CHERRIAN DANCE TO BE ELABORATE
Five Artists to Appear in Soles—Other Cities to Send Parties
Five artists of wide reputation have been secured for the Cherrian dinner dance in the armory anuary, according to announcement made yesterday by William McGilchrist, Jr. who is in charge of arrangements. The affair promises to be one of the most elaborate given by the Cherrians. The Vancouver, Washington, Prunarians, the Eugene - Radiators and the Portland Rosarians have been invited to attend with their wives or women friends.
Word was received by Mr. McGilchrist yesterday that 80 couples will come from Vancouver and 25 couples will come from Eugene. The Rosarians have not yet responded to the invitation.
Artists Well Known
The artists who will appear during the courses and following the dinner are Mrs. Dudley Clark of Portland, coloratura soprano, Marie Gammie, Russian danseuse, Madame Lillian Effries Petri, pianist, William Wallace Graham, violinist, and Christian Roole, cellist. They will appear in solo numbers.
Music is Feature
Music will be furnished by eight Salem musicians under the direction of Oscar Steelhammer, each of the musicians having been carefully chosen. The dinner will begin at 7 o'clock and there will be dancing between courses and following the dinner. Specially decorated and small tables will be arranged around the walls, there being eight to twelve persons at each table. A Cherrian will be host at each table and the guests from outside cities will be interspersed with the Cherrians and their wives.
Affair is Formal
The affair will be formal the Cherrians and other organizations appearing in uniform or full dress. The Marion hotel will provide the dinner, a special arrangement having been made for serving it in the armory.

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delayed pending a settlement of certain points at issue between the county and the state.
Under a law that prevailed up to May 28, 1919, Clark county received two-fifths and Multnomah county three-fifths of the net proceeds from operation of the bridge. From Multnomah county's three-fifths it was required to pay the state 75 per cent as a reimbursement for the amount of annual interest charge on bonds issued by Multnomah county to build the bridge.
Accompanying the check received from Multnomah county is a report covering the period from January 1, 1918 to May 28, 1919, when the old law was superseded by a new law. This report shows total receipts of \$446,775.16 and disbursements of \$58,439.65, leaving a net balance of \$388,335.51. Multnomah county's share of three-fifths is \$232,401.31 and Clark county's two-fifths is \$154,934.20. From Multnomah's share it must pay to the state 75 per cent in addition to the check received today.
