Three Heirs to Jones Estate—Accounting for cash to the amount of \$2,365.39 and for personal property valued at \$17,459, Jessie Creighton Jones, widow of the late W. Canning Company Comes—State Corporation Commissioner H. J. Schudlerman has issued a permit to operate in Oregon the J'yallup & Summer Fruit Growers Canning company, a Washington corporation. The capitalization is \$600,000. W. R. Scott of Albany is general agent for Oregon. Articles of incorporation were filed yesterday by the Van Wie company of Portland which will engage in the manufacture of theatrical scenery. The incorporators are C. A. Van Wie, H. F.
