Forest Patrol Airplane Has Its First Accident

The first accident to an airplane connected with the Oregon forest patrol was experienced by Lieutenant Batton on East Moreland field, in Portland yesterday, according to information received by State Forester Elliott.

A. G. Jackson of the federal forestry office was going to fly to Salem with Lieutenant Batton and had taken his place in the forward cockpit of the plane. There was no attendant to start the motor and Lieutenant Batton started it by the propeller before taking his place in the ship. The throttle was open to wide and the plane started across the field with a passenger but no pilot. Lieutenant Batton quickly caught one of the wings and swung the ship around and before he could bring it to a standstill one of the wings collided with a tree. The ship was disabled by a broken wing.

MRS. M. J. PETERS CALLED BY DEATH

Mother of R. F. Peters Passes Away at Age of 65 After Paralytic Stroke

Mrs. Martha J. Peters passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. A. Clements, 280 North High street, at 6:10 o'clock last night after suffering from a stroke of paralysis a week ago. She was born in Springfield, Ohio, and has been a resident of Salem for the past nine years. She was 65 years of age. A daughter, Mrs. W. A. Clements of this city, and a son, R. F. Peters, of Hoquiam, Wash. and three brothers and two sisters in the east survive her. As yet no funeral arrangements have been made.

Inquiry is Made About Estate of Stayton German

With an inquiry whether Paul Schonagle, a native of Germany who said he had been killed accidentally near Stayton recently, left an estate, and asking for the name of the ambassador or executor, a letter from Albrecht Streiff, Swiss consul of Portland, in charge of German affairs, has been received by County Clerk U. G. Boyer. Schonagle is said to have no relatives in this country. County Clerk Boyer is investigating, but as yet has not ascertained any information.

The letter follows:
"Paul Schonagle, a native of Germany, with no relatives in this country, is reported to have been accidentally killed at Stayton, your county, recently. Will you kindly inform me whether he left an estate in your county and give me the name and address of his administrator or executor."

Hop Picking to Start in Early Yards Next Week

Hop picking will commence in week, and hop men report that it appears that the early variety next year will be available to take care of the crop. Late hops will not be ready for picking until the first week in September. Sixty cents a box or an advance of 10 cents over last year will be paid, for picking.

The acreage is not as large as formerly in this section of the Willamette valley, many yards having been plowed up in the last few years. About 90 per cent of the crop has been contracted, the yield and quality being very good this season. The bulk of the crop will go to England.

JEWELRY STORE IS BURGLARIZED

Hartman Brothers Lose Valuables When Night Marauders Enter Building

Thieves, apparently familiar with the general lay of the building which they evidently planned to rob, effected entrance to Hartman Brothers' jewelry store Tuesday night and carried away goods to the value of about \$300, consisting principally of brooches, chains, silverware, fountain pens and two watches.

Entrance to the store was effected through a maze of hallways, stairs and strong doors. It is thought they entered by the stairway which leads to the auditorium of the Commercial club, thence down the stairway leading in the rear to the main floor or hallway, thence through two or three narrow passage ways or halls to the heavy door opening into Hartman Brothers' place from the rear. This door was forced by a crowbar after an opening was chiseled in the door jam.

The second door leading into the main store room was opened by removing the pins from the strong hinges, after a futile effort to cut a hole through the door large enough to pick the lock from the inside. All of this work was accomplished by the light of matches, the stubs of which were found on the floor at the doorways. Articles left in the show cases and windows of value showed that the thieves worked rapidly or else left hastily as the main stock of silverware was untouched and numerous valuable articles conveniently at hand were left behind.

The most valuable jewelry was locked in the safe as usual and no effort seems to have been made by the robbers to open it. Up to a late hour last night there was no clue to the robbers.

Turner Woman Risks Injury to Avoid Hurting Child

An Overland automobile owned and driven by Mrs. Lathrop, Route 4 Turner, crashed into the letter box at the United States Bank corner about 5 o'clock p. m. yesterday broke the post off at the pavement and somewhat damaged the letter box. The auto however sustained very little damage, two small holes in the radiator being about the extent of it. The driver also escaped injury and it is said she displayed rare presence of mind for she was given the alternative of running over a little child, which ran directly in front of her car, or taking to the curb and unavoidably colliding with the letter box and post. She very properly chose the latter course, regardless of what injury the car and she herself might sustain.

Incendiary Fires Are Now Under Investigation

Two fires believed to be of incendiary origin are under investigation by the state fire marshal's department. One was the destruction of the Moose hall at Marshfield, and G. W. Allen of the department is now at the Coos bay city conducting an inquiry. The other was a fire that occurred at Bend Tuesday, and George W. Stokes, who has been on official there for several days, has telegraphed a request that H. H. Pomeroy, another member of the department, be sent there to assist in the investigation. The telegram, which was received by State Fire Marshal Barber yesterday, did not state the nature of the fire.

this season. Next year it is the association's expectation to handle 70 per cent of the apples grown between Roseburg and Portland, about 1000 carloads in all.

Because of the harvest season which is now in full blast in the Willamette valley the association's leaders have not held any meetings recently to sign up acreage in the various communities. Nevertheless about 1700 acres of fruit orchards have been signed up this month already through the work of field solicitors and by growers writing the association headquarters or telephoning in their memberships voluntarily. As soon as the harvest season is over, says Manager C. I. Lewis, another series of meetings will be held and a vigorous campaign waged for acreage. It is believed, on the basis of present indications, that next year the association will handle 20,000 or 30,000 acres.

settlement as a deviation from the traditional policy of American friendship to the Chinese government and people.

Article 10 Assailed
Questions by Senator Borah turned the debate to a discussion of the moral and legal obligations assumed under article 10 of the covenant, by which the members agree to preserve one another's territorial integrity against external aggression. The article Mr. Pittman asserted, had no legal force "because it doesn't carry the essentials of a contract."
"You couldn't take it into a court of law," he said, "and find any means by which it could be enforced except

by the conscience of the parties affected."
Case in Point Given
"But when Germany actually invaded France," replied Senator Borah, "it seems to me that under article 10 we would have been obligated to go at once to aid France."
