

"KID IRISH" LOCATES HERE

Former Wrestling Champion Decides Salem Best Place to Bring Bride

Lloyd E. Ireland, known in sporting circles as "Kid Irish" retired featherweight champion wrestler of the world and former wrestling instructor at Camp Lewis, is now a resident of Salem, and with his French-Belgian bride has established his home at 585 South Liberty street.

Mr. Ireland recently has returned from France where he was wounded last November while serving with the 91st division. Since his discharge from the army Mr. Ireland has taken an extended trip down the coast looking for a suitable location for a home, and after seeing Oregon, Washington and California decided that Salem was the best place on the coast and returned here.

On the way south Mr. Ireland stopped in Salem and assisted Walter L. Toose in the Elks-Salvation army drive by putting on an exhibition in head spinning and heavy weight lifting at the Wilson park band concerts, and by selling copies of a book that he wrote while in Paris hospital. A large percentage of the proceeds was turned over to the Salvation army.

Mrs. Ireland was born near the frontier lines between Belgium and France where the 91st division was very active. It was while in that region that Mr. Ireland heard of his future bride, then in Portland. While giving entertainments in a hospital in Paris for the other "blesses" he gave his word to a "buddy" he met that he would drop in when he arrived in Portland and say hello for him. Ireland did, but he forgot to say good-bye and the wedding took place almost immediately. Mrs. Ireland is now visiting with relatives in Seattle but will join her husband here the latter part of this week.

25,000 JOIN STRIKE

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It was stated by union officials about 1000 men would walk out tomorrow. They said the membership was in sympathy with the national strike of shopmen for increased wages and would stay out until the demands were met.

MIDDLE NORTHWESTERN DISTRICTS ARE HARD HIT

ST. Paul, Minn., Aug. 5.—Railroad shopmen at many points throughout the northwest today joined the 8,000 shopmen on strike in the Twin Cities. Northern Pacific shopmen at Billings, Helena and Livingston, Mont., and Jamestown, N. D., quit work today on orders received from union headquarters in St. Paul. Strikes of northwestern employees at several points in South Dakota were reported. Virtually all railroad shop crafts in the Duluth territory are tied up and employees on the Great Northern railway are docks at Superior have given their employees until tomorrow night to grant wage demands. Officials of all the transcontinent-

al railways passing through the Twin Cities met today to discuss the situation.

CHESAPEAKE AND OHIO SHOPS CLOSE DOWNS

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., Aug. 5.—The Chesapeake and Ohio shops here were completely closed down tonight following a meeting at which the men voted to go on strike and remain out until their demands for increased wages are met. Three thousand men are affected. Two thousand of the workers have been idle several days but the vote tonight took out every worker in the shops.

LIBERTY ROAD WORK IS RAPID

After Another Week County Paving Plant Will Go to Turner Highway

With the new paving plant recently purchased through the Hodson-Feenaghty company the Marion county court is making rapid progress with pavement of the Liberty road, and in about another week will have completed the improvement scheduled for this year on the highway to the south of Salem. This improvement is part of the Marion county market road program for which a bond issue of \$860,000 was voted by the people on June 3 last.

Beginning at the Jefferson road, the Liberty road improvement, of asphalt concrete construction, has been completed to Liberty store and is yet to go on about three-fourths of a mile, or to the berry vineyard of John H. McNary. The whole improvement covers about two miles.

With the completion of this stretch the plant will be moved east of Salem and improvement of the Turner and the Stayton roads will start this season. The improvement will begin at the east end of the steel bridge near the state penitentiary, extend east nine-tenths of a mile and then turn south and progress as far as possible while favorable weather continues.

The new plant was purchased at a cost of \$16,000. County Judge Bushey says the county will have three plants in operation next season.

The county is laying a top four inches thick, the wearing surface of which is 1 1/2 inches thick and composed of fine gravel and a rich mixture of asphalt, while the lower portion of the top is 2 1/2 inches thick and composed of coarser gravel and a lighter mixture of asphalt. This four inch thickness is laid at a little more than \$1 a square yard. Beneath this is a layer of five or six inches of crushed rock that costs the county \$1.50 a cubic yard.

