HIGH SCHOOLS GET SOLDIERS
Application Forms are Sent to Principals Throughout the State
For the use of service men who wish to pursue courses in the high schools of Oregon under the soldiers' financial aid enactment, Deputy Secretary of State Sam A. Koser yesterday mailed application blanks to the heads of all established high schools of the state. These will enable the principals to receive and pass upon applications of service men who desire to complete courses which were interrupted because of their entrance into the service. The state has nearly 200 established high schools having enrollments from 10 in the smaller districts to more than 7000 in the largest district in the city of Portland.
A copy of the act and opinions of the attorney general construing its provisions were sent with the application forms, together with a general letter of instructions covering the submission and approval of applications for aid.
'It might be well to direct the attention of these honorably discharged soldiers, sailors and marines who are entitled to the benefits of the financial educational aid law," said Mr. Koser, "to the fact that their applications must be made directly to the head of the institution of learning, whether public or private, in which they desire to pursue a course of study, and that in order to secure information regarding its requirements and benefits, they make their inquiries of the head of such institution which they desire to attend. By following a course of this kind, they will undoubtedly save themselves much delay in obtaining the information which they desire.
'It might also be well to state here that the benefits of this law are not paid directly by the state to the soldier, sailor or marine. At the end of each month he is required to render a statement of the secretary of state of the monthly amounts which are certified to him by those attending his institution and receiving the benefits of the financial educational aid law, which is audited the same as other claims against the state. The head of this institution is responsible for the moneys of the soldier, sailor or marine, who must look to the head of the institution he is attending for the assistance which he is entitled to under the law."

Portland Labor FOR SUFFRAGE
Governor Olcott is Urged to Call Special Session of Legislature
Resolutions adopted by Central Labor council of Portland calling upon the state of Oregon to ratify the Susan B. Anthony woman suffrage amendment and urging a special session of the legislature for that purpose were received by Governor Olcott yesterday, signed by E. J. Stack, secretary. The meeting of the council at which the resolution was adopted was attended by 256 delegates and is declared to have been the most widely represented of the council ever held.
Adoption of this resolution, therefore, means that laboring people as represented by their unions are urgently in favor of a special session of the legislature to ratify the national amendment," writes Mr. Stack.
A letter of the same import on the part of the Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Railway Employees of America, Portland local, was received by the governor yesterday.
A communication from Representative C. N. McArthur informs the governor that his attitude relative to a special session meets with Congressman McArthur's unqualified approval.
Representative A. A. Smith of Baker county sends the governor a second letter, a short one, in which he says:
"I most sincerely hope that a special session of the legislature will not be called this year. I am frank to say that I do not believe there is any necessity for it, and that the emergency for calling a special session does not exist."
Speaker Seymour Jones of the lower house, who expressed himself verbally some time ago, reiterates that he is in favor of a special session, and from sentiment heard declares the people of the state favor an extra session to ratify the suffrage amendment. He is unwilling to make any pledges regarding other possible legislation and again objects to the requirement that members living at distant points be required to waive salary and mileage.
Representative W. V. Fuller of Polk county says he will waive salary and mileage if a majority of the members do the same. If a session is called he thinks it should be during state fair week so that the busy period of the year will not be interfered with.
Senator A. W. Orton of Multnomah signs the form letter sent out by the suffrage committee but scratches that portion confining legislation to suffrage only.
Endorsement of the Multnomah delegation, signed by 19 members, was received by Governor Olcott from Senator Banks, chairman of the delegation.
