

ALL READY TO WELCOME FLEET

Arrival of Armada Set for Wednesday—Hundreds Throng San Diego

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Aug. 4.—The new Pacific fleet will become part of the west at dawn Wednesday when it will anchor off the Coronado islands. Just outside the San Diego harbor. Admiral Rodman today notified naval authorities here of the arrival time which is 34 hours ahead of any schedule previously announced. San Diego harbor will not be entered until Thursday morning as planned. Then Secretary of the Navy Daniels and an official party will go to the anchorage of the fleet aboard the destroyer Chauncey to officially welcome the vessels and lead them into the harbor. Hundreds of persons from interior points were arriving here today to witness the arrival of the fleet. Governor O. Larranza of New Mexico was in San Diego to officially welcome the fleet for his state, and Arizona had a delegation enroute

of which four former governors were members. Governor Stephens and his official party were scheduled to arrive Wednesday night. Naval Diplomacy Taxed Naval diplomacy is being taxed to its utmost to care for the official welcoming party. Already more than 125 persons have been named to accompany Secretary Daniels on the destroyer Chauncey, more than a comfortable capacity crowd for the little vessel. Besides these, there were dozens of newspaper correspondents and motion picture camera operators to be cared for. It was considered certain tonight that two destroyers would have to be used and naval officers were concerned with splitting the party without causing controversies. City Gets Ready San Diego today was completing its plans for the entertainment of fleet officers and men and the civilian visitors. Particular attention was being paid to the comfort and pleasure of enlisted men. Today many truckloads of oranges were brought to the city. Every man in the fleet is to receive at least five oranges. Admiral Rodman, commanding the Pacific fleet, notified Rear Admiral J. L. Jayne, senior officer of the Port, by radio at noon today that the fleet will anchor several miles east of the Coronado islands at 6 p. m. Wednesday. The announcement that the fleet was 24 hours ahead of schedule created among local institutions much confusion. A rapid interchange of radiograms assured the fleet committee that Admiral Rodman could not bring the ships into the harbor until Thursday, the original date set. The battleships Nebraska and Rhode Island and the armored cruiser North Carolina will join the fleet at Seattle. The armored cruiser Seattle will join the fleet when it sails from San Diego for San Pedro. Cruisers at Honduras The protected cruisers Chicago and Tacoma, originally scheduled to arrive here tomorrow morning, are now at Amapala, Honduras, and probably will remain there for several days. Rear Admiral Spencer Wood, aboard the Chicago, was in conference with the American minister at Amapala yesterday.

“OWN YOUR OWN SHIPS” ROSSETER

Progress of Coast Lies in Operation of Boats Says Shipping Head

SEATTLE, Aug. 4.—The problem of Pacific coast shipping interests John H. Rosseter summarized at a conference with nearly one hundred prominent operators here today, slimmers down to the answer to the question: “Are you prepared to own your own ships?” Mr. Rosseter who is chief of the division of operations of the United States shipping board, put local ownership squarely up to shippers. Should the Jones bill pass congress, he said, the Jones bill would endorse heartily, especially the private ownership section in it. Senator Wesley L. Jones, author of the bill, attended the conference.

Aged Willamette Graduate Dies in Office at Albany

ALBANY, Or., Aug. 4.—Dr. J. Lindsey Hill, M.D., Ph.D., one of the most eminent physicians, surgeons and writers of the Willamette valley, was found dead in his office yesterday. He had arranged for a vacation at Brittenburg springs and was supposed to have left several days ago, having sent his baggage and left his forwarding address at the post-office. Relatives had been to his residence and office and as the place was locked and indications that the doctor had gone as arranged, no one attempted to enter the premises until parties returning from the springs yesterday said he had not been seen there. When found the body indicated he had been dead more than a week. A daughter, with whom the doctor took his meals, had planned her vacation for the same period the doctor was away and was not at home. Dr. Hill was born in Tennessee in 1845, coming across the plains with his father in 1850. He came to Oregon in 1852. He graduated from the medical department of Willamette university in 1871. He had made a specialty of mental and nervous diseases for the past 40 years. He founded “the Twenty-five Hundred,” a local life insurance order that has been popular with many Oregon people, but limited to 2500 members.

HEART BREAKER BROUGHT BACK

Fuson, Ex-Spruce Division Officer, Charged With Bigamy and Theft

SEATTLE, Aug. 4.—Traced across the continent by department of justice agents, Ivan R. Fuson, alias Franklin, former lieutenant in the army air service in spruce production work, was brought to Seattle today from Jacksonville, Fla., to face charges of bigamy, forgery, theft of a dead soldier's property and violation of the Mann act. In an alleged written confession made to the assistant United States district attorney, Fuson is said to have admitted marrying Vera Houghlon, formerly of Portland, Or., last year, while he had a wife living in Cincinnati. Attempting, it is said, to throw federal officials off his trail, he is alleged to have spread false reports of his death. Fuson entered the army service at Fort Thomas, Ky., in 1917 and in July, 1918, had command of the 64th spruce squadron at Aberdeen, Wash. He was born in Roselle, Kas.

