Coffee and Larson Here—
E. W. Coffee and Walter Larson were Salem visitors yesterday renewing acquaintances made recently under somewhat unfavorable circumstances. Coffee and Larson are the two young men who were held in Salem as suspects in the Centralia I. W. outbreak. After investigation by Chief Varney and American Legion officials from Centralia, the lads were released. The young men had driven a Ford car from Seattle and had, according to their own state-

ments, left Centralia an hour before the fatal parade on November 11. Larson and Coffee were financially stranded in Salem and while here, a statement made by Larson concerning the Centralia incident was misconstrued by a Salem man to mean that the boys were in sympathy with the I. W. W., but Larson, who is an ex-serviceman, states emphatically that he had never made any statement personally favoring the radicals. The remark by Larson, it is said, was a quotation from a report that radicals intended to raid Centralia. The two young men leave today for San Francisco, where Coffee's parents live.

A Teacher of Health and the 3 "R's" Too



MISS ETHEL A. BEAL

On the top of the Detroit, Michigan, Municipal Hospital Building, Miss Ethel A. Beal conducts the Keifer Open Air School, and she is proving every day that tuberculosis can be prevented among children and that the little victims of it can be cured. All of the best methods for fighting tuberculosis are used in the school.
The children study and recite in the open, except when the weather is too stormy. Then two indoor assembly rooms, well ventilated and with windows opened, are utilized. Every morning and afternoon there is a rest period, when Miss Beal serves a glass of milk to each of the pupils.
Her students are not allowed to fall back in their studies. Under her instruction, while they are in the school, they are kept up with the work of the public grades, so that when they are cured they return to the classes which they left, ready to go on with them.
It is estimated that 12,000 children die every year in the nation from tuberculosis. More open air schools like Miss Beal's are needed, and the National Tuberculosis Association, with 1,000 local and state organizations affiliated with it, is planning to provide them through the sale of more than \$6,500,000 worth of Red Cross Christmas Seals this coming Christmas.
