Ford, Fords and Fordsons—

Some of the men of the force of the Valley Motor company were busy yesterday afternoon unloading another car filled with Ford cars and trucks. This happens every once in a while—or twice in a while—every few days. And still they come, and like it was said—"of the making of books there is no end of making of Fords. For the Valley Motor company people say

they are still 60 Ford cars short of their orders. And they cannot catch up. The orders are always ahead of the cars. And it is the same way with Fordson tractors. The factories are turning out 400 Fordson tractors a day. Multiplying 400 by 312 working days of the year, and you have 124,800 Fordsons a year going out each one to do the work of three or four horses, and then some, and to do more and better farming and gardening. But the Ford people make 4000 Fords a day and that makes 1,248,000 new cars a year, by the same rule—to say nothing of the spare parts to keep the old Fords going. Some business it is said that every third car in the United States is a Ford, and that it is the ambition of Henry Ford to make it every other car, at least. So Henry can afford the jinx judgment he secured the other day when the jury decided that the Chicago Tribune was guilty of libel when it called him an anarchist. Anyway Salem is doing her share in keeping the Ford and Fordson factories in oil.