FRUIT MEN TO MEET AUG. 14-16

Gile and Paulus Among Speakers at Gathering at Astoria

ASTORIA, Or., Aug. 4.—Addresses and discussions of fruit growing problems of the state will feature the thirty-fourth annual meeting of the Oregon State Horticultural Society, to be held here August 14, 15 and 16. The program for the sessions has just been made public by Ben S. Worsley, president of the society. Officers of the organization have set two thousand as the number of members they will try to persuade to attend the convention and the topics for discussion show a wide range. Officers to speak. At the opening meeting Thursday afternoon, August 14, addresses will be made by President Worsley, J. O. H. Holt, manager of the Eugene Fruit Growers' union, Mayor James Bremner of Astoria, and Governor Ben W. Olcott. The Friday forenoon session will be marked by addresses by W. E. Schimpff of Astoria on the Cranberry and Its Culture in Oregon, H. M. Williams of Portland on By-Products of the Cranberry, and J. B. Butterfield of Brownmeade, Oregon, on Truck Gardening and Marketing. The afternoon will be given over to an excursion to the Astoria cannery and to Seaside. In the evening Professor A. C. B. Bonquet will discuss Vegetables of Importance in Oregon Coast Counties and H. G. Lechner, county agricultural agent, will talk of the Horticultural Adaptability of Clatsop County. Gile to Talk Juice. The future of the Fruit Juice Industry will be the topic of H. S. Gile of Salem, president of The Pheasant company, Saturday morning. Other addresses will be by John E. Grakke of Astoria on the Adaptability of the Soils of Coast Counties for Berry Culture; by Col. Henry E. Dorsch, secretary of the state board; by M. McDonald, president of the Oregon Nursery company at Oreno, Oregon, on the Relation of the Nurseryman to the Fruit Grower and by E. J. Adams of Eugene on Horticultural Development Through the Highways of the State.

At the closing session of the convention, Saturday afternoon, J. O. Holt, Eugene, will talk on The Future of the Canning Industry in Oregon; Robert C. Paulus of the Salem Fruit Union, will discuss the Outlook and Marketing Problems. Professor C. I. Lewis, chief of the horticultural department, Oregon Agricultural college, will speak on Brambles, C. A. Malboeuf on Selling Apples for Cash and A. H. Harris on “Will Co-operation Solve Our Problems?”

CLEVELAND, Aug. 4.—All of the favorites won in the grand circuit races today. The North Randall purse of \$2,160 for 2:05 trotters was won by the heavily played Royal Mac. He took first and third heats. Wilkes Brewer took the second heat. The best time was 2:05 1-2. Natalie the Great, which has never lost a heat, easily won the News \$2,000 stakes, for two-year-old trotters. Time, 2:13. The 2:06 pace resulted in the hottest contested event of the day, four heats being necessary. Sanardo took the second heat in 2:02 1-2, the fastest mile of the day. Roy Gratton won the first and fourth heats and the race, with the third going to Opie Tommy Todd, veteran half-mile gelding, captured the 2:10 trot time 2:05 3-5.

MAJOR LEAGUE BALL FIGHT ON

Suspension of Mays Results in Injunction and Charge Against Johnson

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—One of the bitterest internal fights major league baseball has experienced is expected to follow the developments today in the case of Carl Mays, New York American league pitcher who was indefinitely suspended by President Dan Johnson of the American league for refusal to pay a fine. The Yankee club officials not only took steps today to begin injunction proceedings against the league here to restrain him from preventing New York using the player, but also issued a statement in which it directly charged that Johnson is interested in the Cleveland club.

DEMPSEY-MEEHAN BOUT PLANNED

Curley Writes San Francisco Heavyweight Details of Proposed Match

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 4.—Jack Curley, New York promoter, wrote a letter here today to Willie Meehan, San Francisco heavyweight, giving Meehan all the details of a proposed 12 round heavyweight championship fight proposed between Dempsey and Meehan to take place in Newark, N. J., in December. Curley says that while in Chicago, he gained the consent of Dempsey's Manager, Jack Kearns, to go through with the contest. In his letter Curley told Meehan that he would be in San Francisco within a few days to discuss the situation with him. Curley left Portland tonight for Southern Oregon to look over a tract of timber land.

