DEMANDS OF SHOPMEN REJECTED BY WILSON

President showed that the average increase in shopmen's earnings was in excess of the total increase in the cost of living from July 1, 1915 and August 1, 1919, due to the fact that standardization adopted at the request of the employees had given thousands a higher classification and higher pay than they had previously enjoyed.

Wages paid for similar work in shipyards, which workers of the shopmen have cited as higher paid. Mr. Hines said, were higher because the work was temporary and carried on under great pressure and also the workmen were forced to live in congested districts where living was extremely high, while railroad shopmen generally have the advantage of small or semi-rural communities. Private industries, the director general found were paying about 3 cents an hour more than the railroad administration, which difference will be equalized under the four cent advance.

Some Workers Get Rise
In addition to the 4 cents an hour increase for most of the shopmen.

the director general ordered that all freight car repairmen receive 67 cents an hour instead of 58 cents, with the exception in both classes that the increase for men employed at outlying points, where work is not continuous, shall be four cents an hour.

Salt Lake City Concern Will Operate in Oregon

H. J. Schulde-man, state corporation commissioner, yesterday issued to the Utah-Idaho Livestock Loan company, a Utah corporation, capitalized at \$250,000, a permit to operate in Oregon. Stock subscribed with which the company will do business in Oregon amounts to \$178,770. M. K. Parsons of Salt Lake is president of the company and William Sterling of Burns is attorney-in-fact for Oregon.

Articles of incorporation were filed by the Eastern Mortgage Loan company of Portland. The incorporators are L. Gilstrap, G. E. Love and E. Otis and the capitalization is \$5000. The company will deal in lands and tenements.

Resolution of dissolution were filed by the Lake Farm club of Portland. W. M. Ladd is secretary of the club.

Oregon-Made Paint Is Attracting Wide Attention

A Made-in-Oregon product which is attracting considerable attention is the Black Cat roofing paint which is manufactured by the Cleaver Manufacturing company at Pendleton.

E. E. Brackney, Portland manager for the firm, has been in Salem recently applying the paint of the roofs of the Liberty theater and the Royal cafeteria.

It is claimed that this roof paint will eliminate 75 per cent of the fire risk as a small fire can be built on a shingle roof after applying the paint and not ignite the roof.

The paint also preserves corrugated iron and prevents it from rusting. No oils, driers, distillate, creosote or asphalt are used in the manufacture of Black Cat roof paint.

The paint is composed of coal tar and seven minerals—the Salem gas plant supplies a portion of the coal tar that is used. This week Mr. Brackney is painting the roofs of the buildings on T. A. Livesley & Co.'s Lakebrook farm and next week will start on the repairing and painting of the roof of The Pheasant company's jam and jelly plant near the Southern Pacific depot.

REGIMENTS TO GO TO SILESIA

Fifth and Fiftieth Now in
States Ordered to Coblenz to Equip

COBLENZ, Aug. 25.—(By The Associated Press)—The Fifth and Fiftieth United States infantry regiments, which are now in the United States, have been ordered to Silesia. They will come direct to Coblenz to be equipped before proceeding across, according to word received at headquarters here today.

It is expected that two regiments will remain in the Coblenz region for at least a month before leaving for Silesia. The equipment given them will include field and hospital outfits and two months' rations.

Plumbers Urge Naming of Sanitary Inspector

Salem plumbers are clamoring for the re-establishment of the sanitary inspection system and the appointment of a sanitary inspector. Reluctantly they are paying their licenses, presenting the argument that the same ordinance that provides for the payment of licenses also provides for the appointment of a sanitary inspector. The license system also has been allowed to relax for the last two years, but is now being renewed by the city.

Lack of sanitary inspection, it is asserted, has a detrimental effect on the plumbing business of the city and has a tendency to allow much work to be done that is below standard. One result is a wide variance in bids in plumbing jobs and an inclination by many plumbers to cut prices.

Several local plumbers paid their licenses yesterday afternoon.

Dean Straub is Strong in Praise of Toozee Lecture

Dean Straub of the University of Oregon is one of the best known men in the state.