FIXED PRICE OF WHEAT TO CONTINUE IN FORCE

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export flour in every community of the country in carload lots at a price not greater than \$10 a barrel, Mr. Barnes announced. This price, he added, is lower by one dollar a barrel than any price ruling during the last four months.

Using figures described as coming from the grain corporation's own private sources, Mr. Barnes predicted a shrinkage of "probably 400,000,000 bushels" in the wheat production for North America, 250,000,000 bushels of which is in the United States, from the June forecast, and a further shrinkage in European wheat and rye production of 300,000,000 bushels outside of Russia.

H. C. OF L. NOT BEFORE CABINET The high cost of living was not discussed at today's cabinet meeting, but Attorney General Palmer remained after the meeting to confer

with the president and presented memoranda stating what the government was doing and what it proposes doing under existing laws and possible additional laws to cope with the situation.

The department of justice agents throughout the country, the attorney general said have been ordered to institute special investigations to find evidence of hoarding and profiteering as prohibited by the Lever food control act, and prosecutions will be instituted without delay.

Attorney General Palmer declined to disclose what remedial laws were suggested to the president, or to go into detail as to how the department would proceed under the existing laws by saying that by operating under the Lever act did not mean the functions of the food administration would be assumed by the department of justice.

Profiteering Penalties Doubtful

Doubt was expressed by some legal authorities as to a penalty provided for profiteering by the food control act, although penalties are provided ranging from \$5,000 to \$10,000 or from two to four years or both for hoarding and other violations. Attorney General Palmer said it was his belief and hope that immediate results toward reducing the cost of living could be obtained through prosecutions under existing laws.

Secretary Tumulty said after Director Barnes had left the president that no statement would be forthcoming from the White House tonight beyond the mere announcement that the "president will address a message to congress as soon as he has time to write it."

Wheat Not Short Director Barnes in making public his statement regarding the world wheat situation said that the wheat

crop in the United States is not short and that 1,000,000,000 bushels was assured. There was no warrant, he said, however, for statements that the price had been inflated. He announced definitely that as far as he could see there was no hope for a reduction in the near future and that he would not sell wheat below the guarantee.

Figures were given by Mr. Barnes on the world price as follows: Average farm price to American farmers under guarantee \$2.05 a bushel. Average farm price in the United Kingdom during the last calendar year \$2.28.

Average farm price for four big producing countries, United States, Canada, Argentina and Australia, producing 1,500,000,000 bushels, \$1.94.

Average grower price (largely guaranteed) of Europe's fifteen consuming countries producing 800,000,000 bushels, \$3.75. Average of all wheat growers, weighted according to the size of their contribution to the total crop of the world, works out an average world grower price of \$2.46.

Argentina wheat, with longer voyage and higher freight rates, the Barnes statement said, costs delivered in Europe fully fifty cents more than American wheat delivered in Europe.

Relation Theory Denied

There is no support for "the theory of intimate relations and influence between wheat prices and other foods," the statement said. Figures were presented to bear out Mr. Barnes' contention.

"Britain, France and Italy," the statement continued, "all have artificially reduced flour and bread prices, buying their raw material at

the world's price and absorbing the loss by national taxes. Any sale of wheat or flour by us at reduced prices, to be made only save their national treasuries, while depleting ours, without any possible reduction in the bread price to their people which is already fixed."

Mr. Barnes also gave figures to show the relation of the price of wheat to the price of bread and contended that bread now was the cheapest item in the diet. If all other foods were at the same rate as bread the annual cost of food for each person would be about \$50, or a total national food bill of \$5,000,000,000 instead of \$18,000,000,000.

made but the committee majority had ignored it.

Lansing Due for Battle. Once the subject of the league had been raised, the league opponents gave a foretaste of what may develop when Secretary Lansing appears before the committee tomorrow. It was when Mr. Davis declined to pose as an expert on the subject and, in reply to a question, suggested that the president be consulted that the committee members clashed over Mr. Wilson's course in the matter.

Under present plans the questioning of the secretary of state tomorrow will be in open session and it is expected he will be asked to disclose many features of the Versailles negotiations, with the league covenant and the Shantung agreement occupying a prominent place in the discussions. The senate adjourned tonight until Thursday so tomorrow's committee meeting session may be uninterrupted.
