ACTORS' STRIKE FELT IN CHICAGO

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—In an effort to prevent a spread of the strike called by the Actors' Equity association to other cities, Producing Managers' Protective association announced tonight that its attorneys had been instructed to bring injunction suits against the Actors' Equity association in Chicago, Boston and Philadelphia, restraining it from interfering with the productions in those cities.

CHICAGO, Aug. 13.—The actors' strike which has closed several of New York's large theatres spread to Chicago tonight. The Cortland theatre and the Grand Opera house were closed after the principals and other members of the casts announced they would not go on the stage tonight.

SALAD OILS.

Until recently olive oil has been the only well known salad oil. Now there are other oils on the market under a variety of commercial names. The two best known are cottonseed oil and corn oil. While native olive oil retails at from 80 cents to \$1.50 a pint with imported very much more expensive these other oils range from 40 cents to 50 cents a pint.

Many people like the peculiar flavor of an olive oil and for them there can be no satisfactory substitute. For those who desire an oil without the flavor either the corn or cottonseed oil will give satisfaction. These two oils are practically devoid of any individual flavor. The two are equally good for all purposes and about the same price. A salad dressing from either oil cannot be distinguished in regard to texture or color from one made with olive oil. In regard to thickening power and quantity necessary no difference can be noted. —M. S.

Shopmen's Strike Virtually Over Federation Hears

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—Reports today to the railway employees department of the American Federation of Labor indicated that the strike of the shopmen was "cleaned up," except in Chicago and a few points in New England, where it was expected the men would return to work before the end of the week. Conferences with Director General Hines over the men's wage demands will start immediately after all the men have returned to work.

MUCH GREASE IS NECESSARY.

The civilized world is an immense user of grease. The United States is one of the greatest grease producing countries in the world. Every month more than 100,000,000 pounds of lard is tried out in our factories. In the month of January more than 128,000,000 pounds was produced by 435 establishments reporting. And there are millions of additional pounds tried out on farms and in city homes. This relates to lard alone; while we have several other kinds of grease, such as beef fat and mutton tallow. All of these fats at the present time bring a high price.

The wonderful thing about this, on the side of the farmer, is that grease of any kind is one of the most profitable things the farmer can produce. It costs the farmer nothing in the way of fertility. A mountain of grease would not take a cent's worth of fertility out of the farm. Grease contains no potash, no nitrogen, no phosphorus, and none of the minor fertility elements in the soil. Water and carbon from the air are the principal things out of which nature manufactures grease.

Therefore it is wisdom, on the part of the farmer, to send his meat animals to market well fattened. As far as relates to the fertility of the farm, it is more profitable to fatten animals than it is to grow them.

WIRELESS PHONE USED IN FOREST

Demonstration on Mt. Hood Indicates Possibilities of New System

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 12.—What may be expected of the wireless telephone in the near future was demonstrated yesterday when Elijah Coalman, lookout on Mount Hood, and C. M. Allen, district United States forest service telephone engineer, carried on a successful conversation between the summit of the peak and Government Camp, a distance of eight miles.

In his station at the very top of the mountain, Coalman talked for about 20 minutes to Allen, who was stationed at the camp. It was the first service test of the apparatus, which is expected to play a prominent part in the forestry work of the future.

VALUE OF BEES.

Every farmer should have two or more prosperous colonies of Italian bees. The honey-bee is our expert carrier of the pollen from flower to flower of fruits, vegetables and other crops. The fertilizing of one flower by pollen from another is the rule among honey plants and self-fertilization is the exception. If your fruit blossoms fail to set fruit perhaps a few colonies of bees would help. The \$2 to \$10 worth of honey from a colony of bees is a mere pittance of their real value on the farm. And yet from the point of view of honey production alone there is no legitimate enterprise from which a larger per centage of profit can be secured on the necessary capital invested and labor expended. No other enterprise fits in so well with general farming and offers such attractive inducements to the faithful and industrious.

SECRETARY OFF FOR HONOLULU

Party Leaves for Formal Opening of Naval Base at Pearl Harbor

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 12.—Secretary of the Navy Daniels and his official party went aboard the battleship New York tonight, preparatory to the departure of the battleship tomorrow morning at 7 o'clock for Honolulu, where the secretary and his assistants will participate in the formal opening of the naval base at Pearl harbor.

Accompanying the secretary are Mrs. Daniels, their two sons, Rear Admirals McKean, McCormick and Parks, and Commanders Foote and Hilton, aides to Secretary Daniels. The destroyers Chauncey, Dent, Waters and Philip will escort the New York.

The battleships and escort will return to California in September in time to be present when President Wilson reviews the Pacific fleet at San Francisco.

LAST WORD IN FORD TRIAL IN

Jury in Million Dollar Libel Action to be Instructed Today

MONT CLEMENS, Mich., Aug. 12.—The evidence and the final arguments in Henry Ford's \$1,000,000 libel suit against the Chicago Daily Tribune, are all in. The last word was spoken by Alfred Lucking, senior counsel for the plaintiff today. Tomorrow Judge Tucker will formulate his instructions and Thursday he will deliver them to the jury. The final appeal on behalf of the defendants was by Attorney Elliott Stevenson, preceding Mr. Lucking. The issue was squarely joined, Mr. Stevenson contending that Mr. Ford was an anarchist in June 1916, when the Tribune so characterized him, and Mr. Lucking asserting that there was no man in the United States further removed from anarchy.
