Irrigation Bonds Affected by Freak Initiative Bill

Not more than 5 per cent can be collected on irrigation and drainage district bonds, and their sale would be vitally affected, if the initiative bill proposing to make the legal rate of interest in Oregon 4 per cent and the rate on contracts 5 per cent should be adopted at the election next November, according to an opinion of Attorney General Brown written for Percy A. Cupper, state engineer. The rate on irrigation and drainage bonds now is usually 6 per cent, and they are subject to some discount.

In ten of the great cities in China the Y. W. C. A. is at work. The blue triangle looks quite as neat with its English initials. In Chinese it reads "the female fresh year society." Many Chinese women among them, conspicuously the returned students from America, form the National committee, which has its headquarters in Shanghai. The local committees in the ten cities have all a majority of Chinese women who take full responsibility of the local expenses. The women of Canton, perhaps the most advanced in the country, established an association on their own responsibility. GILMAN CARRIES HIS PLEA EAST

Railroad Official to Place Northwest Condition Before Administration

L. C. Gilman, district director of railroads, with headquarters at Seattle, is shortly going east to endeavor to procure a larger movement of empty cars into Northwest territory, he says in a letter to the public service commission in reply to a recent telegram urging his efforts to relieve the car shortage situation. Westbound loads for some time, he says, have not been more than 50 per cent of the eastbound loads. "Prior to the coal strike on November 1 there was a very marked

shortage," says Mr. Gilman. "The demoralization of transportation conditions due to that strike greatly accentuated this situation. We have been having a very heavy preponderance of eastbound traffic, our west bound loads being out more than 50 per cent of our eastbound loads. This necessitates long distance movement of a very large number of empties, and for some months past the west-bound empty movement has not kept pace with the eastbound loaded movement. I have for some time past been endeavoring earnestly to get the movement increased. My efforts have been supplemented by the West Coast Lumbermen's association, and have now been taken up actively by the Chamber of Commerce, Seattle. I am shortly going east to endeavor to get a larger empty movement to this territory. "I appreciate your courteous tele-
