Objections to the appraisal of the estate of the late Mauritz Klinger of Salem have been filed by the inheritance tax department of the state treasurer's office. It is held that the appraisal is too low as reported by the appraisers who set the value of the estate at \$73,652.71. The estate is mainly valuable business property in Salem.

Another Airship Concern Files Corporation Papers

The Ace Aircraft corporation is the name of a new concern for Portland that has filed articles of incorporation at the office of State Corporation Commissioner Schulderman. The capitalization is \$20,000 and the incorporators are B. F. Brownlow, A. L. Inman, Dan Greco, Thomas Sketchley and George E. Love, all of Portland.

The biggest corporation filed yesterday from the point of view of financial outlay is the American Plate company, with offices in Portland, and capitalized at \$210,000. The incorporators are M. E. Newton, A. D. Frost and W. H. McMonies. The company will deal in mines and mineral deposits. Other new concerns filing articles were: Equitable Investment company, Portland; capitalization \$5,000; incorporators E. E. Taylor, W. W. Jordan and Ralph H. Calk. Sevier Pacific Motor Car company, Portland; capitalization, \$15,000; incorporators Aaron Cohen, W. H. Denis and Ora H. Porter. The La Dee Log company of Washington county filed resolutions showing an increase in capital stock from \$25,000 to \$75,000. Resolutions of dissolution were filed by the Linn & Benton Fruit association.

TWO NEW FUNDS SHOW IN REPORT

Items in Accident Commission Statement Cover Emergency and Catastrophe

For the first time the catastrophe fund and the emergency fund, provided for by the 1919 legislature, are itemized in the monthly report of the industrial accident commission, issued for July yesterday. The catastrophe fund, a reserve of \$50,000, was created to meet a contingency such as the loss of a large number of lives by some disaster. There has been no occasion to draw from this fund. The emergency fund is a revolving fund of \$40,000 to make possible the issuing of checks directly to workers injured while engaged in industrial pursuits coming under the act.

The report shows a total balance of all funds amounting to \$2,999,608.62. In the segregated fund there was a total balance with the state treasurer on July 31 of \$1,843,851.62. Total receipts of the department since the commission began operation November 5, 1914, show \$6,593,686.99, and the total disbursements \$5,527,934.99.

A total of 1869 accidents were reported for July, of which 18 were fatal and 1851 non-fatal. The total accidents reported during the whole period of operation is 72,764 of which 551 were fatal and 72,183 non-fatal.

SUMMER SCHOOL SOON TO OPEN

Rural Methodist Pastors Soon to Assemble in Salem for Instruction

In line with the far-reaching plans of the Methodist church now being launched by the department of rural work of the board of home missions and church extension to increase the efficiency of rural pastors is the summer school to be held at Willamette university beginning August 10. The school which will continue for three weeks will offer such courses

as religious education, evangelism, modern church building and equipment, finances, rural sociology, rural church methods, the preacher and his Bible, recreation and methods of studying the needs of a rural community.

President Carl G. Doney of Willamette university will be dean of the summer school and Dr. H. J. Talbot of Kimball School of Theology will give a course of lectures. Dr. Edwin Lee Earp of Drew Theological seminary will give extensive courses. Dr. James E. Wagner, pastor of the Methodist church at Newton Center, Mass., will deal with the present day evangelistic opportunity of the church and Dr. Edward L. Mills, superintendent of the department of frontier work of the board of home missions and church extension, will give a course of lectures. In addition to these lecturers from the east, two specialists from Oregon Agricultural college will be on the faculty. Mrs. Jessie D. McComb, state leader of extension home economics, and Professor O. D. Center, director of extension, will both give work.

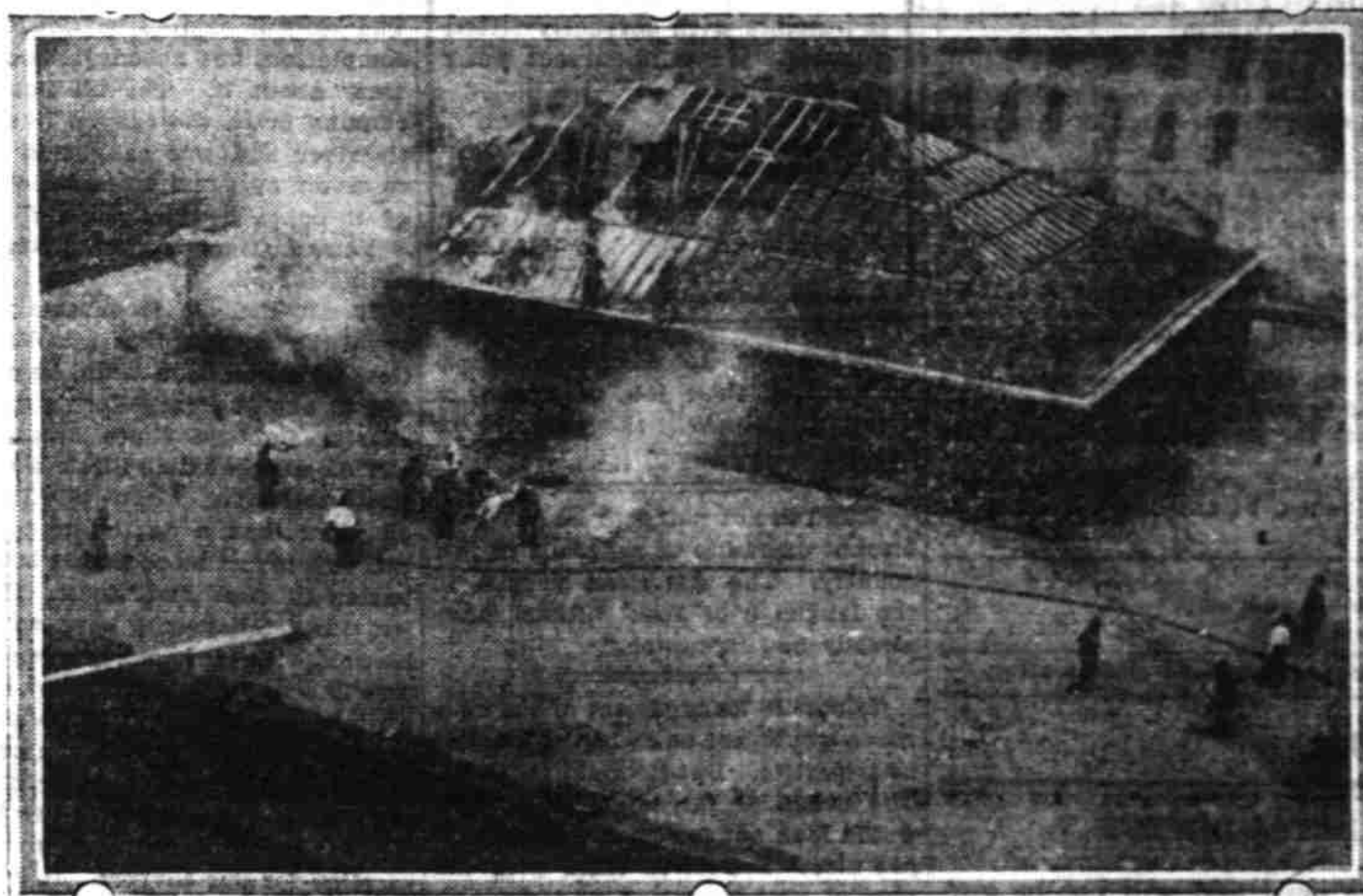
Twenty-eight rural pastors have already registered for the summer school and it is expected that 50 or 60 will be here when the school opens.
