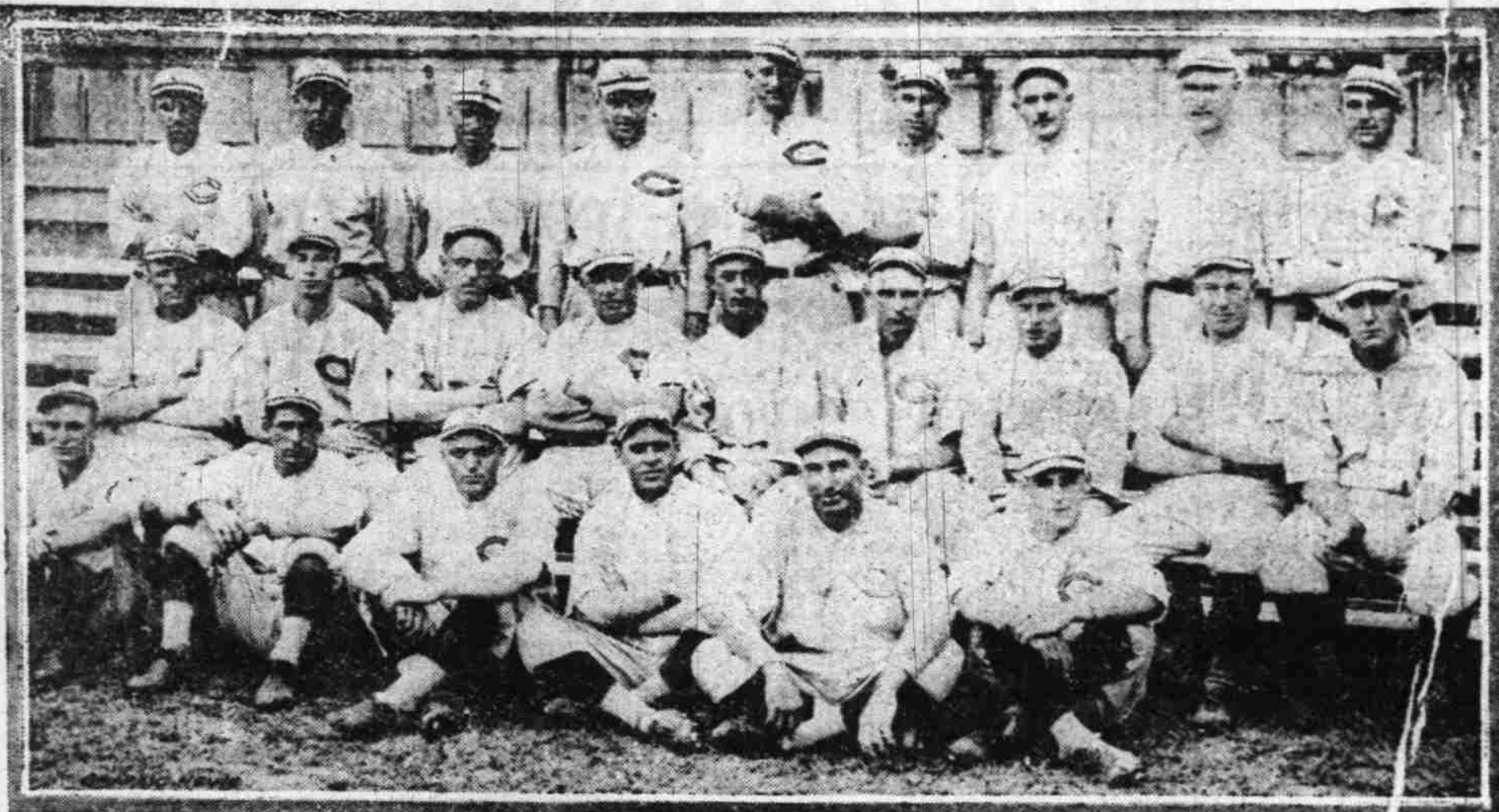


National League Champions Cincinnati Fans Are Betting Will Win World's Series

SOX WIN IN TENTH BY SCORE OF 5 TO 4

rounds, in the course of which four Redlegs crossed the plate. In the fifth, however, the Sox turned two passes and a single into a tally, and in the sixth two doubles and two singles were the major factors in the three runs which tied the score. To Buck Weaver, sterling third base man, who wielded a mighty stick in the game, fell the distinction of recording the winning run in the tenth. He was the first man up and doubled to center, his second two-sacker of the game. The partisan crowd became hushed, and then began to chant encouragement to Ring, who had displaced Reuther as pitcher for the Reds.

