### PRUNE PACKERS UNITE IN EFFORT TO MAINTAIN QUALITY OF OREGON FRUIT BY ADVISING ALL GROWERS

In an effort to maintain the high standard of quality in prunes which Oregon and the Willamette valley in particular, 2500 letters of advice on treatment will be sent out to the growers by all firms and organizations affiliated with the Northwest Prune Association which held a meeting in the Commercial club rooms yesterday.  
The growers are advised to carefully segregate all cracked prunes and dry them separately from the perfect fruit. The high quality product will then be used in filling contracts and will thus forestall attempts of buyers to reject fruit and will also defeat any efforts of competitors to condemn the quality of Oregon fruit.  
Contract Made Uniform.  
A resolution was adopted to make uniform the water shipment contract in order that Oregon and California

contracts may be the same. The content of the contract is not changed but phraseology in some few cases is made more uniform conforming to the document in use in the southern state.  
W. G. Allen, president of the association, called the meeting and presided at it. He is of the Allen Fruit company.

While the law appropriates the equivalent of two-tenths of a mill annually on the taxable property of the state, it was not effective until June 4, 1919, consequently it will not be possible to include this sum on the revenues of the state until the next tax levy is made by the state tax commission in December, 1919 for the fiscal year 1920, and by reason thereof the money will not become available until January 1, 1920. After that date, however, all claims of institutions furnishing aid under the law since it became operative June 4, 1919, will be paid from the money available at that time. In view of this condition it becomes necessary on the part of those educational institutions which do not have funds, to arrange to tide them over until state moneys are available.
