\$400,000 BONDS WILL BE SOLD

John H. Lewis Submits Data
Relative to Warm Springs
District

John H. Lewis, former state en-
gineer, now engineer manager for the
Warm Springs Irrigation district at
Vale, has submitted to the office of
State Engineer Copper information
relative to the advertised sale of
\$400,000 by the district and the con-
dition of the project. The board of
directors has fixed August 5 as the
date of the sale of the bonds. Here-
tofore \$750,000 in bonds have been
sold and the additional \$400,000 will
make \$1,150,000 to be applied to
the completion of a dam and main
canals for 29,000 acres at an aver-
age cost of \$46.60 an acre.

The district has accepted the pro-
visions of the recent constitutional
amendment whereby the state will
pay the first five years' interest.

An arched concrete dam 100 feet
high is now being built on the mid-
dle fork of the Malheur river, six
miles above Riverside. The capacity
of the reservoir will be 170,000 acre
feet or enough for 40,000 acres of
land. Part of the water required
will be derived from the direct flow
of Malheur river. The dam is sched-
uled for completion in October of
this year. Only 29,000 acres out of
40,000 are within the district, but
there will be surplus water available
for the other 11,000 acres and the
surplus will be sold to an adjoining
district now organizing, thus reduc-
ing the per acre debt. Ten large can-
als now supply flood water to the
12,000 acres in the district. These
are to be enlarged and extended.
Main canals are now completed to
give a flood water supply to 8000
acres heretofore without water.

Information furnished by Engineer
Lewis says that a reasonable mar-
ket value of irrigable lands within the
district under present conditions is
\$2,000,000 based upon 12,000 acres
at \$100 an acre and 17,000 acres at
\$50 an acre.

"When the project is completed,"
says Mr. Lewis, "the land should be
worth from \$100 to \$200 an acre.
say an average of \$150 on for a to-
tal of 29,000 acres, \$4,350,000."

"The irrigable lands in the district
are bottom lands in Malheur valley,
averaging about two miles in width
by 25 miles in length, extending
from Ontario to Vale, and to the
head of the canyon 12 miles above.
Elevation 2150 to 2350 above sea
level.

Livestock Protection Law Found to be Inoperative

The law intended to prohibit the
movement of cattle across state lines
into Oregon before they have been
inspected is ineffective in many parts
of eastern Oregon because it applies
only to shipment of cattle by com-
mon carrier and not driving them.
The law is contained in section 12,
chapter 33, laws of 1915.

S. O. Correll of Baker, secretary
of the Oregon Cattle and Horse
Raisers' association, complains in a
letter to Attorney General Brown
that certain Oregon district attor-

neys are not enforcing the law
against persons driving herds across
the state line and that they defend
themselves by declaring the law does
not apply except in cases of shipment.
The attorney general replies that he
is not permitted to write opinions for
others than state officials, but in-
formally he tells Mr. Correll that
the district attorneys are right and
that the law needs amending.

MARINES WANT AVIATION MEN

Special Inducements Offered
for Men of Many Trades
in New Order

The aviation section of the marine
corps is urgently in need of four year
enlisted men for gas engine me-
chanics, electricians, wire workers, wood
workers, welders, blacksmiths, and
allied trades. Men of good charac-
ter and mechanically inclined are
satisfactory. These men will be sent
through the regular navy mechanics
school at Great Lakes, Illinois, and
will receive a thorough education in
all or part of the above trades.

They will be sent to the flying sta-
tions and receive a thorough, prac-
tical training in mechanical work.
This is an opportunity for young men
to learn a profitable trade at the ex-
pense of the government. A major-
ity of the men on aviation duty in the
marines are non-commissioned
officers, and most of these receive in
addition to their regular pay, 50 per cent increase.

Men enlisting for aviation duty
will have an entry made on their en-
listment paper that they are enlist-
ing for marine aviation duty. This
opportunity will be open a short time
only and Sergeant Jesse J. Hill who
is in charge of the Marine Recruit-
ing station at 294 United States Na-
tional bank building, expects a large
number of applicants.

MOTHER THINKS SON INNOCENT

Mrs. Burger Comes to Aid of
Harry New, Charged
with Murder

LOS ANGELES, July 9.—Bringing
with her the firm belief that her son,
Harry S. New, is not guilty of the
murder of Miss Frieda Lesser, his
fiancee, at a lonely spot in Topanog
canyon last Friday night, Mrs. Lulu
Burger arrived here late today from
Indianapolis. Mrs. Burger is on the
verge of a nervous collapse, accord-
ing to her physician, whom she visited
as soon as she arrived. He ad-
vised her to postpone visiting New,
who is in the county jail, until to-
morrow. She assented and sent him
a message through her daughter,
Miss Edna Clancy and New's attor-
ney, John Richardson.

"Mrs. Burger asked me to convey
to her son her belief in his innocence
and to assure him nothing would be
left undone to aid him in his de-
fense," Attorney Richardson said. He
refused to say whether Senator Harry
S. New, of Indiana, whom the ac-
cused man claims as his father, will
come to his assistance. New showed
great pleasure at the news of his
