

SURPRISE AND EXASPERATION ARE EXPRESSED IN AMERICAN NOTE TO MEXICO OVER HOLDING OF JENKINS

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 27.—Surprise and exasperation were expressed by the government of the United States in its note to the Mexican government demanding the release from prison of William O. Jenkins, American consular agent at Puebla, Mexico, it became known tonight, following the publication of the text of the American note by Andres G. Garcia, consul general at El Paso.

Following is a re-translation of the Spanish version of the note sent to Mexico by the state department of the United States:

"American Embassy, Mexico City, Nov. 20 1919.

"To Hilario Medina, sub-secretary of foreign affairs, Mexico City.

"Sir: Referring to previous communications in the case of the consular agent of the United States at Puebla, William O. Jenkins, I have the honor of informing you that I have received telegraphic instructions to notify the secretary of foreign affairs of Mexico, that in connection with the losses and injuries already suffered by Mr. Jenkins as the result of his being kidnapped—occasioned by the inability of the Mexican government to give due protection and his first arrest by Mexican authorities, the government of the United States of America is surprised and exasperated to learn that Mr. Jenkins again has been arrested.

"The government orders me to add, that the persistent persecution and subsequent harassing of Mr. Jenkins cannot but have a very serious effect on the relations between the two countries—for which the

Mexican government will be held solely responsible.

"Therefore, I am ordered to demand the immediate liberation of Mr. Jenkins.

"Accept, sir, etc. (Signed)

"GEORGE L. SUMMERLIN,

"Charge d'Affaires."

The text of the American note, as well as the reply made by the Mexican government, was received from Mexico City by the consulate general here, with instructions to give both documents publicity.

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when the United States warned Carranza that further murders of Americans would seriously affect the relations between the two countries.

According to state department records the eight murders have been in this order:

July 31: R. A. Cunningham at Matamoros.

August 28: Adam Schaefer at Pinos.

August 30: H. S. McGill at Coapa.

September 2: A. P. Hennessey at La Colorado.

September 21: Lieutenant C. H. Connelly, U.S.A., at Bahia.

Lieutenant F. B. Waterhouse, U.S.A., at Bahia.

(These were the two army aviators who lost their way, were starved and finally murdered by Mexican fishermen.)

November 14: E. K. Lack at Mexicali, said to have been killed by a Mexican official.

November 26: James Wallace at Tampico.

It is further said by the unofficial records that Wallace is the seventh American killed by Carranza soldiers in the Tampico district.

Immediately on receipt of the news of the death of Wallace the state department ordered an investigation and further report.

Investigation and report on the new phases of the Jenkins case, raised in the Mexican note refusing to meet this government's demand for the consular agent's immediate release, already had been ordered.

Condition Worst in Year.

The whole effect of the day's developments was to put the Mexican situation, already acknowledged bad into the worst light of probably more than a year. The reports of fighting in Mexico City and the reported flight of Carranza, should they be verified, are expected to have a material bearing upon it. So far as revealed no news was received directly from Mexico City. The state and war departments and the department of justice, all of which had been receiving information recently tending to forecast such a development, set about seeking further information and verification.

There was just a suspicion that the trouble in the Mexican capital was reaction of the execution of General Felipe Angeles at Chihuahua City, against which many Mexicans, including Carranza supporters, protested vigorously.

Campaign Warm.

It has been known here for some time that the preliminaries of the Mexican presidential campaign were waxing warm with Carranza and Ob-

regon as the chief figures. Obregon has been touring the country and is just about due at Manzanillo, one of the Pacific coast ports controlled by Carranza forces.

A change of government in Mexico, it was pointed out, might point the way to a solution of the present difficulties. On the other hand, it was said a change might be accompanied by such disturbances and spoliation of foreigners and foreign property as to present itself as an added cause for action.

Lansing Directs Case.

So far the situation has been handled almost entirely by the cabinet under the guidance of Secretary Lansing. President Wilson, who hitherto has handled the Mexican crises personally, has been unable because of his illness to take active charge of it.

In view of the climax which now seems to have been added by the Wallace killing to the long list of affronts, the best available opinion is that the government will frame its next step with great deliberation, probably awaiting full and verified details from Tampico, and if it decides to act will accompany its decision with a complete record framed to make clear its justification.

Father of Salem Women Passes Away at Baker

William H. Moeller, 81 years old, G. A. R. veteran and a resident of Baker county for more than 40 years, died at his home there Wednesday morning from a complication of diseases. He was born in Kiel, Germany, June 16, 1838. With his parents he came to the United States when he was 8 years old, settling in Davenport, Ia. When the war of the rebellion broke out, Mr. Moeller enlisted at the first call and served the Union. He married Margaret Nagel. They went to Baker county July 5, 1879. Mr. Moeller was a retired farmer. He is survived by Mrs. Moeller, a son, William H. Moeller, Jr., of Boise, Idaho, and by five daughters, Mrs. H. H. Carey of Salem, Minnie Moeller of Salem, Mrs. Frank Jewett of San Francisco, Mrs. L. L. Cope-land of Baker and Mrs. William Paxon of Oregon City. The funeral was held yesterday afternoon.

