## LIBERTY SCHOOL FORGES AHEAD

**Additions Made to Curriculum—Hallowe'en Social Much Enjoyed**

Similar to city systems, Liberty school is now privileged to have departmental work in art, music, business, penmanship and gymnasium, which includes folk dancing and military drill.

Miss Parkhurst, teaches art for the entire school and gymnasium for the girls two days in each subject each week. Miss Hastings instructs for intermediate up in music three days a week. Mr. Webb, alternates daily between intermediate and advanced grades in business penmanship. Also he gives military drill to all boys above the fourth grade twice a week. Such a plan has given a variety to the work, and creates much interest besides permitting specialized effort in certain subjects.

Those of Liberty community brought refreshments to the hall, and gathered for a social time Friday evening, October 31, 1919. Following many delightful games entered into with a zest by the young people, supper was served in one general spread. The Hallowe'en spirit was there among the grown-ups as well as the young. **Enrollment Grows**

Liberty has enrolled 36 pupils in primary, 40 in intermediate and 26 in advanced making a total of 102. A few families have left the community since last year but many more have moved in.

The movement is in line with resolutions adopted in practically every grange in the county and an effort is being made to have the new agent on hand by the first of the year.

"Uncle Sam" Hampton, speaker for the farm bureau, who has been holding meetings throughout the county during the past two weeks, strongly urges upon the farmers the advisability of seeking an agricultural agent to assist them in their troubles. A petition will probably be presented at a meeting of the county court next week for the employment of an agent.
