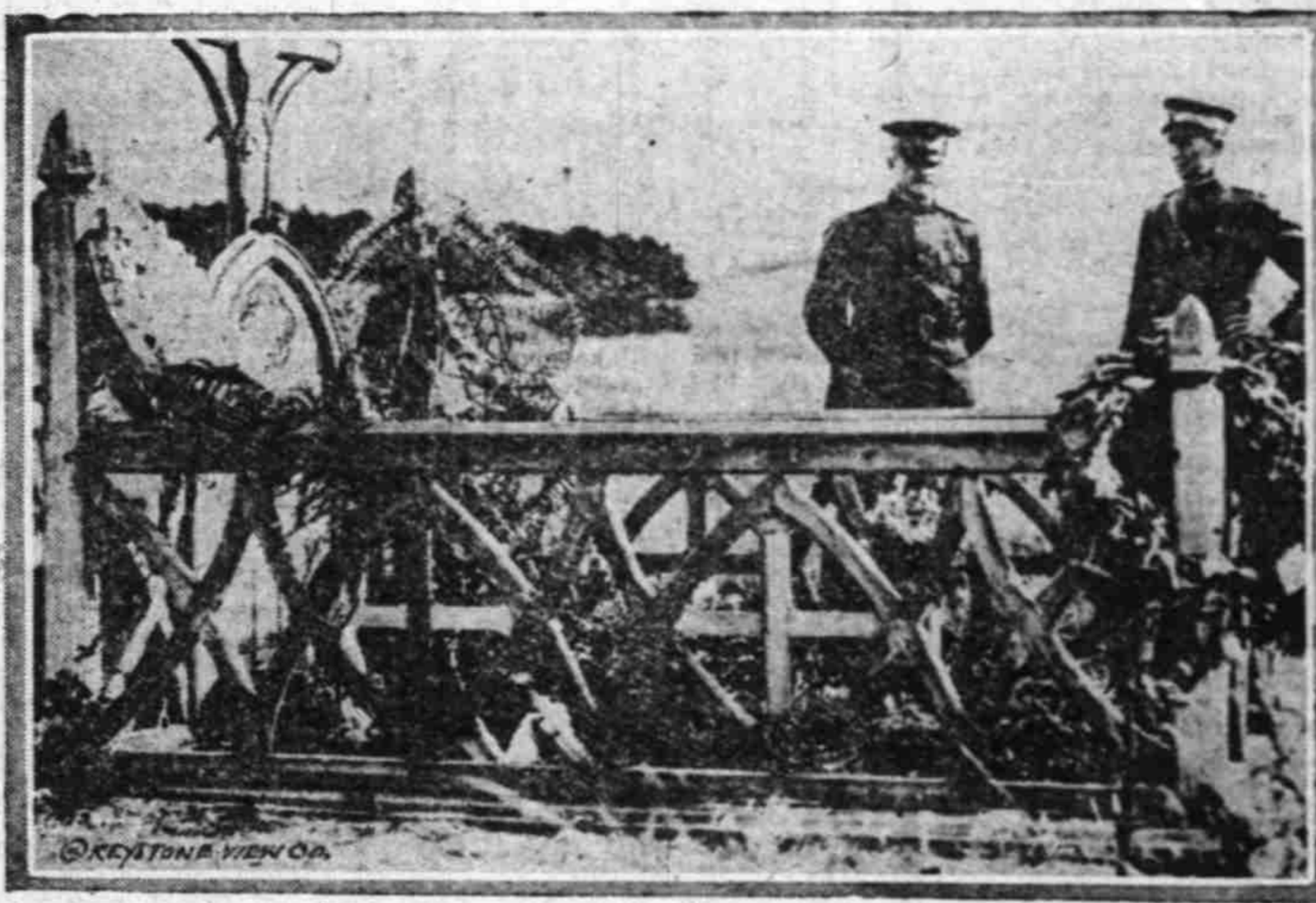
Away back in 1914 they produced their first show, which proved a success far beyond their expectations. Each succeeding administration has
