THIEF NABBED BY OFFICERS

Joseph Mayer and Accom-
plice Loot Bishop Store
of Valuable Goods

Having picked Salem as an easy place from which to make their getaway, two enterprising Portland thieves, received an addition to their education yesterday morning. Stealing their trip on the Southern Pacific train No. 53, the two thieves lost no time in proceeding to the Salem Woolen Mills store, the layout of which had evidently been mapped out on some previous trip and made way with over \$900 worth of loot. One of them, Joseph M. Mayer, was captured. One escaped after the officers had resorted to gun play.

An entrance was forced through the rear door of the store's uncompleted annex. The work of the burglars after entering the building is best described by C. P. Bishop, the proprietor.

"The thieves should be complimented upon their judgment as to wearing apparel," said Mr. Bishop. "To be able to select in poor light, the best of a large stock of goods requires the skill of an expert."

The thieves took three leather suitcases and a grip and filled them with a quickly selected stock, among which were 103 worth of men's silk hosiery, shirts valued at \$248 and 11 suits marked at over \$50 each, the invoice of goods taken, as re-checked by the police totaled \$927.30.

The two burglars evidently left the store about 5 o'clock, for that is about the time that Officers Victor and White came along and noticed the jimmyed door. At 4 o'clock the doors were examined by Merchants' Patrolman Marr and were found securely fastened. The officers saw two men going up the alley about one and a half block away about the same moment they found the jimmyed door. To decide in an instant whether these men might have anything to do with the open door was the problem of the patrolmen. Officer White hurried into the looted building to ascertain if any miscreant could be there, while officer Victor followed the two men up the alley. The latter soon proved to the officer that they were guilty for they broke into a run. By this time Officer White had searched the looted building and hastened to intercept the chase as it progressed to Center street. This just in time to aid in holding Mayer who decided that the game was up. The second man dropped the suitcases he was burdened with and made his getaway despite two halt shots which officer Victor fired. In this manner all the goods were recovered.

This is not Mayer's first appearance on police records having served at least one reform school term for stealing automobiles. In 1918, Mayer, who is about 18; was in an auto theft scrape in San Francisco at which time an accomplice named Moore was killed by the police. It is expected that the second thief will be apprehended soon.

Lumbermen of Northwest to Consider Coast Legislation

PORTLAND, Aug. 28.—Consideration of national legislation directly affecting the lumber industry on the Pacific coast is to be given at a meeting of the West Coast Lumbermen's association here tomorrow. More than 200 lumbermen of the Pacific northwest are expected to attend the meeting.

In addition to the consideration of national legislation now pending before congress the lumbermen will discuss other matters of vital importance to the industry, including Robert S. Shaw of Astoria, president of the association is to preside.

No Friction With Olcott Declares Mr. Lawrence

Arthur W. Lawrence, who resigned Wednesday as state printer issued a statement yesterday denying that any differences had arisen between himself and Governor Olcott. He asserts that the relations between himself and the governor have always been pleasant.

"My resignation as state printer was placed before the state printing board yesterday upon the return of Governor Olcott from the governors' conference at Salt Lake," said Mr. Lawrence. "There has been none but the most pleasant and agreeable relationship between myself and the state printing board of the individuals composing that body. 'No differences between Governor Olcott and myself have ever arisen, and I have always had and shall always hold for the governor friendly thoughts. Nothing has ever come up that could lend color to such statement as was published in a Portland evening paper yesterday. Further, I wish correction should be made lest the false impression created by such statement may prejudice my standing in the community where I am to make my home and establish business of my own.'"

BOY IN 'TEENS HELPS ESCAPES

Dave Brichoux Declares Two
Southwicks Intended to
"Bump Him Off"

The 17-year-old brother of E. P. Southwick, who several times visited him at the state hospital, was an accomplice in the escape of Southwick and Dave Brichoux, according to the story told officers by Brichoux after his capture near Bend Wednesday. Brichoux further asserts that the two Southwicks planned to kill him but allowed him to live when they were able to rob him of his money and a .22-calibre rifle without "bumping him off." Brichoux was returned to the state penitentiary yesterday from Bend by State Parole Officer Louis H. Compton.

