Mrs. Charles McCallister of Sheridan who has been visiting her mother, Mrs. R. A. Byrne, left yesterday for her home.

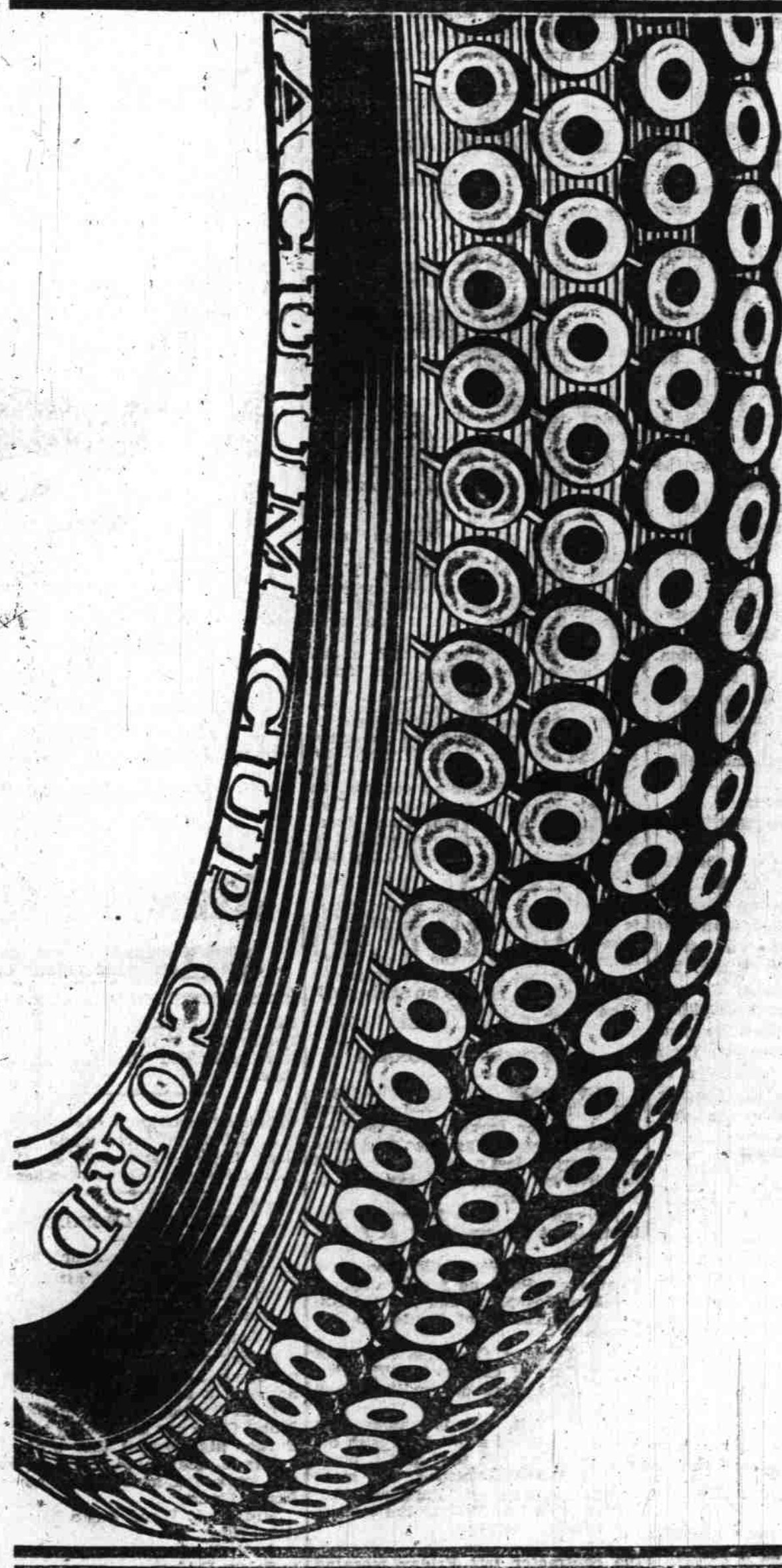

Hop Producers Sell Crops at Exceedingly High Figure

James R. Linn of Salem reports the sale of 18,000 pounds of hops at

70 cents a pound, and recalls that last year about this time he sold his crop of hops for 8 1-2 cents. Growers who did not contract their hops now have the advantage of a high market.

A few days ago the firm of Downing & Eoff sold 44 bales at 72 cents a pound, of \$6,616.76 for the 44 bales. Veavey & Cooper of Corvallis are reported to have sold 141 bales yesterday at 75 cents.

There is a feeling among hop men that the high price is temporary since both the British and German producers will be in the field again soon.