SPECIAL CARRIES 200 DEFENDANTS

Citizens Charged With Kidnapping I. W. W. Have
Trial in Theater

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Aug. 25.—Hearing of testimony against 200 Douglas and Bisbee citizens, arrested last month on a blanket warrant charging them with kidnapping in connection with the deportations that followed the I. W. W. trouble in the Warren copper mining district two years ago, was started here this afternoon. Thirty cases were dismissed, five upon the request of County Attorney Robert H. French and the remainder for the reason that the defendants had already been given one hearing on the charge and bound over to the superior court for trial, on their own request, ten days ago.

The majority of the defendants arrived here early this afternoon from Bisbee on a special train. One of the largest theaters in Douglas has been taken over for the hearing.

Steamer Docks Passengers After Smashing on Rock

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 25.—The Royal Mail Packet company's steamer Chaudiere has gone ashore at Bermuda, according to messages received here. The steamer struck a rock. She sailed from here last Friday with nearly 100 passengers for

Barbados and Demerara. The Chaudiere registers 2,500 tons. While navigating the narrow passage known as "Two Rock Passage" to the port of Bermuda today the steamer struck a rock tearing a hole in her starboard side. Considerable water entered number one hold, but the steamer reached her dock safely. She will be unable to continue her voyage.

TREATY INQUIRY TO BE EXTENDED

Committee to Delve Into
Questions Dealing With
All Parts of World

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—Extending the scope of its public inquiry regarding the peace treaty, the senate foreign relations committee announced tonight a schedule of hearings that promise to occupy most of its time for the next two weeks and to lead into the intricacies of political and territorial problems in several parts of the world. The disputed questions to be touched upon include the disposition of Flume, of the Aland Islands, and of the German colonies with Africa and the claim of Ireland for independence. On the list of witnesses are representatives of the Italians, Jugo-Slavs, Hungarians, Americans, Greeks, Irish, Lithuanians, Ukrainians, Estonians, Letts and American negroes.

The time to be devoted to work on amendments to the treaty this week will be reduced from three days to two, Thursday having been set aside to hear the negro delegation on the question of the African colonies.

HISTORIC CITY HOST TO FLEET

Monterey Surrenders to Admiral Rodman and Armada of Pacific

MONTEREY, Cal., Aug. 25.—Monterey, where the first American flag was raised in California in 1846, today surrendered unconditionally to Admiral Hugh Rodman, commander in chief of the new Pacific fleet, and the group of vessels headed by the super-dreadnaught New Mexico, which anchored in the bay of Monterey. They were welcomed by a great display of patriotism. Colonel N. F. McClure, commander of the army post at the Presidio of Monterey, went to the wharf to greet the vessels and their personnel.

The portion of the fleet which arrived here today left Santa Barbara yesterday afternoon. It was scheduled to drop anchor at eight o'clock this morning, but it was not until 12:15 p. m. that the anchors were cast. The delay was caused by a fog.

1500 Sheep Burned to Death in Clearwater Forest Fire

MISSOULA, Mont., Aug. 25.—Word reached forest service headquarters here tonight that 1500 sheep were burned to death in a forest fire in the Clearwater, Idaho, forest last Thursday. The sheep were owned by a resident of Washington, who, with his son, was found Saturday by a searching party with 2000 sheep, all that remained of the flock.

HOUSEKEEPER OF ITALY UNLUCKY

Life is Just One Domestic
Strike After Another
Signora

ROME, July 28.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press)—Seven hours of each day of the Italian housekeeper must be devoted to buying food. The problems of the ordinary American housekeeper pale in insignificance even with their troublesome servants when compared to the Italian. Domestic servants' strikes in Italy are chronic.

The recent upheaval in Italian economies when the government ordered prices of foodstuffs and clothing reduced fifty per cent has begun its reaction and the factor affected most is the housekeeper. She must start to market at seven o'clock in the morning and is forced to hurry from one store to another. To obtain a piece of meat usually takes two hours. To obtain bread about an hour, eggs two hours, vegetables, one hour and a half and canned goods about an hour. Where Shopping Is A "Pleasure" The housekeepers' day starts by

When the buyer is permitted to enter the store she finds inside a scramble for all sorts of commodities. Guards are stationed there to prevent any mischief. If she obtains what she wants she is lucky.

She treads over the streets a whole morning searching for the things for lunch and then, in the afternoon must start on the hunt again for food. If she is looking for butter she is usually disappointed for there is little to be had. She may obtain meat but is usually thankful to go away with a can of American "bully-beef."

