CENTRAL CHURCH IS OUT OF DEBT

Annual Meeting Reveals Remarkable Growth of Congregationalists

Financially comfortable, out of debt, with more than enough money subscribed to meet the budget for 1920, and with a \$300 increase voted for the minister's salary, is the condition of the Central Congregational church of Salem.

In the last year the church has met all financial obligations and has cash in the treasury. For the coming year the church will contribute to missions nearly three times the amount it has contributed in previous years, and it will not ask for the \$300 contribution which heretofore has been coming each year from the general church organization because it has been classed as a missionary church.

The Central Congregational church is unique in that financial problems are never mentioned at the church services—yet the money comes.

More Room Imperative

These facts were brought out at the annual meeting of the church held Thursday night. Another important development is that the attendance at the church has increased beyond the capacity of the present building, and an increase in room is now being planned. This probably will be either the construction of an addition to the church or a lifting of the superstructure and construction of a basement. The report of the pastor, Rev. H. C. Stover, to whom most of the credit is given for the church's growth and financial success, showed that 53 members have been added during the year, 20 by confession and 23 by letter.

Remarkable also has been the growth in the Sunday school. Attendance this year has averaged 124 against 87 last year. Mrs. B. E. Edwards, one of the ardent workers in the church, was re-elected superintendent of the Sunday school.

Secret of Success Told

The secret of the church's growth in numbers is believed to be a novel scheme of the pastor who devotes the entire morning service to the children. At the service, which immediately follows the Sunday school service, Mr. Stover gives a brief address for the benefit of the children, frequently making use of the object lesson plan.

The reports of all committees showed progress. Mr. Stover has been pastor of the church for five years.

FRICK FORTUNE IS BEQUEATHED TO PUBLIC USE

Family of Late Iron Master Given 25 Millions—Rest to Charities

ART GALLERY FOSTERED Three Universities Get Bequests Totalling 25 Millions

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—Henry Clay Frick, multi-millionaire iron master and collector of art, left all but \$25,000,000 of his vast estate to public, charitable and educational establishments, according to the terms of his will, made public tonight.

The value of the public bequests, after \$25,000,000 is set aside for his widow, son and daughter, is \$117,000,000, exclusive of 151 acres of Pittsburgh real estate, left for a public park.

Colleges Get \$25,000,000 Princeton and Harvard universities and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology are bequeathed approximately \$25,000,000, divided so that Princeton will receive about \$15,000,000, and Harvard and Technology each about \$5,000,000.

About \$5,000,000 is left to the educational fund commission at Pittsburgh. Several Pittsburgh establishments received bequests amounting to about \$500,000 each.

Hospital Given \$1,500,000

The Society of the Lying-in hospital of New York is left about \$1,500,000.

Approximately \$6,500,000 in addition to her share in the \$25,000,000 left immediate family is bequeathed to Miss Helen C. Frick, to dispose of along the general lines of public benefit provided for in bequests to public and educational institutions.

The Frick mansion and art collection in this city valued at approximately \$50,000,000 with an endowment of \$15,000,000 additional to maintain them as "the Frick collection," is given to the public, at the termination of Mrs. Frick's life. This makes Mr. Frick's largest single gift to the public total \$65,000,000. Upon her death or election to relinquish the house as a residence, the entire property is left to a corporation to be formed to maintain "a gallery of art" on the property for "encouraging and developing the study of fine arts, and of advancing the general knowledge of kindred subjects."

Art Gallery Provided For

The trustees are directed immediately to form a corporation under the laws of New York state to be known as "the Frick collection." The corporation is to maintain in the New York mansion a "public gallery of art."

Fifteen million dollars are left in trust for the maintenance and improvement of the Frick art collection house and grounds.

Parks Are Planned

A tract of land in Pittsburgh, about 151 acres, is left to Pittsburgh for a public park. Two million dollars are left to the Union Trust company of Pittsburgh, as trustees, for maintenance and embellishment of the parks.

Mrs. Bertha Olsen is in search of her husband and Rupert Walling is looking for his wife as result of their disappearance from their respective homes at McCoy.

T. A. Olsen and Verda Walling, accompanied by two of her children, left McCoy about 10 o'clock Saturday morning, supposedly for Silverton. Later in the day when they did not return the spouses left behind grew anxious. Now they believe it was a pre-arranged plot to run away. They put the case before the Salem police.

T. A. Olsen is 26 years old, average build and was dressed in a blue serge suit, black hat, green overcoat and brown shoes. Mrs. Verda Walling is 23 years old, small of stature and wore a purple skirt, green checkered coat, orange sweater, black shoes and black veil. She has four children, the two youngest of which she took with her and two she left to her husband. T. A. Olsen has two children which he left with his wife.

LABOR COUNCIL HELPS TEACHERS

Rumor to Opposite Effect Denied in Statement by Executive Committee

Declaring that the teachers in Salem schools are receiving unjustly low salaries, the executive committee of the Salem Central Trades and Labor council yesterday issued a statement in support of the increase in salaries which will be voted on tomorrow by the people of the district. This action was taken when a rumor gained currency that the council opposed the increase. The statement, which is signed by the members of the executive committee, L. J. Simeral, Pascal L. Traglio, Samuel Bosanko and C. E. Barbour, follows:

"We, the members of the executive board, Salem leaders and labor council, having heard that a rumor is current that we are opposed to granting teachers a rise in salary, wish to make strong denial of this. As members of the American Federation of Labor we are pledged to getting better working conditions for all craft. We feel that the teachers in Salem schools are receiving an unjust wage and we wish to state that we, speaking for the Central Trades and Labor council, are strongly in favor of the rise, and will do all we can to bring it about."
