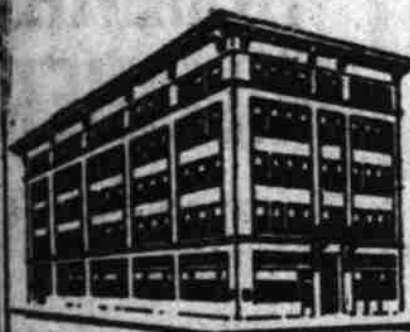

GRAIN AND HAY TO MAKE HEAVY RUN THIS YEAR

Records of Decade Will be Broken, in Opinion of Local Dealer

50 BUSHELS PROMISED

Tractor and Automobile Eliminate Need of Feed and Affect Production

The records of a decade or more will be broken by the grain and hay crops in the Willamette valley this season, declares H. O. White of the firm of D. A. White & Sons, grain and feed dealers of Salem.

Mr. White says that all over the valley, clover, cheat, oat and vetch hay yields will be from twice to three times as heavy as a year ago on approximately the same acreage.

"Many of the fields will yield three times as heavily as last year," said Mr. White. "The market, of course, will not open as strong and will probably open at about \$15 a ton baled and delivered to town. Last year the hay market opened at about \$20 to \$22."

The Willamette valley on some farms, may again see 50-bushel wheat this season, Mr. White thinks. If this is true, then the Willamette valley will look like the early days when some of the biggest yields in the west were in this part of the state.

"The grain crop promises to be the best in 10 years," said Mr. White. "Fall wheat, I believe, will average 30 to 35 bushels and many fields will average 40 or 50 bushels. Spring grain looks like an average of 20 or 25 bushels. Not only will the yield be heavier by the acre, but the acreage sown to wheat is the largest in 10 years. There are few idle pieces of land in the valley this year. Nearly all of it has been devoted to some kind of crop."

Oats will also be a good crop, Mr. White says, but the acreage is decreased. This he attributes largely to the tractor and the automobile, the supplanting of the horse with gasoline eliminating the necessity of producing large quantities of feed. The same condition is affecting the production of hay.

COVENANT FOES ARE DENOUNCED

Cummings Says Opponents of League Crawling Back to Wigwams

SPOKANE, Wash., July 5.—Declaring that "there seems to be a division in the ranks of the 'round robin' senators" and that while some of them indicate "like Senator Borah" a disposition to remain steadfast in their opposition, others are "now peering wistfully through the sage brush and are working their way unostentatiously back to the old wigwam" on the "reservation," Homer S. Cummings, chairman of the Democratic national committee, defended the league of nations and the peace treaty here tonight at a local park.

Chairman Cummings' address tonight concluded a busy day during which he was the noon guest at a luncheon attended by 300 persons. In the afternoon he attended a Democratic conference and tonight he was the guest at a private dinner party. His park address followed.

At tonight's meeting J. Bruce Kremer of Butte, Mont., vice chairman of the national committee, replied to attacks of those who have charged extravagant expenditures on the part of the government during the war.

Following conference of the visiting leaders with local Democratic chieftains, it was intimated that Spokane had the support of the north-west for the location of the north-western headquarters for the coming campaign.

The party will go to Couer D'Alene, Idaho, tomorrow where Chairman Cummings will speak on the league nations and the peace treaty.

Wayne and Browne Lose Out in Long Beach Tennis Doubles

LONG BEACH, Cal., July 5.—In three smashing sets, 6-2, 6-2, 6-2, Wayne and Brown went down to defeat at the hands of Bundy and McLoughlin in the closing day's play of the 32nd annual Pacific coast men's doubles championship tennis tournament here today. The winners of today's play will represent the Pacific coast at the national championship tourney at Boston next August.

Lieutenant Colonel Dies Trying to Save Private

LAWTON, Okla., July 5.—Lieutenant Colonel Harold H. Bateman, Ninth field artillery, Fort Sill, sacrificed his life last night in a futile attempt to save Private Joe Bukoby, 14th field artillery, from drowning in Medicine creek, near here. Captain Francis B. Legett, narrowly escaped drowning in an effort to save Lieutenant Colonel Bateman.

Alleged Bank Robber is Brought Back to Hillsboro

HILLSBORO, Or., July 5.—Chester Clark, alias Conley, arrested at Los Angeles last week on a charge of having held up and robbed the Bank of Beaverton, Ore., June 10 last, escaping in an automobile with \$3500 loot, was lodged in jail here today, having been brought from California by Sheriff Alexander. Clark refused to discuss the charge against him.

CERTIFICATES QUICKLY TAKEN

\$326,468,000 Subscribed for Treasury Paper, States Announcement

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Subscriptions of \$326,468,000 to the series of treasury certificates dated July 1 and maturing September 15, were announced by Secretary Clegg, making a total of \$552,906,000 in certificates maturing on the next installment payment date for income and excess profits taxes. The previous issue was dated June 3. No more certificates of that maturity will be issued.

Large amounts still are being subscribed to certificates dated July 1 and maturing December 15, the total being \$290,387,500, which with the previous issue makes a total of \$629,099,000 subscribed in advance of the last installment payment of taxes.

DALLAS, Or., July 2.—(Special to The Statesman.)—The Polk County Observer, the leading Republican publication in this county, was sold the first of the week by its former owner, Lew A. Cates, to E. C. Koen, a newspaper man from Minnesota who took charge of the paper Monday morning.

The Observer was started more than 31 years ago and has been one of the leading Republican papers of C. Hayter, one of the best known

newspapermen in Oregon, who sold it several years ago to Eugene Foster and William Totten of Aberdeen, Washington. After Mr. Foster's death in 1913 the paper was again sold and since that time has been edited by several different men though never losing its identity as a news sheet. The new owner will continue the same policies of the paper in regard to politics.