Brichoux has a wide acquaintance in central Oregon and from friends obtained a sum of \$150. Of this amount he says the Southwick brothers stole \$110, left him to die and continued their flight toward the Nevada line toward which all three were headed. After the two convicts escaped from a state hospital truck they walked an entire day, Brichoux says. By appointment they met Southwick's brother at a certain bridge somewhere south of Salem. The three went to Eugene and into central Oregon by the MacKenzie pass, occasionally given a lift by passing automobiles. He declares that young Southwick had no car when he met the two convicts. Brichoux declares he had difficulty several times in preventing Southwick from committing a serious crime, and says at one time when they were given a ride by a motorist Southwick wanted to kill the driver and take his car. When the three were hiding near Bend the younger Southwick went into town every day for supplies, and sometimes was accompanied by his brother. Mrs. M. Keeney, who helped them obtain food, is the wife of a former inmate of the state prison. Mrs. Keeney is said to be a woman of good character, and while she helped the convicts obtain food she made known their whereabouts to the officers. When arrested Brichoux was badly crippled through an accident and was walking with two canes. A letter written on the wrappers of condensed milk cans, evidently to Ed. Staples of Baker, was found on Brichoux's person and tells part of the story of his hardships.

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SHIPS MENACED BY FISH NETS

Officer of Training Vessel
Complains of Tackle
Across Channel

PORTLAND, Aug. 28.—Fishermen at the mouth of the Columbia river are violating the law and jeopardizing navigation by stretching their salmon nets across the entire channel, according to Lieutenant Harold C. Jones of the Sea Service bureau, who returned from Seattle today. Lieutenant Jones accompanied the training ship Iris north to Seattle. The boat carried 25 recruits from here.

While getting out to sea the Iris ran afoul of five nets and cut four entirely apart, the lieutenant said. The boat was delayed more than an hour. Nets becoming entangled in the screw of a boat are likely to cause stripping of gears and consequent disablement of a vessel.

The Iris departed from Seattle last night, enroute to San Francisco, where it will act as guard of honor to President Wilson. Later the craft will return to Seattle. The ship left 20 trained men at this port for assignment to vessels.

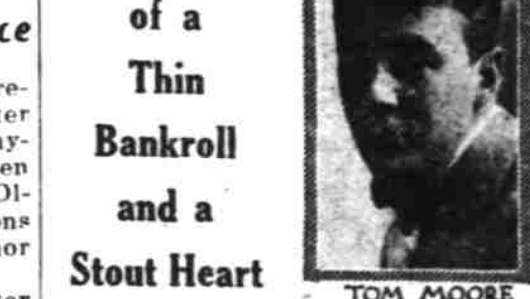

FIELD IS NAMED FOR YOUNG ACE

Flying Park to Honor Hugh
Broomfield Who Lost
Life in Combat

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 28.—"The Broomfield aviation field" was the name selected by the city council today for Portland's flying field. The choice was in honor of Lieutenant Hugh Broomfield, son of Rev. and Mrs. T. J. Broomfield of this city, who lost his life October 21, 1918, while on a scouting expedition over the German lines.

In making this selection the council also announced that the valor and heroism displayed by the other two candidates, Lieutenant Stuart Freeman and Everett Stanton (Smiley) Wisdom had not been lost sight of. The selection of Broomfield was because the loss of life in actual combat with the enemy should receive recognition.

CONGRESS WILL GREET PERSHING

Official Welcome to be Tendered Chief—Legislation
Waits Coming

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—General Pershing will undoubtedly be given an official welcome home at a joint session of congress, leaders said tonight. A resolution providing that the speaker of the house appoint a committee to meet with a similar committee from the senate to arrange the welcoming session, was adopted by the house today by a unanimous vote. The resolution will be sent to the senate tomorrow and its prompt adoption is predicted.

