LEGION TO MEET AT STATE FAIR

Get-together Gathering and Luncheon Planned by Capital Post No. 9

A get-together business and social meeting which will include a luncheon to be held during the state fair, probably on Salem day, is included in the plans of Capital Post, No. 9, American Legion, according to a statement made at a meeting of the executive session last night. Plans will be perfected meanwhile and the men and women eligible to membership will be kept informed of the program.

The next business meeting of the post will be September 2 in the Commercial club rooms and at that time the newly elected officers will be installed and it is probable that delegates to the state convention will be chosen.

English Board of Trade Puts Ban on "Unstable Industries"

LONDON, Aug. 22.—The board of trade this afternoon issued a long list of articles under the term "unstable key industries," the importation of which after September 1 will be permitted only by license. This list included coal tar derived for use in dyestuffs, a number of colors, chemicals, optical glasses, scientific and optical instruments, hosiery, magnos and gauges.

Tailors and Shoe Menders Demand Increase in Wages

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 22.—Portland tailors and shoe repairmen have made demands for substantial advances in wages to go into effect the first of next month and the ultimatum has been given the employers that unless some agreement can be reached a general walkout will be the result.

The demands effect more than 200 tailors working in 17 shops and clothing stores and about 70 shoe repairmen employed in the eight largest repair shops of the city.

Employers today in both the tailor and repair shops declared that the demands of their employees could not and would not be considered.

The demand of the tailors is for a minimum wage scale of \$40 a week for 44 hours while shoe repairmen want \$39.42 with \$45 for machine men. Tailors have been receiving a minimum per week of \$34.50 and shoe repairmen of \$32.05 with \$35 for machine men.

Aerial Postment Granted 10 Percent Rise to Begin Sept. 1

CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 22.—A 10 per cent increase in all aerial mail salaries, effective September 1, was announced today by Second Assistant Postmaster General Praeger, who was here attending a celebration of the 100th anniversary of the perfecting of aerial mail service between here and Chicago.

Hop Crop of State Is Only Third That of Pre-war Days

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 22.—The Oregon hop crop this year will be only one-third as large as it was before the war and prohibition began to affect it, yet the services of 10,000 or 12,000 men, women and children will be required to get it under cover. The growers report pickers plentiful. The crop is estimated by dealers at 40,000 bales.

West to Attend Meeting of Republicans Today

Raymond Benjamin, regional assistant to Chairman Hays, will hold a conference with members of the Republican State Central committee at the Hotel Benson at Portland today. Ben F. West, Marion county assessor, and member of the Republican State Central committee for Marion county, will attend the conference from Salem. Matters of importance to Oregon Republicans are to be considered.

Carload of Sugar Is First Seizure in Chicago Probe

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—A carload of sugar was seized today by government agents in the campaign against profiteering. It was the first actual seizure in the district attorney's drive against the high cost of living.

State Troops Disperse Mob in Attempted Strike Mob

HAMMOND, Ind., Aug. 22.—State troops dispersed a mob tonight which attempted to parade past the plant of the Standard Steel Car company, whose employees are on strike. Officers estimated that there were 1000 men in the crowd which formed in the parade following a mass meeting. The mob scattered when approached by the troops.