Jackson tried a bunt and missed, but on a second attempt the ball dribbled a few feet down the third base line and while the ball was perfectly fielded, Jackson crossed

the initial sack with thee to spare. Weaver, landing on third, Felsch, who had delivered a double in the sixth, struck out, but Gandil, who had previously delivered nothing, singled and Weaver scored.

Games 4 and 2.
In their half of the tenth the Reds went out in order and the day then closed with the series standing four victories for Cincinnati and two for Chicago.

The Cincinnati team entered the field confident that they had so drubbed the visitors that the last ounce of fight had departed from them. The latter, however, had been hauled over the coals in unmistakable fashion by Manager Gleason during the forenoon and they came on the field looking desperate rather than hopeful. Dutch Reuther, who became a local idol by his great pitching and perfect batting in the first game of the series, in which Chicago was humiliated 9 to 1, trotted out to deliver the coup de grace to the American leaguers. The crowd gave him a rousing welcome, but although he held his adversaries hitless during the first three innings experts noted that the Sox were slugging them savagely into the outfield, or sizzling them down the foul lines in a way that was not present in the first game. There were none out in the sixth when Manager Moran, more in sorrow than in anger, beckoned him to the bench and Jim Ring, a right hander who pitched the Reds to a 2 to 0 victory at Chicago, was called on to save the day. He was wild but effective until the tenth, aided by some sparkling fielding.

Kerr Saves Day.
Dick Kerr, who pitched Chicago's only previous victory, a 3 to 0 shut-out at Chicago, was again called on by Manager Gleason, and although eleven hits were registered against him, he was study in the pinches and kept them well scattered, save for his two bad innings.

Ray Schalk, who was banished yesterday, was back in the catcher's box, and J. Collins started the game in right field for the Sox, but was displaced in the seventh by Liebold, as Ring, a right hander was pitching.

Today's Pitchers Uncertain.
Pitching selections for the seventh game of the world's series scheduled for Redland field tomorrow were shrouded in uncertainty tonight but it was generally believed that Manager Gleason of the Sox would send Eddie Cicotte, although beaten twice, against the Reds in a determined effort to again turn the tide of defeat.

"Slim" Sallee, who defeated the Sox 4 to 2 in the second game of the series, probably will be Manager Moran's choice, although he thought he may decide to give Lique, the Cuban twirler, a chance to face the Chicagoans. Sallee was battered hard in the second game, the Sox getting 10 hits but only succeeded in scoring two runs.

At each station along the way school children cheered the train as it went by. At Toledo the royal party was driven to the museum of art, where there was an address of welcome by Mayor Cornell Schreiber, a brief response by Albert and a few words of greeting to his townsmen by Brand Whitlock, American ambassador to Belgium.

Queen is Delighted.
While their majesties were receiving the committee appointed to welcome, three girls, the oldest about eight and the youngest not more than three, presented the queen with flowers.

Queen Elizabeth is enchanted with America and the experiences she has had since coming here. King Albert is losing no opportunity to absorb information. His train was parked for seven hours early today at a water station called Amboy on the outskirts of Connecticut. It was guarded by 14 state department agents and detectives. About 5 o'clock a railroad detective reported to Passenger Representative Blosser that a man unknown to him had emerged from the royal car. It was a little more than daylight and Blosser had visions of anarchists. He

and his men dashed madly down the tracks and encountered his majesty strolling calmly along smoking a cigar. Immediately he began firing a volley of questions at Blosser.

have passed, bringing affairs back to a normal status.

Ex-Secretary Oscar B. Gingrich was unable to attend, but Louis H. Compton, who was in charge prior to his departure for service in France, told a few of his famous yarns and added to the merriment of the evening.

