INFORMATION IS SENT TEACHERS

Circulars From Superintendent's Office Show New Text Book Adoptions

The office of County Superintendent of Schools W. M. Smith has been busy the last two days mailing to clerks and chairmen of school boards in the county circulars giving the text-book adoptions for the next six years and copies of the new school law.

One of the principal changes made in the law by the last legislature is in regard to the establishment of part time schools. Under the old law pupils were required to attend school until they reached the age of 16 years unless they had completed the eighth grade before that age. Now if they have not finished the grade schools they must attend until they are 18 unless they are regularly employed. In that case they must attend part time schools and put in at least five hours a week in school. In any district where there are 15 such pupils the district must provide suitable part time schools.

Another change in the law is in regard to the breaking of contracts by teachers. If a teacher after signing a contract decides to break it she must give the school board 60 days' notice. The new law provides further that each teacher in grade schools must devote 20 minutes each day to the teaching of physical culture. Under the old law a minimum of \$8 per pupil must be raised for the support of the schools of the state. The new law requires this to be \$10 and for the 12,152 pupils in the county will provide over \$24,000 additional. Salem will receive \$7300 extra by this provision.

400 GRAFTS ARE PLACED ON BURN

Successful Operation is Performed for Relief of Little Erma King

So many people were willing to contribute skia to little Erma King at the Willamette sanatorium that the skin grafting operation was performed yesterday morning and the child now has a strong chance of recovery.

When volunteers were called for a few days ago people began to call up and offer skin for the little sufferer and by the day set for the operation 72 had volunteered to contribute. Not all of these were able to be present at the time set, but enough were on hand to supply 400 grafts. In some cases nine pieces were taken from one person and usually without even a local anesthetic, as those who were giving wished the skin to be in the best condition to grow and felt that perhaps cocaine might impair its condition.

Dr. F. H. Thompson was in charge of the operation and was assisted by Dr. C. H. Robertson. The child was first placed under the influence of ether and the burned regions were then scrubbed and freshened and the bleeding stopped by hot saline packs. Those who had volunteered were near the table and the skin was lifted by a needle and cut off with a skin razor in round pieces varying from one-fourth to one-half inch in diameter and the raw surface applied to the burned portions of the child's body. The spots were then covered with a specially prepared marine gauze and dressed. Four hundred grafts were applied and the patient was under the influence of the anesthetic about two hours. It will be a week before the dressing can be removed to observe the result of the operation.
