DRAWS NUMBER 1

First 1920 License Tags Are Assigned by Drawing at State House

H. Lee Noe of Vale, Malheur county, has a Chevrolet automobile that will carry license No. 1 throughout the year 1920. That number was drawn for Mr. Noe yesterday at the secretary of state's office when more than 3000 applicants were assigned their numbers. No. 2 goes to C. O. Johnson, 167 East Fifteenth street, Portland. No. 23, the "skidoo" figure was drawn by J. C. Spickelmier, 1012 Tenino avenue, Portland, and 348, the famous Doc Yak number of the funny pages goes to Y. Nigaski of Rowena. M. D. Lingo of Junction City draws No. 100.

The drawing was in accordance with the usual custom for drawing for the assignment of numbers to all motor vehicle owners who send their applications by November 11. After that date the numbers are assigned as received. When there were few automobiles in the state

numbers were reserved by request, but with the increase in automobiles in the state this no longer could be done. In the old days 348, the Doc Yak number was reserved each year for Dr. R. E. L. Steiner, then superintendent of the state hospital for the insane, now warden of the penitentiary.
