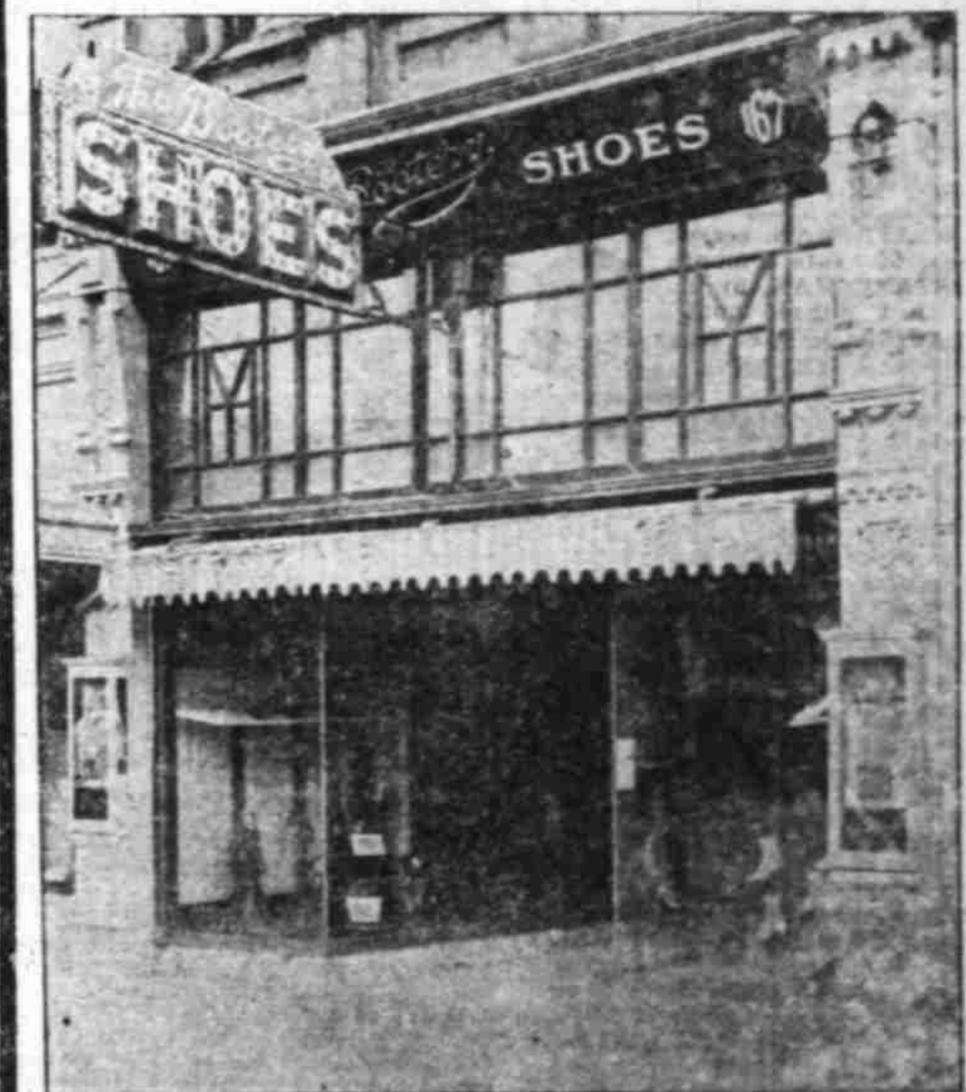

Newsome, an expert on fertilizers, who is to be here Tuesday next, December 9, to give an illustrated address on "Well Balanced Food Rations for Plants and Trees."
