

NON-CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIP IS KEPT IN SALEM

Willamette Takes Stubbornly Fought Game From Pacific by 12-0 Score

TWO TOUCHDOWNS MADE

Captured Student From Forest Grove Heads Procession Down Town

In a hard fought football game on Sweetland field yesterday afternoon the Willamette university eleven won a 12-0 victory from Pacific university, and captured the non-conference championship. The game was close from start to finish and at on time was victory certain for the Bearcats. Both touchdowns were made in the

second quarter, the first ball being carried over by Dimick and the second by Raley. Dimick failed to boot the ball over the post either time. Several times during the game Pacific was within a few yards of the goal but was unable to break through the Methodist's line for a touchdown. E. Wolf and Stanley were star players for Pacific, the former's ability to make yardage and the latter's punting making it difficult for Willamette to get ahead. Several of Willamette's star play-cific was within a few yards of the goal of the effects of last Saturday's game with Chemawa. Quarterback Irvine was taken out of the game at the beginning of the second quarter, and Tobie and Brown were out of form. Miles was kept out of the game altogether with the infected foot which has been bothering him for the last two weeks. Both teams showed an over abundance of weight, and even though P. 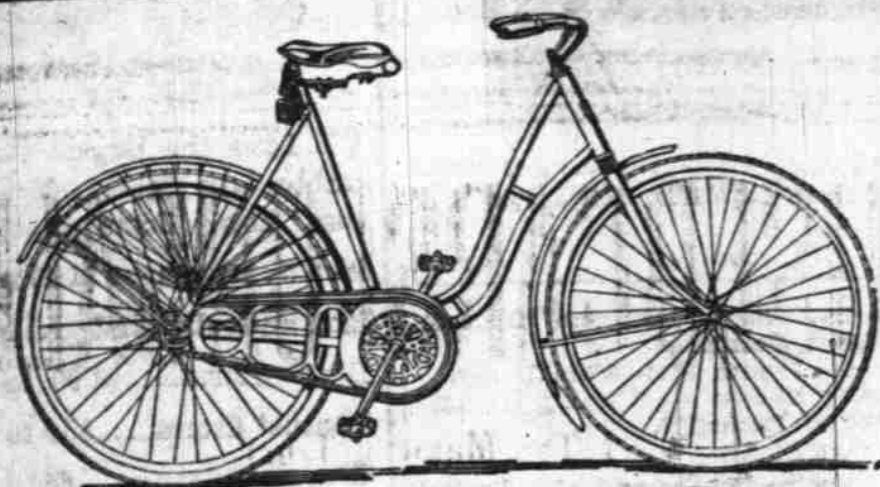