Presence of Mind Averts Traffic Accident on Street

Identification of persons and car numbers were not secured in what might have been a serious accident which occurred yesterday at the intersection of State and High streets. A car driving east on State and making the turn north on High street attempted to take the right of way from a car coming west on State. A serious accident was averted only by the presence of mind of the driver of the second car, who averted sharply to the right and was forced into the pedestrian line on the north side of State street at High. An observer stated that harrowing consequences would certainly have ensued had there been any foot passengers on the crossing line at this point. The driver of the first car also neglected to signal the turn.

A Ford auto driven by S. E. Wolfe, and a truck belonging to the Capital City Transfer company collided at the intersection of Ferry and Commercial streets yesterday. No one was injured, but the Ford was badly damaged amidships as the result, fenders, running board and body being badly crumpled. Mr. Wolfe was driving east on Ferry street and the truck was coming west on Ferry and turning south on Commercial, according to motorists, the Ford having the right of way. Witnesses stated that no turning signals was given by the truck driver.

Studied Law in Service, Maguire Admitted to Bar

Captain Thomas H. McGuire of Portland, who took the state bar examination while serving in the army on the Mexican border in November, 1916, was yesterday admitted by the supreme court to practice law before the Oregon bar. Captain McGuire filed his application for admission in 1916 prior to going to the border. The list of questions for the examination were sent to Captain George A. White on the board and Captain White gave the examination. The answers were returned to the state board of bar examiners who recommended his admission. Soon after returning from the border Captain McGuire entered the army for the World war and recently has returned from overseas where he served in France and Germany.

Second Aero Squadron Off for Philippine Station

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Nov. 28.—The second aero squadron, 19 officers and 80 enlisted men under command of Captain Robert G. Ervin, left Rockwell field today for its new station in the Philippines. They will sail on the troopship Great Northern at San Francisco tomorrow.

Governor to Name Three for West Point Entrance

Because some states have no national guard organization and some others are only partially organized, Governor Olcott will have the privilege of nominating three men from the National Guard of Oregon for entrance to the United States military academy at West Point. This information was received yesterday from Adjutant General P. C. Harris of the militia bureau of the war department.

In a letter received October 10 the governor was informed he would have the nomination of two men, but arrangements have been altered on a basis of the actual enlisted strength in the respective states, cutting down the apportionment to some states and increasing it for others.

Marion County State Taxes Are Paid Treasurer Hoff

County Treasurer D. W. Drager yesterday presented a check for \$64,064.26 to State Treasurer O. P. Hoff, representing the second half of Marion county's taxes, 1918 series. The taxes are subject to turnover to the state November 1, but according to past interpretation of the Oregon statute covering such turnover, a thirty day period is allowed for county in which to make this payment, the state being entitled to 6 per cent on the tax sum after December 1. Because of this understanding the county draws 2 per cent on the taxes during the 30 day interim.

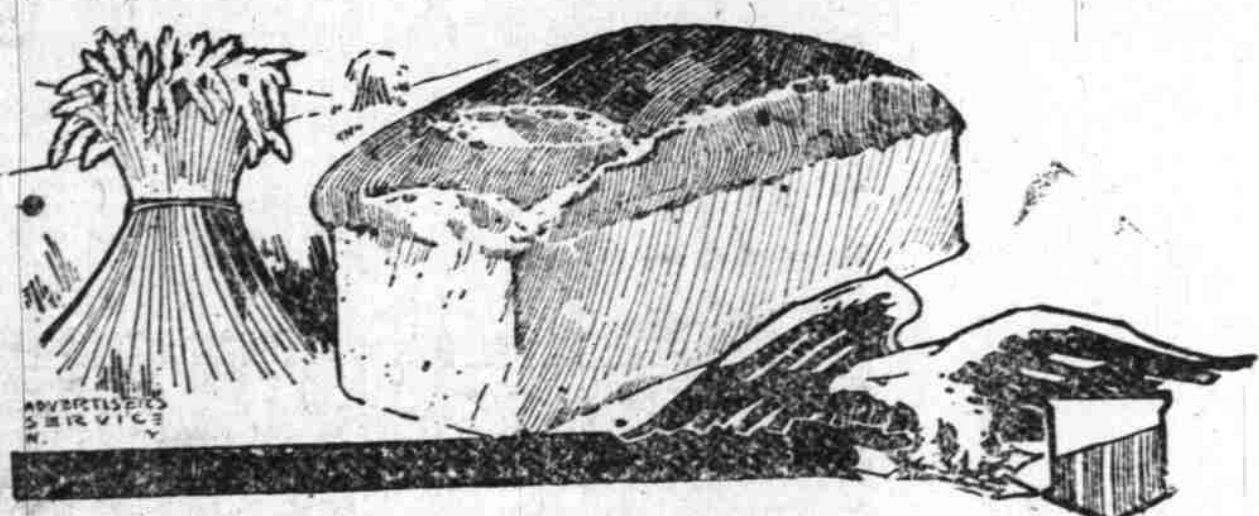


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