So far as leaders tonight knew the senate has made no direct request that General Pershing be received as soon as possible as stated in an interview given the Paris Journal by the American commander. It was thought that General Pershing referred to the desire of the senate military affairs committee to hear his views as soon as possible in the framing of pending legislation outlining the nation's permanent military policy.

HOMES OF 200 TAKEN BY FIRE

Blaze Originates in Rear of
Former Saloon—Damage
Near Million

MERCED, Cal., Aug. 28.—Fire originating in the rear of a former saloon wiped out two square blocks in the heart of the business section of Los Banos, 35 miles from here, last night, causing between \$750,000 and \$1,000,000 in losses and destroying the habitations of at least 20 people.

WIRELESS PHONE RANGE IS LONG

Conversations From Summit
of Mt. Hood Heard in
San Francisco

PORTLAND, Aug. 28.—When the Mount Hood wireless telephone station sends out a forest fire warning the message can be plainly heard in San Francisco, according to wireless tests recently made from the summit when conversation with Portland was established. These messages were readily picked up at San Francisco where a wireless outfit had Fairmont hotel.

Reports of this accomplishment were brought to Portland today by C. M. Allen, engineer of the forest service and W. W. Hanscom of San Francisco, chief of the service. Conversations between San Francisco, Portland and Mount Hood were exchanged with ease, say the engineers.

STRIKE CLOSES BIGGEST THEATER

New York Hippodrome Dark
When Army of Actors
and Hands Quit

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—The New York Hippodrome, the world's largest playhouse, which thus far had been unaffected by the actors, stagehands and musicians' strike was closed tonight when 412 stage hands walked out.

Left "high and dry" by the strike of stage hands, the entire cast, including 82 principals, 204 chorus members, 180 ballet dancers, 94 specialty artists and clowns, 69 swimmers, 44 animal trainers, 12 equestrians 44 musicians, 193 ushers and members of the house staff quit the theatre and flocked in large numbers to headquarters of the Actors' Equity association, where many enrolled as members.

\$15 HOG AGAIN MAKES ADVENT

Return is Followed by Slump
in Provisions, Grain and
Other Meats

CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—The \$15 hog, \$1.50 nearer the slender purse of the sufferer from the high cost of living, made its appearance in the Chicago stock yards today. His advent was immediately followed by a slump in provisions and grain, as well as live cattle and sheep. Meat products dealt in large lots on the board of trade, decreased sharply in price, but the smaller costs were not evident in the retail market.

Corn and oats felt the effect of the hog and provisions decline but butter, eggs and poultry in large or small amounts were unaffected by the stockyard drop.

Further Drop Expected.

A continuous drop in live hog prices was looked for by traders who pointed out that 13,000 of the 25,000 animals received at the stock yards today were unsold and that 15,000 more were expected to arrive before the opening tomorrow. Cattle of the higher grades were 25c less per hundredweight and sheep and lambs were fully 50 cents cheaper. The drop in hog prices was the greatest since 1907 and traders who look for still lower figures pointed out that eastern storage houses are believed to be already crowded with meat products, leaving only a domestic outlet.

READVILLE, Mass., Aug. 28.—McGregor the Great, with Cox up, met defeat for the second time this season at the grand circuit meeting today when Mariondale brushed by in the second and third heats of the Massachusetts 2:12 class trotting under Tommy Murphy's whip and won. Mariondale took the heats in 2:06 1/2 and 2:06 1/2.

It was a Murphy day as the New York reinsman drove Direct C. Burnett and Sanardo to victories in

straight heats in the Neponset and the Pilgrim. The fastest heat in the Neponset was paced in 2:03 1/2 and in the Pilgrim in 2:05.

Geers Wins Futurity.

Ed. Geers drove a winner in the American horse breeder futurity, for three year old trotters, Mollie Knight, going over in straight heats, the best time being 2:06 1/2.

Wilkes Brewer won the Blue Hill 2:06 class for trotters, in three heats and Little Lee had just enough to win the Boston Globe event for two-year-old trotters. The fastest heat in the Blue Hill was 2:04 1/2 and in the Globe 2:11.
