

Eventful Hiking Trip Taken Into Wilds of Lane and Klamath Counties

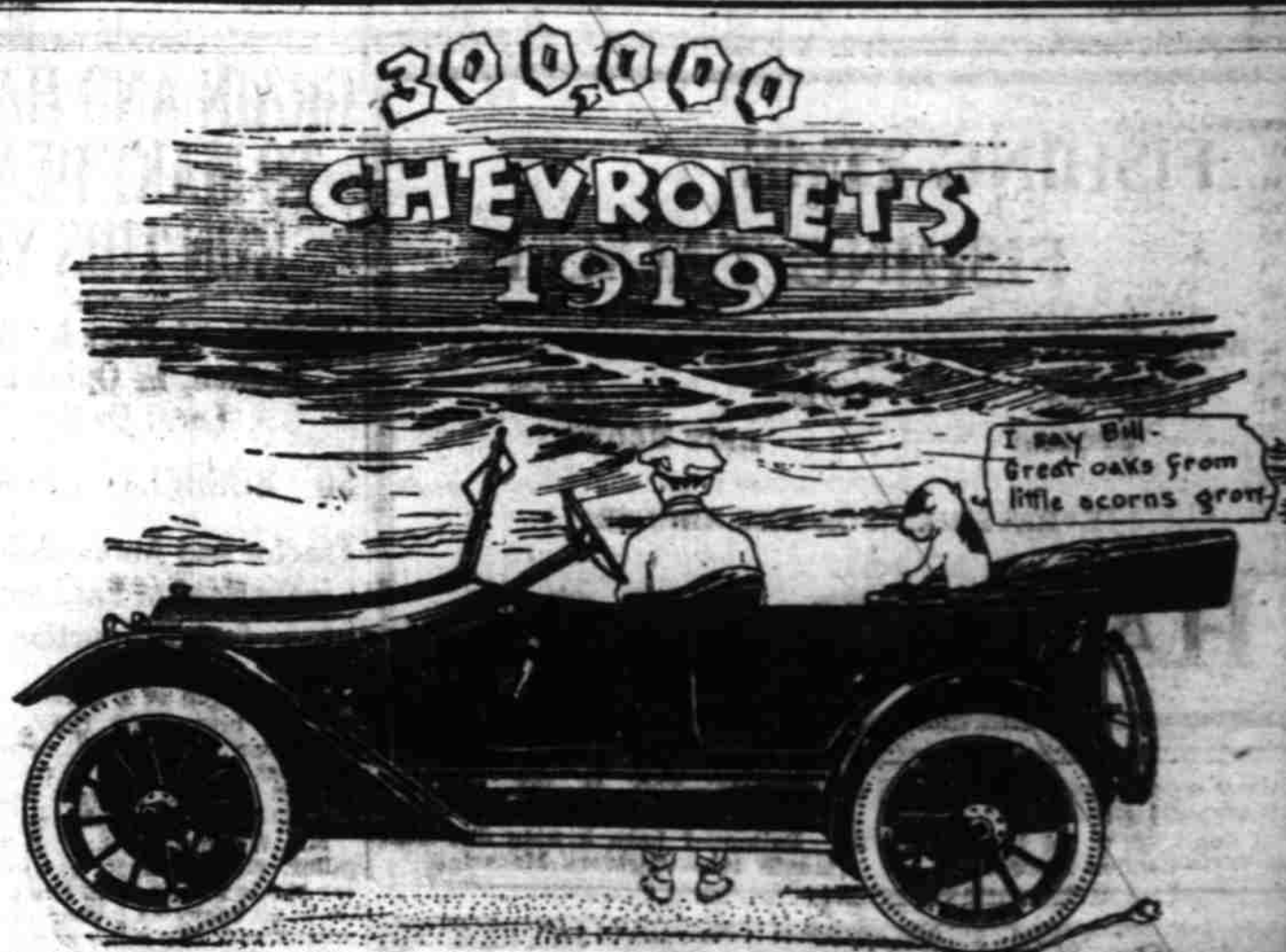
Returning from a land that rivals
any other part of Oregon for scenic
beauty and health resorts, and which
probably excels in hunting and fish-
ing facilities, the members of the
Boy Scout organizations of the Sa-
lem council, Boy Scouts of America,
who attended this season's annual
summer camp arrived in Salem
Thursday evening via their special
car, from Oakridge. At the request
of the business men of Salem, the
boys gave up the balance of their va-
cation in order to render service dur-
ing the homecoming celebration.

