REPORT MADE BY FERGUSON

Accident Commissioner Prepares Statement for Investigating Board

A report prepared by J. W. Ferguson, member of the state industrial accident commission, covering the financial condition of the commission through the period of November 5, 1913, to June 30, 1919, shows that on the latter date there was a balance of \$2,878,484.22 in the commission fund. In the general accident fund there was \$1,057,489.66 and in the segregated fund \$1,820,994.56. The examination was made for the use of the committee appointed by Governor Oletto to investigate the operation of the commission and which is now assembling data on which to base its findings. The report shows that the total receipts for the period have been \$6,482,379.11 and the total disbursements \$2,604,885.89. The investigating committee some time ago sent a questionnaire to the commission asking a number of questions and Mr. Ferguson's financial statement is in answer to part of the questionnaire. The commission's statement in reply was this week turned over to Robert S. Gill of Portland, secretary of the committee. Most of the work of the investigation is now being performed by a sub-committee of three members. The members of the committee are: Representing employers—A. C. Dixon, manager of Booth-Kelly Lumber company, Eugene; F. A. Dony of the Multnomah Lumber & Box company, Portland; A. C. Labbe, of the Willamette Iron & Steel works, Portland. Representing labor—Frank Green and J. H. Brooks of Portland and Sandy McLean of Pendleton. Representing the state at large—C. E. Apperman of McMinnville, Robert S. Gill of Portland and H. J. Overturf of Bend.

Municipal Water Supply Is Planned at Heppner

Because the legislature of 1919 did not provide a sufficient appropriation for the state board of health to equip itself to approve for municipal water and sewer systems in the state, a new duty made incumbent upon the board by the last session, this function is performed by the state engineering department for the present and will be until such time as money is provided for the health board. It is said that a special engineering department will be necessary for the board to perform this work and the approximately \$30,000 allowed to board out of a desired \$90,000 falls