100 Farmers, Driven Out by Drought, Reach Spokane

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 4.—Nearly 100 farmers from Northern Montana, who said drought there had made many of them destitute, arrived here today in search of employment. Sixty-seven immediately were sent to nearby points to fight forest fires and others were provided work in orchards and farms.

PERSHING GOES ON FINAL TOUR

General Sees Rhine Last Time Three Regiments Decorated

COBLENZ, Sunday, Aug. 3.—From with in the ancient walls built by the Romans around the village of Andernach, General Pershing had his last glimpse of the Rhine late Sunday, just before leaving the American area in Germany for the battlefield where the general and his party are to spend ten days. This is to be General Pershing's final trip over the battlefield before starting for the United States to make his report to Secretary of War Baker.

Famous Fields Toured. The tour today took the party to the St. Mihiel sector, where the first army launched its initial attack. Thence on Monday and Tuesday it will go through the Meuse valley and the Argonne forest and through Champagne, Chateau Thierry, a Vexle river region and northward to Cantigny and the British-Belgian frontier.

General Pershing is planning to visit every battlefield where American divisions fought. General Pershing decorated the colors of the Tenth, Eighteenth and Seventy-seventh field artillery with war crosses Saturday. The ceremony was witnessed by more than twenty thousand members of the Third division who are soon to sail for the United States.

D. S. C. AWARDED “LIJE” WORSHAM

Decoration Comes for Officer Who Lost Life in Meuse-Argonne

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 4.—The distinguished service cross has been awarded to Elijah W. Worsham, former Portland business man, who was killed while fighting in the Meuse-Argonne offensive. The announcement came from Washington, D. C., today. Worsham is in a group of seven American officers and men and one French officer who were honored. Worsham was a captain in a machine gun company in the 91st division and frequently had been referred to as the most popular officer of the division. He left the first officers' training camp at the Presidio as a captain and went across with the 91st. He was killed in September, 1918. Captain Worsham served as a sergeant in the old machine gun company of the Old Third Oregon infantry on the Mexican border in 1916 and is well known to Salem men who were with that regiment at that time. He was considered one of the best liked men of the organization.

BRITISH PEACE FESTIVAL ENDS

King and Queen Cheered as Barge Slips Down Thames Fete Magnificent

LONDON, Aug. 4.—Cheering multitudes clustered on the banks of the Thames this afternoon witnessed an elaborate river pageant with which England's peace celebration came to a close. More than 250 boats, headed by the royal barge bearing the king and queen, the prince of Wales and other royal personages participated. Not since the Victorian period has London witnessed a water fete of such magnitude. In the procession were two “mystery” ships used during the war for chasing U-boats and an old sea lighter filled with members of the women's royal naval service.

17 NEGROES ARE HELD ON CHARGES

Rioting and Murder Indictments Returned in Chicago Race War

CHICAGO, Aug. 4.—Seventeen negroes were charged with rioting and murder in indictments voted today by a special grand jury investigating race riots. Which for five days last week held the south side of Chicago in a reign of terror. While city, county and state authorities combined in seeking causes which led to the rioting in an endeavor to fix responsibility, 6000 state troops, 1000 policemen and 1000 deputies continued to patrol the negro quarter. Tonight officials reported that the riot zone was quiet. Mrs. Emma Jackson, colored, tonight confessed to a assistant state's attorney that she killed Walter Hignatt, a white youth, during the rioting last Wednesday night. Her case will be presented to the grand jury tomorrow.

FLOUR DROPS 40 CENTS

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 4.—Flour was reduced 40 cents a barrel wholesale here today following a similar reduction about a week ago. The drop amounts to 10 cents a sack. The reduction came, it is said, in local trade circles, because the millers are no longer paying premiums above the price for wheat that is paid to farmers.

CONGRESS ASKED TO LIMIT PROFIT

Memorial in Montana Legislature Would Curb Work of Profiteers

HELENA, Mont., Aug. 4.—Congress was asked to fix maximum profits on all foodstuffs and commodities in interstate commerce and require all interstate dealers to take out licenses in a memorial introduced in the legislature today by senator Donlon. The memorial states present prices are unjustifiable and cause much suffering. It alleges speculation in combination with producers and dealers in staple articles of trade are maintaining abnormally high prices by artificial means and not by the law of supply and demand. Aside from the Donlon resolution the principal feature in the senate today was the introduction of a bill providing \$10,000,000 for relief for sufferers from drought. The relief would be administered by a commission. The house passed the Belden bill providing relief for farmers suffering by reason of drought not to exceed \$1000 in any case. This bill would allow the farmers to borrow money from the state on their notes.
