T. G. HENDRICKS PASSES AWAY

Pioneer, Prominent in Public and Financial Life, Dies at Age of 81

EUGENE, Or., Dec. 12.—T. G. Hendricks, founder of the First National Bank of Eugene and one of the first regents of the University of Oregon, died today after an illness of only a day's duration. He was aged 81 years and was an early pioneer in Oregon, settling in Lane county with his parents.

Mr. Hendricks was a member of the upper house of the Oregon legislature in the late 70's and early 80's and was prominent in all civic matters for many years. He gave Hendricks park to the city of Eugene. He was rated one of the wealthiest men in Oregon south of Salem.

The funeral will be at 2 p. m. Sunday.

WARNING SENT BY DEPARTMENT
Stat. Fire Marshal Issues Instructions to Officials and Household

The present spell of cold weather has increased the danger to life and property from fire, says a warning that has been issued by the state fire marshal's department, and special precautions are urged upon city officials, fire departments and householders. With hydrants frozen and telephone and fire alarm systems incapacitated, the danger is declared extremely aggravated.

"The following suggestions are made in order that each may know some of the most important things to be done to reduce the increased danger," says the statement.

"To the city officials: See that the streets are cleared as fast as possible of snow and ice, so traffic can be restored, and the fire department can meet an emergency call without running amuck in a snow bank while the flames may be destroying the town. Look after the mains and hydrants. Keep them from freezing so there may be a supply of water in case of necessity. To the fire department: Inspect your equipment, know it is in condition for immediate use. If you have motor machinery, know your motors are warmed so they will start without difficulty. The time lost in starting a chilled motor might be sufficient for the fire to get away from you. Hold as many men as possible ready for instant service. Increase the efficiency of your department in every possible way to meet the situation.

"To the householder: Watch zealously everything in and about your home that might in any way start a fire. Do not use a torch or oil-soaked rags to thaw the water pipes. The safe way is to wrap them with rags and then wet with hot water. Do not build a fire in your kitchen stove if the water in the coil, tank, or pipes is frozen. Do not build a fire large enough to overheat your stove or stovepipe. Make an inspection of your stoves and pipes from the floor underneath them to the top of the chimney. Know they are safe, and if you smell smoke, get busy. Remember, more fires are put out without the fire department than by it, and, after

all, the best way, and safest, to put out the fire is before it starts. Let everyone make SAFELY FIRST the watchword, and act."