Germans Name Committee on War Responsibility

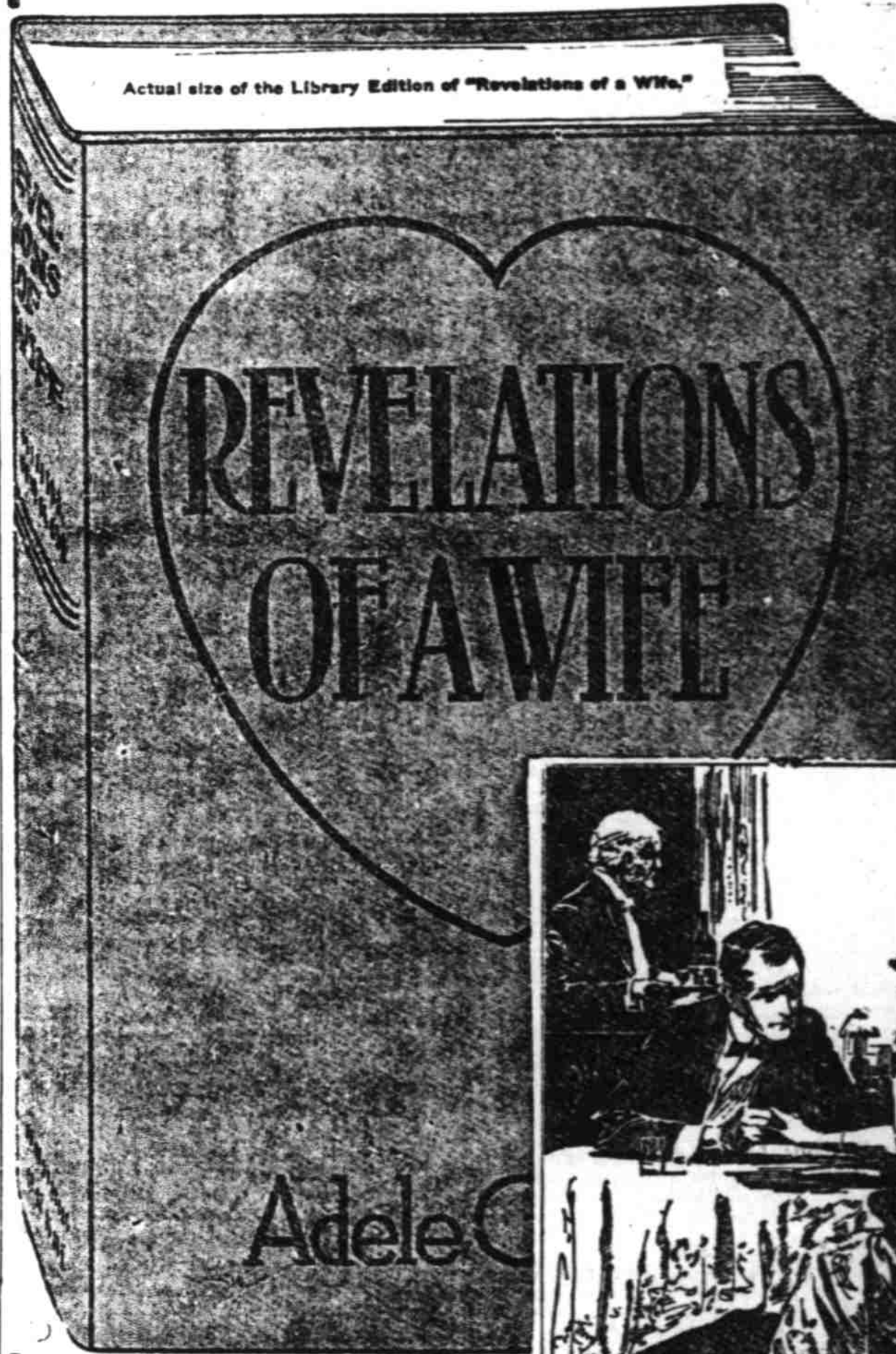

Hero of Many Battles Returns to Dallas Home

DALLAS, Or., Aug. 22.—(Special to The Statesman)—Frank Erickson of this city who left for the fighting front in France with Company L of the Third Oregon returned to his home this week after an absence of two years. Erickson was transferred to a machine gun regiment soon after the arrival of the Oregon troops in Europe and went through the big battles at Soissons, St. Mihiel and the Argonne forest without receiving a wound of any kind. He has many interesting experiences to tell of his service with the machine gunners and think he must bear a charmed life to come through the fighting he took part in without being killed or wounded.

After the signing of the armistice Erickson was again transferred, this time to the 23rd Infantry, and with this organization took part in the occupation by the American army of Germany.

200 EMPLOYED BY LOCAL FIRM

Oregon Packing Company Has Payroll of Hundreds of Dollars Daily

With a working force of 150 women and 50 men and with an average of 200 employees daily for the season the Oregon Packing Company whose plant is located near the Southern Pacific depot, is one of the largest fruit packing concerns in the northwest.

Two million cans of berries and fruits will be handled this season by this packing company; the cans being of three sizes, two and two and a half pounds for the retail trade and 10 pound cans for the convenience of hotels, restaurants, logging camps, mines and all large users.