Colonel Carrie Abrams expressed the sentiment of every Salem ex-service man when he alluded to the satisfaction of being home and in Salem once more. Colonel Abrams made some strong statements in commenting upon the world-wide accomplishments of the organization, referring to the association's war activities as the most successful kind act in the world's history, and said that the Y. M. C. A. is surpassed only by the American government in strength and field of endeavor in combatting with the problems of war and of peace.

Secretary W. A. Walters, who is in charge of the county work of the association, spoke of the interest given to the work by Marion county towns, and of the interest manifested, especially in athletics. Secretary Walters said that a valley ball team was being organized by the business men of Woodburn and that the Salem business men's team will soon be challenged for a county tournament.

Making general reference to the success of the work of the "Y" among enlisted men at home and in the cities and camps in France, Will Carver, who served at Brest, expressed sentiment of optimism as to the growth of the work, not only in America but throughout the world. The congested condition at Brest and the efforts of the Y. M. C. A. to provide sufficient food and entertainment for the soldiers under the greatest difficulty as to obtaining building material and supplies were described by Mr. Carver.

W. L. Staley was chairman of the festivities and introduced the different speakers. The women's swimming and gymnasium classes start

tomorrow and will be held at 10 a. m. and 7:30 p. m. each Wednesday. The juniors will meet Monday and Thursday night and the boys' classes will be held Tuesday and Friday nights. Other classes will meet nightly at the association class rooms. A complete program will be announced later.

dealing with the history and early life of the Pacific Northwest. The commission authorized Miss Marvin to collaborate with the Pacific Northwest Library association in the republication of a list of all books of this character, showing in what libraries or in the hands of what persons they are located. Several interesting, and some rare western books recently have been added to the Oregon library. Miss Marvin told the commission, among others a copy of the Memoirs of John C. Fremont which was once owned by Joaquin Miller and which was given to the poet to Judge of B. Watson of Ashland. Judge Watson has made the gift to the state library. Another volume prized highly is a history of the fur trade of the Pacific northwest.

Numerous Books Added.
Figures presented by Miss Marvin showed that more than 10,000 books have been added to the Oregon library in the last year and that 9897 of them have been catalogued.

Miss Marvin was granted four months' leave of absence without pay and she will spend this time on a tour of the oriental countries. During her absence Miss Maud Macpherson of Seattle will fill the position of state librarian temporarily. Miss Macpherson has arrived in Salem.

FAKE OIL MEN ARE CONVICTED

Green and Son Go to Federal Prison After Fight Against Them

After an unrelenting fight by the vigilance committee of the Associated Advertiser clubs of the World and others in the prosecution of fake oil companies, Elsworth J. Green and his son, E. H. Green have been convicted in federal court in Oklahoma and sentenced each to five years in the federal prison at Fort Leavenworth, Kan. They were the moving spirits in the Great Western Guarantee Investment company, an alleged fake oil company of Oklahoma. H. J. Schulerman, state corporation commissioner, has been apprised of the conviction in a circular issued by the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World.

As officers of the Great Western Guarantee Investment company the two Greens operated a clever resale game in which the original sale price of stock was \$1 a share. The subscription contract provided that at the end of six months they would resell the stock at a figure to net the investor \$2 a share. As the date drew near for the company to comply with its resale agreement stockholders were advised that the price had jumped to \$5 a share. The circular states that the purpose of this was obvious, that any person buying at \$1 a share would not sell for \$2 if the stock were worth \$5. Refusals to sell at \$2 freed the company of its contract obligations and netted immense returns on the original sales of stock, the actual value of which was negligible. Hundreds of stock buyers were bilked and many salesmen became wealthy.

Eager to Shoot Birds, He Forgot His License

Recently a man rushed excitedly into one of the local hunting license bureaus and put in a hurry call for a gunning permit. The sportsman told the story on himself. He said the tales of large game bags, particularly of Chinese pheasants, had so fired him with ambition that he had taken out the old shotgun on the day following the opening of the season and had actually bagged two birds and was aiming at a third when it suddenly came to him that he had neglected to get the necessary license.