The camp was held near McCredie
hot springs in southeastern Lane
county, under the auspices of the lo-
cal council and was managed direct-
ly by Scout Executive Harold L.
Cook. The cost to the local council
for the three weeks outing afforded
the 50 members who attended the
camp will probably reach somewhere
near \$400.

During the course of the camp
hikes were made to Bunchgrass
ridge, Salt creek and Diamond creek
falls, Odell lake in Klamath county,
Fern flat, Hell's Half Acre and many
other scenic and interesting places.
The camp was situated on Blue Pool
on Salt Creek at an elevation of
2000 feet, and none of the hikes tak-
en reached less than a 5000-foot ele-
vation and were all above the snow
line. An interesting feature of the
camp was a battle in the snow on
June 21, the longest day of the year.

The menu provided always
proved to be an ample sufficiency
and included roast meat, cake, pie
and lemonades. Features of the
camp life included the evening Bible
class under the direction of the lead-
ers, entertainments by groups of
boys, trout for breakfast every morn-
ing during the camp, overnight hikes
and sham battles, instruction in bird
study and tracking by pioneers of
the mountains, and swimming in the
large heated mineral pool at the hot
springs.

During the ramblings of the boys on
their hikes several deer and bear
were encountered. The bear proved
to be the more sociable, however, and
visited the camp several times. No
harrowing tales of bravery are be-



ing told by the boys in connection

with these visits.
The population of the camp, in-
cluding leaders and cooks, numbered
an even 50, and not one of that num-
ber was over anxious to return to
civilization, even at the repeated re-
quests of the business men.

Boy of Tender Years is Defendant in Divorce Case

Henry Turnidge has a wife who is
suing him for divorce, but he is of
such tender years that it is necessary
under the law that a guardian be ap-
pointed to carry on the litigation.
He is 20 years old and through John
Turnidge, who has been named
guardian ad litem, he has filed an
answer to the complaint of Nellie
Turnidge who is asking for a decree
of divorce and the restoration of her
maiden name. The defendant denies
all the allegations set forth in the
complaint and by way of a cross bill
alleges that soon after the marriage
March 15, 1918, the plaintiff deserted
him and has since refused to live
with him. He prays that the com-
plaint be dismissed and that he be
granted the decree of divorce and
given costs and disbursements.

PHEZ COMPANY SUES GROWER

Court Asked to Require E. E. Roberts to Deliver His Loganberries

The Phez company vs. E. E. Rob-
erts is the title of a new suit asking
that Department No. 2 of the circuit
court issue a temporary injunction
restraining Mr. Roberts from deliv-
ering his loganberries to anyone ex-
cept the plaintiff.

On June 14, 1918, the Northwest
Products company and E. E. Roberts,
it is alleged, entered into a contract
with The Phez company for the de-
livery of the berries grown by Mr.
Roberts on a three-acre tract near
Liberty. The contract was to run
four years and the rate for the 1919
berries was to be 3 1/2 cents a pound.
The complaint alleges that when the
price was raised to 5 1/2 cents a pound
it was stipulated that the damages
of 1 1/2 cents a pound for non-delivery
should be omitted. The complaint
further alleges that Mr. Roberts ful-
filled his contract in 1918 and that
1919 he delivered 211 pounds of ber-
ries and the notified the company
that he intended to sell the remain-
der of his crop of seven tons to other
buyers.

The Phez company then states in
its complaint that it has spent \$125,-
000 this year in advertising and \$50,-
000 in establishing a jam and jelly
plant in Salem and avers that it is
impossible to secure other berries to
take the place of those grown by
Mr. Roberts should he persist in the
complaint further alleges that the
business recently built up by the
company will be seriously damaged
in case the defendant does not live
up to his contract.

A temporary restraining order is
therefore prayed for and it is also
asked that the injunction be made
permanent and Mr. Roberts be di-
rected to live up to the original con-
tract and its modifications.