Many Meals Postponed.
It often happens that her family must miss a meal but that is usually overlooked. It is too evident on every hand.

Housekeepers sometimes watch a car of produce unloaded at the railroad station and follow the motor trucks to the store where the produce will be sold. When a carload of eggs arrived the other day women clung to the trucks carrying the eggs to stores while others ran alongside. At the stores the clerks stood in doorways and handed out the eggs three only to a customer. Some customers reached over others' heads with their hats while others pushed aside the weaker ones.

Servants Are Dictators.
Servants take their rest days by telling the housekeeper they are going for a day or two. They come back when it suits them. The days of those "perfect Italian servants" as Americans used to call them have passed away and a housekeeper is lucky to have a servant at all.

MARCUS NAMED FOR NAVY HERO

Launching of Destroyer Commemorates Bravery of
Young Lieutenant

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 22.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press)—The heroism of the late Lieutenant Arnold Marcus, of the United States navy, in navigating to safety the explosion-torn submarine A-7 at Manila in July, 1917, while he, himself, was suffering from fatal burns, was commemorated here today in the launching of the United States destroyer Marcus. The craft's sponsor was Mrs. Arnold Marcus, of San Francisco, widow of the young officer.

Crew First Thought
Burned and otherwise badly injured by an explosion of gasoline vapor in the hold of the A-7, Lieutenant Marcus refused aid for himself until he had insured the safety of the crew and beached the submarine. In a letter to Mrs. Marcus, who is the only daughter of Paul Cowles, of Chicago, superintendent of the central division of the Associated Press, Secretary of the Navy Daniels recently wrote:

"The conduct of your husband was that of a most gallant officer, who, though fatally injured, without regard to self, devoted every action and thought to the care of his vessel and men."

Graduate of '13
Lieutenant Marcus was a graduate of the Annapolis naval academy with the class of 1913. He served in Mexican waters and was attached to the Asiatic fleet when he met his death. He was the son of Lady Young, wife of Lieutenant Sir Popham Young, an official of the government of India. Lady Young attended the launching of the destroyer Marcus.

The Marcus is a 35-knot, 30,000 horse power, flush deck destroyer of the most powerful build. It is 330 feet long and 30 feet beam.

HUNS ORGANIZE TWO FLOTILLAS

Torpedo Boats Constitute
Practically All of German Navy

WITH THE AMERICAN FORCES IN GERMANY, July 27.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press)—The Germans have organized two flotillas of torpedo boats since the armistice and these constitute virtually all the warships left in active service in the German navy, according to information received here.

One of these flotillas is described in Mittlebach's, a German naval periodical which has reached the American headquarters, as the Iron Torpedo Boat Flotilla. It consists of 13 torpedo boats which, the periodical says, have engaged in maintaining order on the western coast of Germany.

Police Work Done
Some of the vessels of the flotillas have been used on several occasions for police work in the port of Hamburg doing duty guarding allied food shipments to the Czechoslovaks and similar work during periods of disorder. The flotilla has its headquarters at Wilhelmshaven. A landing corps of about 360 men is distributed among the 12 boats, each of which has a platoon of 30 commanded by a naval lieutenant. The clothing and arms of members of this landing corps are the same as in the infantry.

Half in Baltic
The other group of vessels called the Haff flotilla is supposed to be doing similar duty on the Baltic coast near the Russian boundary, with headquarters in Koenigsberg. The boats are armed with machine guns, and in some cases with 3.7 centimeter guns as well. The flotilla was organized for operation in connection with the East Prussian Freiwille corps and was until a few weeks ago subject to the command of the northern army.

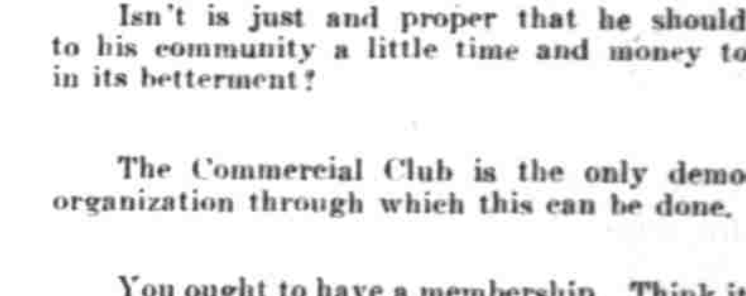
