PRICE ADVANCE WORRIES TRADE
Business in General Views Condition With Caution Is Report

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—General anxiety prevails throughout American business concerning continued advance in prices and a readjustment appears imminent, the federal reserve board report tonight in its review of December business conditions. Inferences were given that reduction is due because of a recognized curtailment of buying power coupled with a lack of unanimity of opinion as to what the future holds.

Demand Exceeds Supply.
Retail trade shows great activity and wholesalers and manufacturers were represented as unable to supply the demand. The great growth was shown to have been in terms of dollars and not in units of production to the board's view. Practically every federal reserve district reports that "skilled labor was working only sufficient days to keep going," resulting in a consequent falling off of production.

Cautious Are Non-committal
In face of heavy demands, cautious manufacturers were described as disinclined to commit themselves far in advance.

NOT GUILTY PLEA OF ALLEGED REDS
Prisoners at Tacoma Make Sensational Charges Concerning Jail

TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 31.—Fifty-six alleged industrial Workers of the World here today pleaded not guilty to the amended complaint filed by prosecuting Attorney W. D. Askren. The complaint had been amended to embrace additional alleged illegal activities. Trial was set for January 22.

The sensational feature of the hearing was the charge by the prisoners that the city jail, in which 22 are held through lack of facilities at the county jail, is in "filthy" condition, and an immediate investigation is to be made by Superior Judge J. D. Fletcher.

Palmer Tells Of Red Peril
Attorney General Says Bolsheviks Are Criminal and Misguided

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—Any movement, however cloaked or disguised, designed to undermine the government, will be met with "unflinching, persistent, aggressive warfare," Attorney General Palmer announced tonight in stating the policy of the department of justice for

the forthcoming year. He added that no quarter would be shown to Bolsheviks or others of their ilk whom he described as "chiefly criminals, mistaken idealists, social bigots and unfortunates suffering from various forms of hypersthesia."

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—Following the custom inaugurated by the late James E. Sullivan, officers of the American Athletic Union have selected all American athletic teams for the year just closing. Of the all-American team, 1 are from the east, 12 from the middle west; three from the Pacific coast and one from the south. Nine have college affiliations and 23 athletic club connections.

Of the all-American college team 10 are from the east, five from the middle west, one from the south and one from the Pacific coast. The personnel include: All-American team 100 yards—C. W. Paddock, University of Southern California.

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NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—United States Marshal Power announced tonight he believed he had discovered the wood alcohol "whisky" manufacturing headquarters of John Romanello, Brooklyn undertaker, and Samuel Saleby, Brooklyn druggist, held here in connection with the distribution of poison liquor throughout New England.

Receptacles and chemicals used in the manufacture of liquor and perfumes several empty barrel, which "had contained wood alcohol" and some burned sugar found by federal officials were seized, and persons on the premises were held for examination.

Gerritt Fort Resigns from Railroad Administration
WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—Resignation of Gerritt Fort as assistant director for the railroad administration was announced tonight. He leaves his post, which he has filled since the government assumed control of the railroads, to become vice president in charge of traffic of the Boston and Maine railroad. He formerly was passenger traffic manager for the Union Pacific.