During the berry and fruit canning season this plant has a payroll of about \$700 daily up to about October 1, when the force is reduced as only the apple crop is left to work on. As fast as the canned stock accumulates shipments are made to the jobbing wholesale centers in San Francisco and the east. This packing company distributes thousands of dollars annually among the fruit growers and farmers of this section of the Willamette valley.

Josiah Wills Takes Office as Polk Superintendent

DALLAS, Or., Aug. 22.—(Special to The Statesman)—Josiah Wills, who has been school supervisor for Polk county for a year, took up the duties of school superintendent this week. Fred S. Crowley who has held the office for the past three years having resigned and gone on a short vacation to the Tillamook county beaches prior to leaving for Prairie City, Grant county, where he has accepted a position as principal of the city schools.

Mr. Crowley resigned about two months ago and Mr. Wills was elected to the office. With this change the office of supervisor was left vacant and the new superintendent has appointed Floyd Senter, formerly school supervisor in Lane county as his successor to the office of supervisor.

Mr. Wills has appointed Miss Janet Launer of this city as his private secretary in the superintendent's office.

Enemy of Commission to Come up for Bar Permit

Lee Roy E. Keesley, Portland lawyer who has been a thorn in the flesh of the state industrial accident commission for some months, and whose disbarment is clamored for in some quarters, will be before the supreme court about September 1, with an application for permanent admission to the Oregon bar.

Keesley, who is new in the state, having come to Oregon from California, was admitted by the court on probation March 24 last, according to usual regulations, and with the expiration of six months on probation is entitled to seek permanent admission. It is required that three members of the state board of bar examiners make in writing the motion for his admission.

Keesley is involved in the controversy arising over the commission's award of a lump sum of \$4000 to

Mrs. Blanche Dibbern whose husband was the victim of a fatal accident while working in a Portland shipyard and is attorney for C. W. Fenn of Oregon City who is suing to compel the commission to take action for withdrawal of the award.

Morton Confesses He Set Fire to Obtain Insurance

H. H. Pomeroy, an investigator for the state fire marshal's department, has returned from Grants Pass where he with officials there, succeeded in obtaining a confession from P. D. Morton to the effect that Morton set fire to his own house on August 14 for the purpose of obtaining \$750 insurance.

The house was purchased by Morton on August 6 from Dee Jones, and information brought out in the investigation showed that prior to transfer of the property Jones attempted to have the house burned and had offered a man named Oscar Powers \$100 to set fire to the building during Jones' absence. Powers refused to accept the offer. Jones and Morton are both in jail, the latter being under charges.

Morton paid Jones \$250 for the house together with some other considerations. He insured the building for \$600 and its contents for \$150. Morton is said to have had two fires in Portland under similar circumstances.

Vinton Performs His First Duty as Acting Governor

The first official act of Hon. W. T. Vinton of McMinnville as acting governor of Oregon, was the signing today of requisition papers to be served upon Governor Stephens of California demanding the extradition of Charles White who is wanted in Multnomah county on a charge of forgery. White is at Oakland, Cal. Vinton is acting governor while Governor Olcott is attending the Western Governors' conference at Salt Lake City.

O'Rourke, Charged With Old Currency Theft, Taken

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 22.—Walter R. O'Rourke of Toledo, O., wanted in that city in connection with the theft June 19 last of \$45,000 in old United States currency from the American Railway Express company, was arrested here tonight. According to the police he confessed. O'Rourke is said by the police to have had \$10,000 in old bills in his possession.

Civilian Team Wins Pistol Shoot From All Military

CALDWELL, N. J., Aug. 22.—A R. Lane and J. Baker of the Connecticut civilian team, with M. D. Snyder of Indiana, and J. S. Bailey of the Texas civilian team, won the pistol team match here today over the all-military organization. Lieutenant J. A. Zimmerman, U. S. M. C., won the grand aggregate match over competitors from the army and navy. His total was 611 in a possible 700.

Bank Robbers With \$48,000 Elude Eight Posses Efforts

WICHITA, Kan., Aug. 22.—Despite efforts of eight posses of citizens and police officers to apprehend them, three bank robbers, who obtained \$48,000 in a daylight holdup of the First National Bank of Newton, Kan., today were still at large tonight.
