JOHN COCHRAN GIVES SERVICE

Chief Clerk of Senate Willing to Forego Pay for Special Session

John W. Cochran, who has been chief clerk of the state senate at the last four sessions of the legislature, announced yesterday that he favors a special session to ratify the national woman suffrage amendment and that he will contribute without compensation his services as chief clerk. Mr. Cochran is now engaged in compiling an index of the senate and house journals of the 1919 session. George W. Weeks, one of the Marion county delegation in the lower house, yesterday apprised the gov-

nor that he favors a special session and that he will waive his compensation allowance. Mrs. Alexander Thompson, who represented Wasco county in 1917 and 1919 sessions of Oregon legislature, and who is now living in Portland, has written Governor Olcott urging that special session of the legislature be called to ratify national woman suffrage amendment. Mrs. Thompson volunteers to waive salary and mileage in compliance with the condition laid down by the governor.
