anchor off Los Angeles harbor tomorrow afternoon.

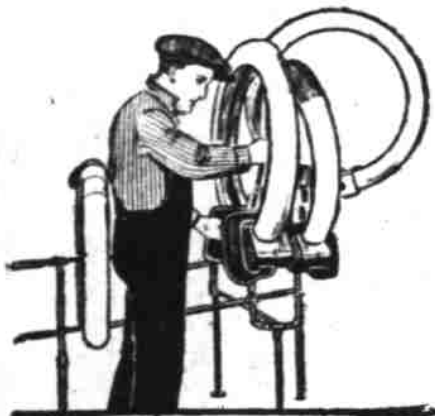
Plans Are Elaborate.

Start of the First Passenger Carrying Flight Between New York and Atlantic City



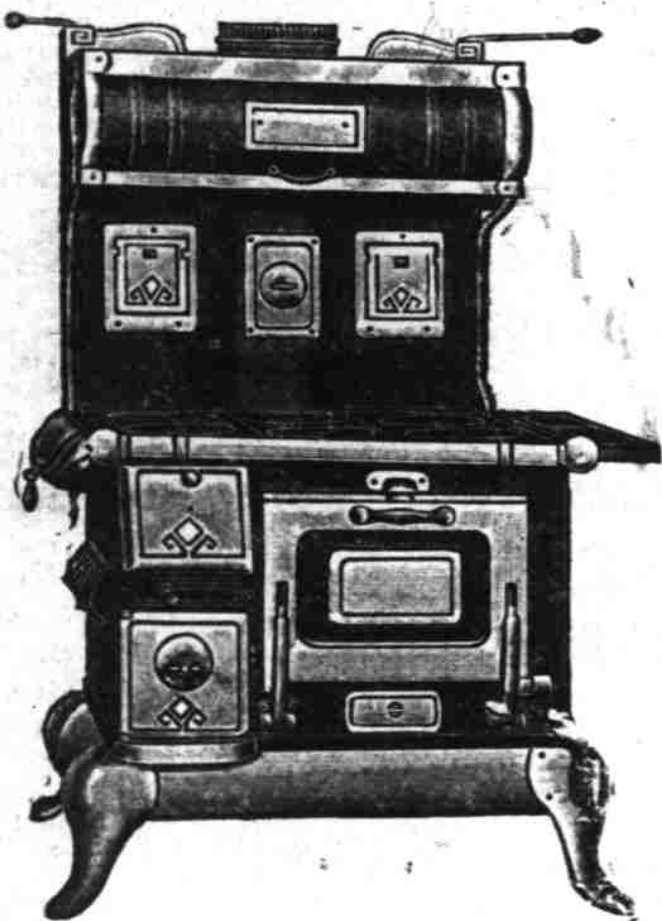

LAW LACKING IS OFFICER'S BELIEF

Suttles Lake Would Begin Operations on Big Irrigation Project

Representatives of the Suttles Lake irrigation district passed yesterday in Salem conferring with Percy Cupper, state engineer, with reference to certification of bonds in the sum of \$395,000 and the state's guarantee of interest on these securities as authorized by the last legislature.

Persons interested in this project are eager to commence actual construction work, but probably will be delayed temporarily pending a legal decision relative to the validity of the law pledging the credit of the state to pay interest on these and other bonds issued for irrigation purposes.

Salem Youth in Thick of Overseas Engagements

A telegram was received Friday from George P. Downing, son of W. H. Downing of Shaw, announcing his arrival from overseas. He went over a year ago last December with the Second division, company A, U. S. engineers and was in all the heavy fighting from June 1 to the signing of the armistice, and was with the company that threw the bridge across the Meuse with such great loss of life the night of November 10. His division was the first one to reach the Rhine after the signing of the armistice and since that time he has been with the army of occupation. The telegram says that he will be at Camp Mills temporarily, but will be sent to Camp Lewis soon for discharge.

Colleges Are Eager To Train Oregon Soldiers

Evidence of their status as educational institutions under the provisions of the soldiers', sailors' and marines' educational financial aid law were received at the secretary of state's office yesterday from Link's Business college, Portland; DeKeyser Institute of Optometry, Portland; Holmes Business college, Portland; Laurelwood Academy, Gaston, Or.; McMillanville College, McMinnville, and the Astoria Business college, Astoria.

Besides receiving returns from the various educational institutions, the secretary of state's office is receiving many inquiries from service men who are desirous of receiving benefits under the educational law.

Threshing Out Crop at Hospital Farm Under Way

Threshing of the 250-acre oat crop of the state hospital for insane began yesterday with the state's gasoline outfit. The crop is one of the best ever produced on the hospital farm and is expected to yield about 50 bushels to the acre. The hospital has just finished placing into its barns 500 tons of excellent hay produced on 260 acres. The hospital has only about 36 acres of wheat to harvest.

Marion County In Line for Huge Motor Trucks

It is the purpose of the state highway commission to distribute to each county in the state two of the large 2-ton army trucks recently received from the war department, though at the present time only one will be given each county. The counties will be required to pay freight on the trucks and the state will equip them with hoists and other needed apparatus at county expense. Forty of the trucks are now at Salem and 20 at Pendleton. Some have seen service on the Mexican border, others at cantonments in different parts of the United States. All are in serviceable condition. They are Nash Quad trucks, with four-wheel drive and as received from the government have ammunition bodies.
