ESTATE TAXES SHOW GROWTH

State Treasurer Hoff Issues Statement on Inheritance Statute

A statement issued by the inheritance tax department of the state treasurer's office yesterday shows that from the time the present law became operative in October, 1917, up to September 30, a total of \$271,724.48 has actually been received in inheritance taxes. This is \$213,495.19 for 1919 and \$58,229.29 for 1918. Marion county contributed \$11,148.18 this year and \$1091.93 in 1918.

1918, Polk county \$216.60 this year and \$945.25 last year.

However in addition to the amount for 1919 the sum of \$265,643.29 has been tendered by several estates in payment of taxes, it is said, but this amount has not been officially recouped because the estates are in process of investigation. The total sum received at the treasurer's office in payment of inheritance taxes for 1919 is \$479,138.39 as against the \$58,229.38 for last year.

"It is the policy of this office," said a statement by the treasurer today, "to examine and investigate each estate to the end that the inheritance tax to be paid by each estate shall be based upon the full and true value instead of an uncertain and arbitrary value placed upon the estate by interested appraisers who invariably appraise the estates too low."
