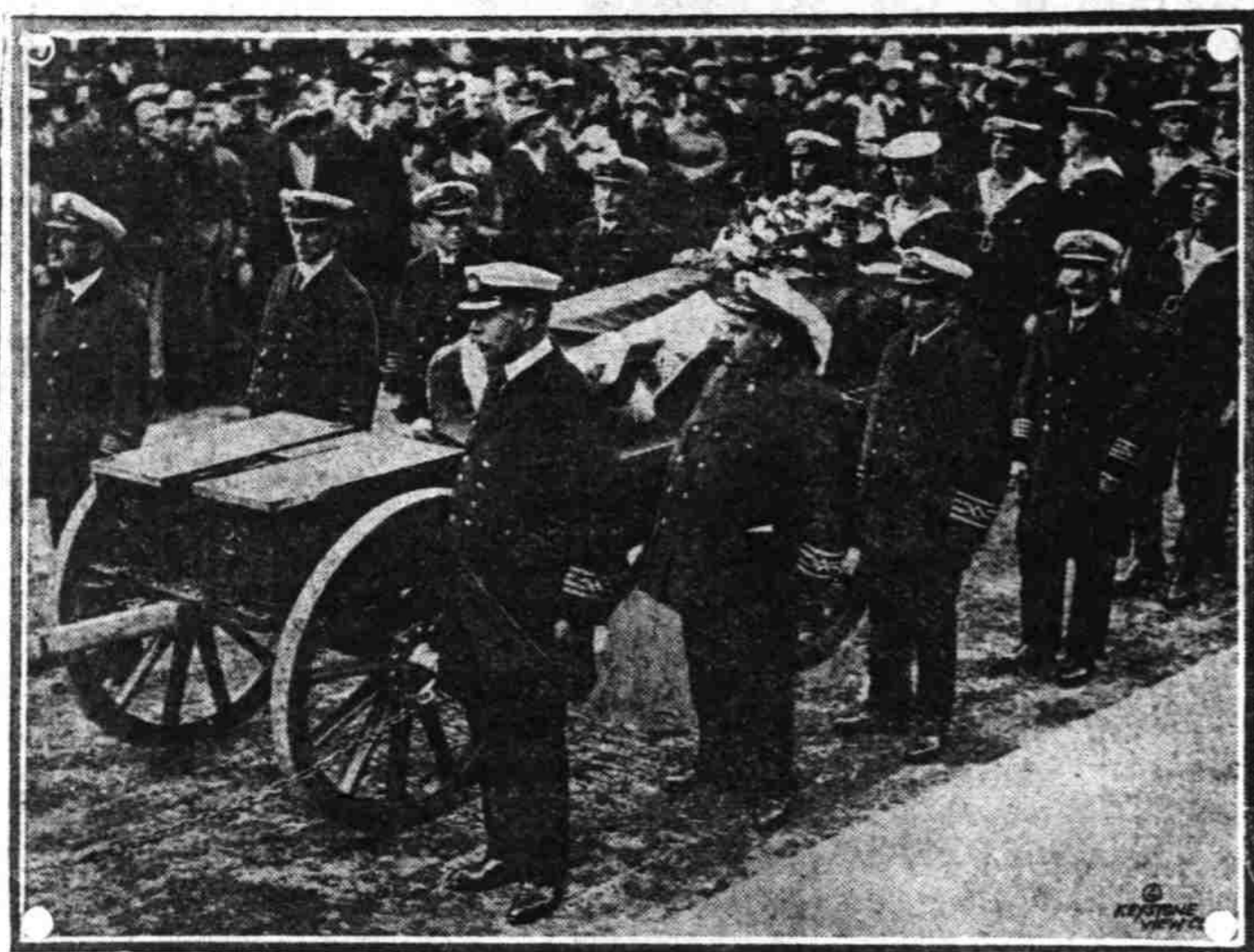


Officers Escorting Body of Martyred Captain Fryatt in London

RURAL PASTORS ARE IN SCHOOL

Summer Session Open Here With Methodist Notables on Faculty

A school for rural pastors of the Methodist church began a session here Sunday which will continue through the remainder of the present month at Willamette university. The school is conducting in co-operation with the department of rural work of the board of missions and church extension of the Methodist church, Kimball School of Theology and Oregon Agricultural college. Dr. Carl Gregg Doney, president of Willamette is dean of the school.

Sunday was given to registrations only and the regular class sessions began yesterday. About 25 pastors are enrolled. The daily schedule is arranged as follows: 7 o'clock a. m., breakfast; 7:45 to 8, chapel; 8 to 12, classes; 12:30 p. m. dinner; 4 to 6, recreation; 6, supper.

