**Appraisers Make Report**—  
Appraisers of the estate of Margaret Minzenmier reported on the value of the real property of the estate yesterday. The report is signed by Albert P. Waller, Albert G. Stith and Joseph M. Wirth. **Suit of Three-Cornered**—  
A three-cornered tangle at law is revealed in the suit of Albert Egan vs. Laura W. Krebs, E. A. Harris and Robert Hackett. A decision is desired by the plaintiff as to whether Laura Krebs or Harris and Hackett are the owners of a crop produced on land leased by Egan from the first named defendant and later purchased by the last two mentioned defendants in a mortgage satisfaction sale.

Mr. Egan leased the 150-acre farm from Laura Krebs in October, 1918, and harvested a crop, one-third of which is claimed by both the former owner of the farm and by the present owners who purchased the place in January, 1919. Plaintiff states in his petition that he is ready to deliver the share of the crop in question to the rightful owners but does not wish to become involved in litigation without legal settlement of the situation. The crop involved consists of about 800 sacks of oats, 38 sacks of wheat, 18 tons of hay and 544 sacks of wheat.

The weekly report of the state industrial accident commission, issued yesterday, shows that for the week ending October 2 there were two fatal accidents out of a total of 588 industrial casualties in the state. The fatal cases were: Carl Peterson, Vancouver, Wash., construction worker, and James H. Anderson, Bandon, logger. Of the total number of accidents reported for the week 555 were subject to the provisions of the workmen's compensation act, 21 were from firms and corporations that have rejected the provisions of the act and 12 were from public utility corporations not subject to the act.
