## NAVY RECRUITER HERE FOR FAIR

J. E. Adams Calls Attention to Advantages Being Offered by Sea Service

J. E. Adams, well known in Salem, having been in charge of the navy recruiting station here for many months about two years ago, will be in charge of the navy recruiting tent at the state fairgrounds this year. He arrived in Salem yesterday to establish quarters.

Mr. Adams has a record among recruiters, and when here during his previous assignment sent many men to Portland, which is the headquarters of the Oregon district. Since leaving here he has been stationed at various places throughout the state.

Advantages Many. Mr. Adams calls attention to the advantages now being offered by the navy. There are enlistments of two, three and four years, and in all branches of the navy service, including naval aviation. The addition of the latter service was authorized by a recent order. No previous experience is necessary for enlistment in this branch. The war schedule of navy pay has been made permanent and the lowest pay is \$22.60 per month, with many opportunities for additional ratings and special allowances.

Willamette Board Accepts Plans for Lausanne Hall

Final acceptance of plans for the new Lausanne hall has been given by the executive board of Willamette university. The plans were drawn by Architect Fred A. Legge, and only minor alterations were made prior to acceptance by the

board. Advertising for bids will be done at once.

The spot on Willamette campus where the building is to be located has not been decided upon definitely. The building will be an artistically designed structure of brick, with trimmings of gray stone to conform to other buildings on the grounds.