Included among the leaders are president Doney, Henry J. Talbot, D. D., president and professor of doctrinal and practical theology at Kimball college, Salem; Edwin L. Eary, Ph. D., professor of Christian sociology and rural leadership, Drew Theological seminary, Madison, N. J.; James E. Wagner, D. D., pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church, Newton Center, Mass., and a representative of the department of evangelism, board of home missions and church extension of the Methodist Episcopal church; Edward L. Mills, D. D., superintendent of the department of frontier work, board of home missions and church extension of the Methodist Episcopal church; Charles E. Ely, pastor of the Methodist church, Mt. Airy, Md.; Andrew Warner, pastor of the Methodist church, Sunnyside, Wash.; Mrs. Jessie D. McComb, state leader of extension home economics and home demonstration agents, Oregon Agricultural college; O. D. Center, director of extension, Oregon Agricultural college.

PASTOR SERVES HALF CENTURY

Jubilee of Ministry Celebrated by Rev. A. H. Mulkey of Portland

Rev. A. H. Mulkey, a minister of the Christian church who lives at 6130 Eighth-third street, S. E., Portland, preached his first sermon August 8, 1869, at Herrin's Prairie, Ill. For 50 years his service in the church has been virtually without interruption, and the jubilee of his ministry was celebrated in the little church at Pleasant Hill, Lane county, on Sunday last.

Pleasant Hill was peculiarly appropriate for the event because it is a community where the Mulkey name is familiar. The venerable preacher said he chose Pleasant Hill for the memorial because in the little cemetery there lie at rest his brothers, Willis Mulkey and I. N. Mulkey, both Oregon pioneers and the latter also a minister. To both it was given to celebrate their golden weddings before they passed beyond.

At the Kern Park church in Portland, where Rev. A. H. Mulkey and Mrs. Mulkey now hold their membership they were honor guests when the exact date of the 50th anniversary was the occasion of a reception by the membership of the church last Friday night. The Pleasant Hill event brought together numerous members of the Mulkey family as well as many pioneers who have known Mr. Mulkey since his work in Oregon began in 1893. Mr. Mulkey gave two addresses, one in the morning and another in the afternoon. After the morning service a reunion luncheon was served in the church.

Rev. Mr. Mulkey was born in Kentucky in 1847, but grew to manhood in Illinois. He was barely past his majority when he preached his first sermon. After just two sermons in Illinois he was sent to his first charge in Nebraska where he served two churches near Lincoln. At Bloomfield, Ia., his next charge Mr. Mulkey accomplished what he considers the best work of his life in the two years he was there. Next he located at Medicine Lodge, Kans., and in Barber and Pratt counties, Kans., he built a church. After the Kansas work Mr. Mulkey went to Colorado in 1874 and organized churches at Pueblo and Mazanola. Returning to Missouri he occupied the pulpit at Rockport. These are the high points in his ministerial career, prior to coming to Oregon.

After coming to Oregon in 1893 Mr. Mulkey supplemented his ministerial work with 10 years of teaching. For two years he was a teacher in the normal school at Drain and did academic work in Coos and Douglas counties and other places, having been located at Coquille for four years. As a pastor he served the churches at Perrydale and Bethel in Polk county for a year and later the church at Gladstone. For a time he was evangelist for Lane county.

FIRE SITUATION REMAINS SAME

New Blazes Unchecked in Clearwater, and on Two Big Reserves

MISSOULA, Mont., Aug. 12.—There were no signs of improvement in the bad fire situation in the Selway, Clearwater and Nez Perce forests in Idaho, according to reports received at the district headquarters here tonight. Fires are burning unchecked in the Clearwater while several large blazes are still uncontrolled in the Selway and Nez Perce reserves.

A new fire was reported this morning in the Lolo forest on Fish creek. A crew of 25 men was sent to it today. The Cold creek fire in the Lolo is threatening to join with several smaller blazes. A crew of about 400 men is working on it. A blaze at the southern edge of the Cabinet forest is working gradually into the Lolo.

Doubtless the largest crowd of the season gathered at Willson park last night for the concluding band concert of the summer season by Oscar Steelhammer's musicians. An especially fine program was played and Mrs. William Prunk, who did the vocal work, was accorded repeatedly. The Waite Memorial fountain was played in colors during the concert.

Salem Elks Will Join Excursion Train Today

When the Elks excursion train from Portland to Klamath Falls arrives here about noon today it will be joined by two full Pullman cars of Salem Elks and other excursionists. It has been reported that the train would run in two sections, but this plan has been changed and only one train will pass through. The Salem Elks will be decorated with distinctive caps and badges and anticipate little difficulty in bringing the 1920 convention to this city. A program of stunts will be put on by the Salem delegation while in Klamath Falls.

Reds Give Way Before Army of Denikine on South Front

LONDON, Aug. 12.—General Denikine's advance is continuing along the greater part of the southern Russian front against considerable Bolshevik resistance, the war office announced tonight.

Kamishin, which was taken on July 25, yielded 11,000 prisoners, 60 guns, 150 machine guns and an immense amount of war materials, it was added.

further witnesses would be asked to come before the committee in its consideration of the treaty. Some members want to ask that Colonel House, who is still in Europe, be called to answer questions about the league, but the general expectation is that the proposal will be abandoned because too great a delay would result.

The Republican senators who have agreed on a reservation program are anxious that the treaty be disposed of at the earliest possible moment and it is believed they will try to impress that sentiment at the forthcoming conferences with Senator Lodge and others.
