Howze is a veteran. General Howze came direct from New York, arriving there Sunday from the occupied area of Germany where he commanded the Third division on the Rhine. He relieved Brigadier General James B. Erwin, who returns to his pre-war rank of colonel September 1.

named a list of 17 army officers and 20 civilians, asking that they all be summoned to testify. In his letter addressed to Chairman Fear, General Disque said in part:

"I understand that you have stated that the committee would call me upon its return to Washington, but by the time you get back to Washington, at the rate things have been going, the people of the northwest will have been fed up on so much false evidence and dastardly insinuations that a shadow will have been cast over the spruce production division and the character of myself and those associated with me will have suffered."

Confidence Claimed
"It is here in the northwest where we worked and it is here, I believe, that we won and earned the confidence of decent men, and it is properly and necessarily here that we must see that no misrepresentation of the motives and accomplishments of the spruce production division and the United States spruce production corporation are permitted to go unchallenged and unanswered. I therefore request that I receive an opportunity to present the facts regarding spruce production to your committee before it leaves Portland."

"They did not expect or desire any reward save the consciousness of having done their duty, but I can not help thinking that a good many of them were a little bit 'sore' at so little notice being taken of them. I personally consider them entitled to just as much credit as any of us who served in the front line trenches."

30 Addresses Scheduled.
Whether the president will make speeches from the rear platform of his train has not yet been decided. He has set for himself the task of making 30 addresses in 26 days and to carry out this program it will be necessary for him to deliver two speeches a day for eight days of the trip as his itinerary does not call for any addresses on Sunday.

The president will leave Washington before General Pershing returns from overseas. He had planned to meet the general in Missouri, probably at St. Louis, but under the revised itinerary he will be well across the continent when General Pershing lands in New York.

Deer Hunting Season Not to Be Interrupted

It now appears that the deer hunting season will open in Oregon on September 1 without interference of state officials because of the prevalence of forest fires. Only one communication has been received by Governor Olcott urging that the opening of the season be held back, this coming from Al Powers, the Coos bay timberman. Because of the large number of fire fighters in the woods extreme caution will be necessary to prevent loss of life by careless shooting.

Town of Vale May Be Penalized for Laxity

Because the town of Vale, Malheur county, is almost without fire protection, credit which has been allowed the town in its insurance rating on the basis of adequate protection is likely to be taken away by the insurance rating bureau. Representatives of the state fire marshal's department who have inspected the town find that the water supply is hardly sufficient for domestic purposes, and if better protection is not furnished the rate will be increased.

Olcott Refuses to Allow Gillie to Be Extradited

Governor Olcott yesterday refused to allow the extradition of Fred Gillie of Portland who was wanted at St. Paul, Minn., on a charge of wife desertion. Gillie is employed at the Multnomah hotel. In the hearing in the governor's office yesterday it developed that Gillie has sent his wife about \$1200 in the last two years and endeavored to persuade her to come to Portland. They have three children who are with their mother. Deputy Sheriff C. T. Herbert of Ramey county, Minn., was sent as an agent to return Gillie to that state.

Dudley Will Not Be Brought to Salem to Undergo Trial

Because a settlement has been made by relatives, Charles Dudley, who was recently arrested in Los Angeles after Salem officers had been looking for him for two years, will not be returned here for trial. He was engaged in a collection business here with Eugene Houston and was accused of absconding with money belonging to the firm while his partner was away from the city. Dudley was traced to various cities on the Pacific coast, but each time eluded the officers, until he was arrested in Los Angeles several weeks ago.

Demurrer to Complaint is Filed by Mr. Devers

Demurrer to the complaint of S. H. Rockhill and the city of Riddle who are seeking to enjoin the state from constructing the Canyonville cut-off in Douglas county has been filed by Assistant Attorney General J. M. Devers on behalf of the highway commission. Governor Olcott and State Treasurer Hoff, and it is probable that the Douglas county court will join in the demurrer. The town of Riddle wants the contract declared void for the reason that the proposed cut-off leaves Riddle off

Brichoux Not to Remain in Hospital for Insane

Upon being returned from Bend to Salem by State Parole Officer Louis the Insane, Brichoux, the convict who escaped two weeks ago, was again placed in the state hospital for the insane. Brichoux is said to have recovered his sanity, however, and Superintendent Griffith will recommend that he be sent back to the state prison.

Land Bank Appraiser Doing Big Work Here

A. C. Lohrstedt, secretary and treasurer of the Oregon National Farm Loan association, reports that D. C. Brock, appraiser for the Federal Land bank who has been in this section appraising lands for the last three weeks, has just completed appraising the property of 50 applicants, whose total loan applications aggregate \$167,600.

MARINES WIN IN NATIONAL SHOOT

A. E. F. Rifleman Defeated by
47 Points on 1000 Yard
Ranges

CALDWELL, N. J., Aug. 29.—For the third consecutive time the United States Marine corps team won the national rifle association meet which ended at the navy rifle range today. Shooting at 1000 yards, the marines maintained their lead over the A. E. F. team obtained yesterday at the shorter ranges and finished with a total score of 3,329 points, 47 more than the A. E. F. team.
