EDITORIALS
OF THE
PEOPLEMr. Bryan in Oregon
(Portland Journal)

DEE, July 6.—To the Editor of The Journal—The writer, always having an interest in Oregon and Oregon state fair history, wishes to make a correction of fact recently appearing in The Journal relative to W. J. Bryan's first speech in Oregon. The item stated that it was at Lebanon in 1897. The fact that Mr. Bryan has become a national character makes this matter of more importance to Oregonians. In 1894 or 1895—I am not certain of the year, but I think it was 1895—the board of directors of the Oregon state fair voted to have as one of the features of the state fair addresses on the money question. President Cleveland and John Sherman had forced it to the front. No national party had at that time taken a position against silver. I remember that Jefferson Meyers was one member of the board, and William Galloway was its president, and United States Senator Hoar was chosen to talk against silver and W. J. Bryan—the latter then known as the editor of the Weekly World Herald, Omaha, Neb.—was the one agreed upon to speak in favor of free coinage. Free coinage of silver was popular in Oregon and was not a party question. Such leading Republicans as John H. Mitchell, Binger Hermann, W. R. Ellis, Thomas H. Tongue, Charles W. Fulton, Charles H. Carey, Julius C. Moreland, Jonathan Bourne, R. Glenn O. Holman and a few thousand others were earnestly in favor of free coinage. At the last moment Senator Hoar declined to come. No reason was given. It may have been that he later expected to meet H. W. Scott and Jeff Meyers in the elevator in the capitol at Washington, D. C. Mr. Bryan came and delivered three speeches at the grand stand on the state fair grounds. He, his wife and two children, were the guests of the state fair. The state fair had no state aid at that time and was struggling as best it could. Mr. Bryan made no charge whatever for his services. Owing to the increased attendance upon the second and third days of the addresses, the board saw that he was a popular orator, and he was prevailed upon to accept \$150 for the three addresses, to in part reimburse him for his expenses. It was at the state fair that Mr. Bryan met the "sage of Lebanon" and agreed to visit Lebanon. I recall seeing Governor Lord, Milton Miller, Mr. Bryan and family and Jefferson Meyers going to dinner with President Galloway and wife on the state fair grounds. This was prior to 1896, the year he received his first nomination for presidency.

Water the Horses

To the Editor: Permit me through your paper to call attention to a condition existing in our city in regard the public watering place for horses. The one used most by teamsters when most needed is not always accessible on account of the parking of automobiles. These hot afternoons teams should be watered once or twice and teamsters cannot afford to go out of their way to the one on Cottage street unless their haul happens to call them that way. A good many of these teams are hauling from the Spaulding Logging company and it might be claimed that the company ought to furnish a watering place for the teams, but perhaps their attention has not been drawn to the necessity of their own horses and especially those working on the hot yards. They ought to be furnished with good cool water in the middle of the afternoon but as it now stands they must wait and pant until they are released to go to their stalls. With power for pumping and the fine springs right on the mill grounds I can see no reason why they could not furnish their horses an ample supply and it would surely pay them. But meanwhile cannot the city take enough interest in the noble horse to see that if he wants a drink there shall be no hindrance to his getting one when the good heart of a property owner and an honorable citizen has provided one.
