PRESSLEY GIVEN
CROIX DE GUERRE

Sergeant, Already Wearer of D. S. C. Honored by French Government

Sergeant Albert Pressley, already the wearer of the distinguished service cross, was honored yesterday when his parents received a croix de guerre awarded to him by the French government for conspicuous bravery in action. The sergeant is on a hunting trip at the headwaters of the McKenzie and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Pressley, do not know of the incident for the French decoration was given. The citation accompanying the cross gives no information as to the specific incident.

Pershing Gives D.S.C.
Pressley's parents have no idea of the cause of the second recognition, unless it is for the same daring work which secured him the distinguished service cross at the hands of General Pershing.

Sergeant Pressley received the

American decoration for his part in the capture of a machine gun nest which capture brought in two German machine guns and 60 Hosche prisoners. The story has been already told how Pressley led a small squad of four men, toward a supposed sniper's outpost; and though the "snipers" materialized into a strongly entrenched machine gun position, the sergeant and his men went right ahead and rounded up the Hur crew consisting of 40 men, accomplishing the enterprise under "easy fire."

Sergeant Pressley's father has no definite idea as to when his son will return, and as there is no means of locating his hunting party, the real cause of this additional recognition will not be known until the soldier returns.

FOR OFFICERS

Adjutant General Orders All to Portland Armory on October 3

Orders of Adjutant General Conrad Stafrin, issued yesterday, call all officers of the Third Oregon infantry, National Guard of Oregon, to attend officers' school which will be conducted at the Multnomah county armory for a period of three days beginning October 3. They are required to report not later than 8:30 a. m. on that date. Cots and other equipment necessary for those who wish to make their quarters at the armory will be furnished. Colonel C. E. Dentler, inspector general of the Oregon guard, will be instructor in the school.

Officers will be allowed the pay of their respective grades while attending school. Transportation will be furnished from and to the home station of each officer on transportation requests to be issued from the adjutant general's office. Transportation will be furnished the commanding officer of each station, who will upon receipt of the transportation certificate, insert the number of officers in addition to himself for whom transportation must be furnished.
