

CABINET ASSEMBLES TO BREAK COAL SHORTAGE

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of the district were violating the order permitting them to remain open only between 9 a. m. and 5 p. m. and warned that immediate action would be taken to cut off further coal supply to such violators. More than 400 violations were reported in St. Louis alone, since last Tuesday

when the order became effective. The committee controls the coal distribution in Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana and part of Alabama.

B. F. Bush, southwestern regional director of railroads, asserted that the curtailment of passenger service one-third in that region, effective at midnight Sunday, would eliminate 30,000 train miles and result in the saving of thousands of tons of coal daily.

CLEAN LIVES ARE URGED AS WORTHY IDEAL

Governor Olcott Sends Letter
to Conference of Boys at
Albany

STRENUOUS TIMES AHEAD

Eyes of Nation's Leaders Are
Watching Youth, Executive Tells Lads

"Keep your lives clean, physically, morally and spiritually. No man is so well equipped to face the world and conquer as he who can look back into the past over a record without a blemish and without a blot upon any page in the book of his life."

This is the advice offered by Governor Ben W. Olcott in a letter read at the Older Boys' conference of the Y. M. C. A. at Albany yesterday. The governor expressed regret that he was unable to attend.

His letter in full follows: "Your executive secretary, Mr. Newmeyer, has asked me to send you a message for your gathering at Albany on December 5, 6 and 7. It is with keen regret I have discovered my engagements are such for this period that I will be unable to be with you personally.

Boys' Pride of State
"Oregon has reason to feel exceptionally proud of her boys and young men. While you boys were yet too young to have actively participated in the work of the army, navy or marine corps of the United States in the war where she did so much for world freedom, our nation and state will never forget your accomplishments on the firing line at home when you gave everything you had in you for the great cause.

"The eyes of our national leaders are centered on the older boys of today. Tomorrow you will be called upon to grapple with the great problems now being ushered in. Changing social systems, attacks on the conservative order by the radical element, fluctuating conditions on both political and civic affairs, all pre-empt momentous times.

"You will be hurled into those times and upon the shoulders of yourselves and of others like you will fall the burdens of the new times.

"It is your privilege, in fact your duty, to equip yourselves well for the days that are coming. More and more the world is demanding men of high caliber, men not only of brawn and brain, but men of moral force.

"Keep your lives clean—physically, morally and spiritually. No man is so well equipped to face the world and conquer as he who can look back into the past over a record without a blemish and without a blot upon any page in the book of his life. The sturdy men and women who are your fathers and mothers have given you boys a wonderful heritage—good minds, sound bodies and an inspiration to be citizens of the highest type. You owe it to them, yourselves and to the world about you to make the most of your opportunities. You will find the world no place for shirkers or time servers. Only those who are ready to do battle manfully for the causes that are right and true can hope to prevail. But when the reward is attained you will find it well worth your labor and preparation, no matter in what honorable calling of

life you may direct your footsteps.

Responsibilities Are Heavy

"Please do not consider this letter in the light of a sermon. I am not a preacher and there is nothing I admire more than the red blooded, active, sport loving, American boy. But I deeply feel that every lad should be impressed not only with the magnificent opportunities that lie ahead of him, but also with the tremendous responsibilities upon which those opportunities rest.

"In passing I wish to congratulate you upon your affiliation with the Young Men's Christian association. It is indicative that you feel the true value of clean minds, clean bodies and clean hands and that you already are learning from the great worth-while fact that character building and body building are firmly linked together in the development of the ideal man.

"I sincerely regret that I cannot be in person with you today. As governor of the state I am proud of you boys and for what you stand. I would appreciate welcoming you at any time you pass through the capital city of the state of which we are all so proud."

going further with refunds than were involved in our stipulation. Despite the fact that it involves a difficult accounting and mechanical problem, this refund will be made by a way of credit on the December bills, delivery of which to our subscribers is delayed for this purpose. With this declaration of purpose regarding the refund we hope that there may be extended some degree of leniency because of the innumerable details which are certain to present themselves, and we will gladly take up individual instances with all subscribers who may find reason to be dissatisfied with the disposition of this matter on their current bills. So much for the matter of refund which, after completion thereof we purpose to regulate to the limbo of oblivion.

Revenue Declared Short

"We now come to the difficult matter of complying with the order insofar as it establishes rates for the future. Candor again requires that we say now that it is the purpose of the company to apply for a rehearing regarding the reasonableness of these rates as the basis upon which we must go on with our undertaking to render a full, complete and satisfactory service to our subscribers in the state of Oregon. In the meantime, however, the business will be administered at the rates laid down by the commission in each and every community, and renewed efforts will be made on the part of the company and its organization to give a service beyond reproach, and reasonable criticism.

"Our purpose in applying for a rehearing will be to convince the commission that it has not in fact provided sufficient and additional revenue to cover the advance in wages which has actually been made. Thus far the revenue problems has never even been approached with the prospect of results to which we are entitled under the law, namely, a reasonable return on our investment in the state of Oregon. This matter, however, is one for the future.

Poor Service Acknowledged

"The thing I am desirous of making plain at the present time is that the company accepts this order with good grace and in good faith. We are particularly sorry that the commission found it necessary to comment as it did in the order upon the service that we are giving. TRAIN SERVICE IS CUT BY RAILROAD

Twentieth Century Limited to
Be Suspended For First
Time in History

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—Drastic cuts in passenger service on all railroads in the eastern region, which number approximately 150 and extend from the seaboard to St. Louis and Chicago, were ordered today by Regional Director Hardin, to save fuel and permit expeditious transportation of coal

to places in the west facing acute shortages.

The reduction, which becomes effective at 12:01 a. m. next Wednesday, will be as sharp as that which was made in the fuel famine of war days.

Mr. Hardin has specified that for the first time in its history the famous 20th century limited between New York and Chicago must be suspended; that no special trains are to be operated and that second sections of regular trains must be discontinued except in cases of coach travel between cities of dense population and then only when absolutely indispensable.

Wounded Warriors Get World Series Results Even Though in Hospitals



Hundreds of thousands of doughboys and gobs witnessed a most unique experiment when the Y. M. C. A. flashed the scores of the recent world's championship baseball games to all parts of the world. In co-operation with the U. S. Naval Radio Service and the large news associations which furnished the plays in detail, the "Y" flashed the story wherever our fighting forces are located, in this country, to far-off Siberia, to Germany, France, and all of the American insular possessions. Everywhere the men in uniform followed the progress of the game, inning by inning. Soldiers and sailors in this country manufactured score boards, many of them making electrical boards equalling any seen by the public at the various newspaper offices and theaters. One feature of this service by the "Y" was supplying of scores to the army and navy hospitals. This picture shows wounded men in one of the wards at the Walter Reid Hospital, Washington, D. C., receiving news of a championship game. There were 54 of these boards at this hospital alone, giving news of the games to every confined there.
